The Kansas State Penitentiary case file on Richard Hickock, inmate number 14746. Hickock and his accomplice, Perry Smith, were convicted of first degree murder for the brutal 1959 killings of Herb and Bonnie Clutter, their daughter, Nancy, and son, Kenyon, in Holcomb, Kansas. The murders inspired the non-fiction novel "In Cold Blood" by Truman Capote. Hickock was executed by hanging on April 14, 1965. DOOM CLUTTER KILLERS

State Supreme Court Affirms Death Sentences for Richard Hickock and Perry Smith in Slaying of Western Kansas Family.

TO SET DATES

Warrants Will Be Issued Early Next Week on Time of Hangings.

'STATE'S WORST CRIME'

Couple and Two Children Slain in Robbery That Netted \$80 and Radio.

Topeka, July 8.—The death sentences for Richard Eugene Hickock and Perry Edward Smith, convicted of the slaying of four members of the Herbert W. Clutter family, were affirmed today by the Kansas Supreme court in an unanimous opinion.

The court will issue the death warrants early next week setting the dates for their hangings. The two admitted the ruthless killings when captured after a dogged nation-wide manhunt. They are being held on death row at the state penitentiary at Lansing pending disposition of their appeals.

One From Kansas.

Hickock, 29, is from Edgerton, Kas., and Smith, 32, formerly lived at Elko, Nev. Both served terms at Lansing.

"Is is held that, under the facts, conditions and circumstances, and for reasons set forth at length in the opinion, the judgments rendered and sentences imposed against each defendant must be affirmed," the opinion stated.

A jury had found each guilty on four counts of first degree murder and set their penalties at death. The supreme court opinion today found no single point of error in the trial of the case by Judge Roland H. Tate of the Finney County District court.

The victims were Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Clutter and two of their children, Nancy Mae Clutter, 16, and Kenyon Neal Clutter, 14. The murders were carried out systematically by the assailants after they saw their scheme of robbery fall through.

The robbery plot was conceived in the Kansas state penitentiary and carried out after Smith and Hickock were paroled.

Told of Wealth.

Floyd Wells, formerly of Columbus, Kas., testified at the trial that he was Hickock's cellmate at Lansing, and told him of having once worked for Clutter. He testified he told Hickock Clutter was a wealthy wheat farmer and kept a safe in his home, from which he saw Clutter pay out \$10,000 in one week in cash for farm work and expenses.

The Kansas Bureau of Investigation agents pieced together details after receiving the first break from Wells about the prison conversation. Although Clutter was considered wealthy, the story of large sums of money kept on hand was fictitious.

On Crime Spree.

It was on the strength of this flimsy information that Smith and Hickock got together after their release and started their crime spree. Evidence showed Hickock got in touch with Smith, had him come to Edgerton, Kas., to meet him, and there they went over final details of the plot.

From Edgerton they drove almost 400 miles across Kansas in hopes of finding a safe and "making a big haul" at the isolated Clutter home. Hickock had said he wanted to make "one big score" and buy a boat and live a life of leisure at remote seaports, according to testimony.

The 22-page opinion today, written by Jay S. Parker, chief justice, related the sequence of the crime and then dealt with four specific points of error raised in the appeal.

Temporary insanity at the time of the commission was one point.

"This court has repeatedly held that, in Kansas, the question of the sanity of an accused, at the time of the commission of the offense, is to be determined by the jury, upon the evidence introduced bearing upon such an issue, and not by a sanity commission," the opinion stated. "We find no evidence of record supporting this claim... and a psychiatrist testified in his opinion Hickock knew right from wrong at the time of the commission of the crimes."

Prejudice Charge Out.

The court found no error in the district court refusing to delay the trial because of alleged prejudice that might be aroused from a farm sale of Clutter property a day before the trial. The Supreme court held that no showing of prejudice was made, or any undue influence on the jury.

Another point was that the trial court erred in not having granted a change of venue because of difficulty in obtaining an unbiased jury in the home county of Finney. The Supreme court pointed out no request was made for a change of venue, and no showing was made of extreme prejudice on the part of citizens called to serve on the jury.

"No reasonable person can seriously contend that, standing alone, the magnitude of crimes of murder and the sensational aspects of brutal slayings in connection therewith deprive the defendant or defendants in a criminal action of a fair and impartial trial," the opinion stated in referring to the widespread public interest in the case. "Conceding that the crimes in question received extended and intense local, state and nationwide coverage by all news media known to this modern era, it does not follow as a matter of law that defendants thereby were deprived of a fair and impartial trial."

"The question must be determined by the particular facts of record. With that in mind, we have obtained and carefully reviewed the transcript of the record. Resort thereto fails to disclose defendants, at any time prior to or during the trial, made any claims or showing whatsoever that they were being deprived of a fair and impartial trial by the news media now complained of. Nor did they make any such claims or showing in connection with a hearing on their motions for a new trial."


"Indeed, as we have previously pointed out, their claims to that effect in this court are based on bare assertions unsupported by evidence of record."

The opinion dealt at length with points where the defendants failed to offer any denial of charges or testimony in the trial.


"We have now carefully considered and discussed in seriation every reasonable question advanced by defendants in their briefs as grounds for reversal of the judgments rendered against them and found that not one of them warrants or permits a reversal of such judgments," the opinion concluded.

Moreover, and after reading the entire transcript, as well as the abstracts of the respective parties, we fail to find any "plain error," whether specified or not, which would justify or require their reversal.

"Therefore, based on what has been heretofore stated and held it is our duty and obligation to affirm the judgments rendered by the trial court against each of the defendants in conformity with the verdict of the jury, and it is so ordered."

Court-appointed attorneys injected the issue of insanity at the time the two committed the crimes, but no psychiatric testimony was presented. Neither took the witness stand in his own defense.

Night of Horror.

The mass slaying was termed the most heartless and fantastic crime in the history of Kansas.

The night of horror in the Clutter farm home eight miles west of Garden City, Kas., netted the two about \$80 in cash and a portable radio, which later was pawned in Mexico City for a small amount. The pawned radio was one of the key bits of evidence linking Hickock and Smith to the killings.



Dear Warden:

I have received a letter dated October 4, 1961, from Richard Hickock in which he states some prison officials were upset concerning a letter he sent me dated September 25, 1961. According to the October 4 letter there seems to be some doubt about what was said in the September 25 letter concerning an "experience" by Hickock on death row.

The September 25 letter was sent by certified mail, No. 602560, has a censor initial on it, and was postmarked September 26, 1961, from Lansing, Kansas. The number 14746 eg was written on the outside of the envelope in black pen, if that means anything.

Nothing whatever was written about the penitentiary in this letter, other than that Hickock was on death row in that institution. The entire letter is devoted to telling of a dream Hickock had on November 15, 1960, the first anniversary of the killing of the Herb Clutter family. I believe he did refer to the fact that a guard awakened him when he was crying out in the dream. The dream concerned itself entirely with members of the Herb Clutter family and was intended for use as a short story by both Hickock and myself.

Hickock asked that I send the letter back, or a copy of it, in order that the deputy warden could examine it. I'll be happy to do that if, after receiving this letter, you would like to have it done. As I have told both Hickock and yourself in the past I have no intention of writing anything for any publication concerning the prison or the persons who operate it, without your complete prior knowledge.

Be assured I stand ready to cooperate with you in any possible way now and in the future, just as you and your fine officers have with me in the past. Please do not hesitate to call on me if you desire to see the September 26 letter from Hickock, or if I can be of service in any other way.

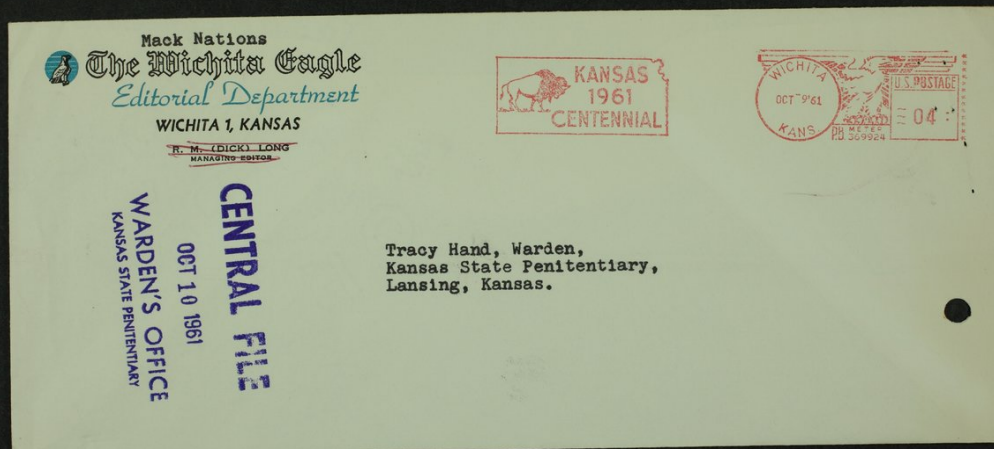

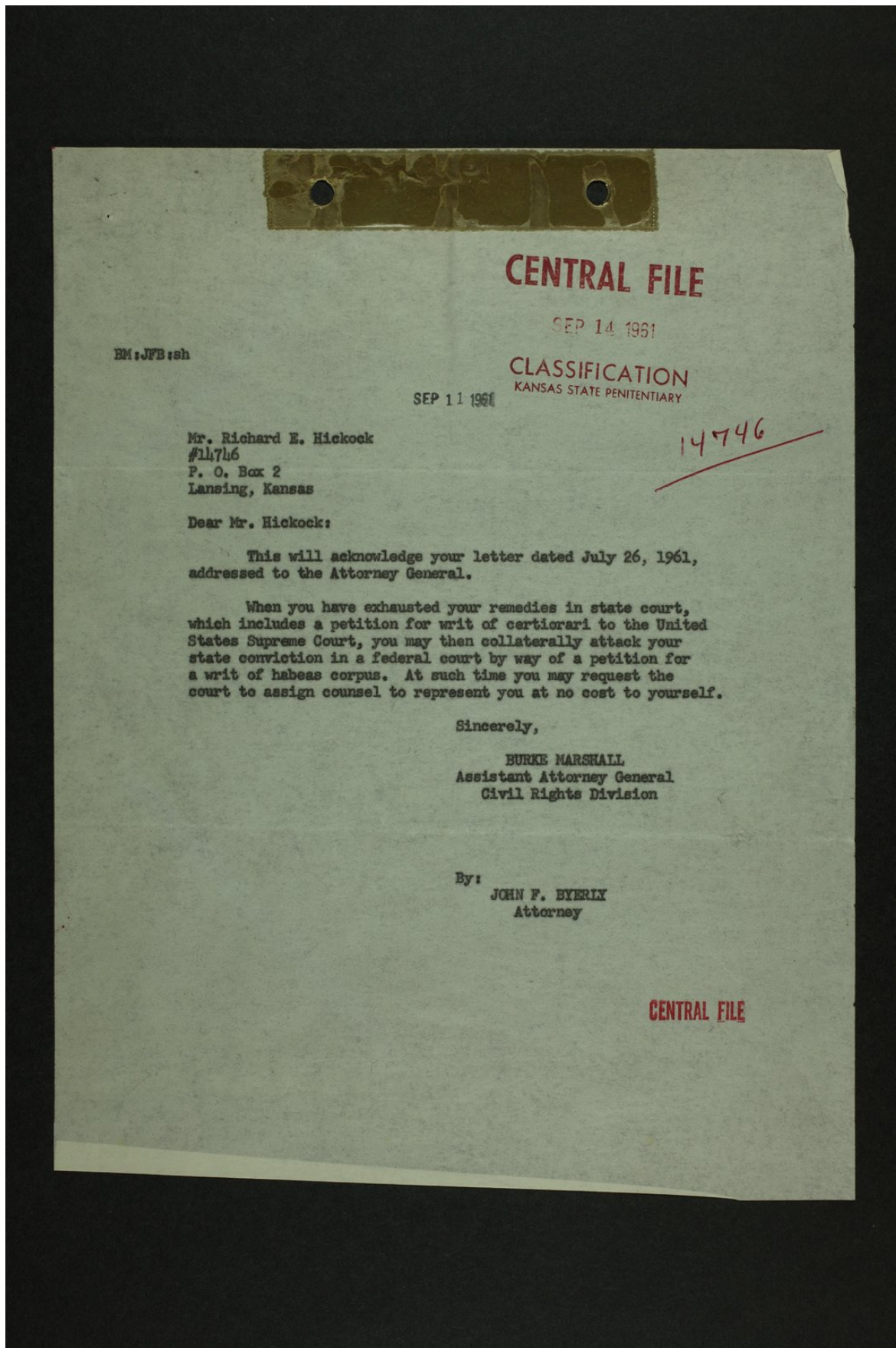

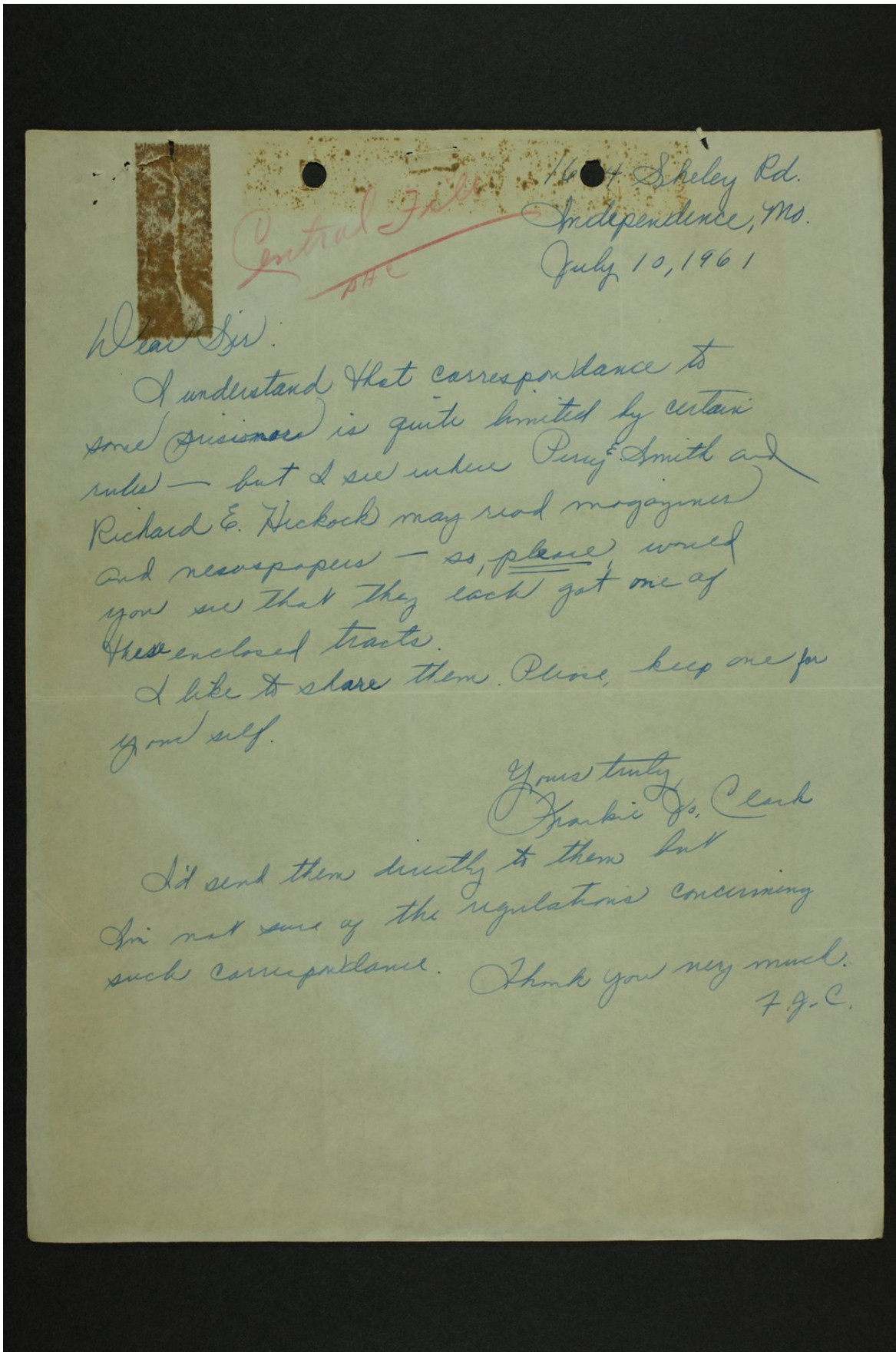
