

Governor John St. John, Exoduster received correspondence

Kansas Governor John P. St. John (1879-1883) received these letters from persons concerned with the migration of southern blacks to Kansas, commonly known as the Exodus or Exoduster movement. The letters come from blacks considering a move to Kansas, persons assisting with or monitoring the migration, officials of cities along the route, and persons providing for the relief of the migrants upon their arrival. The letters proceed in rough chronological order. Most include remnants of abstracts that were attached to the letter and then partially removed. The top of the abstract includes a reference to the letterpress book and page number of the governor's response. The governors' letterpress books are a separate collection. This collection comprises box 13 folders 13-15 and 20, box 14 folders 1-9, and box 15 folders 1-5 of the John St. John governor's records. The 1879-1880 correspondence was filed under "Immigration, Negro Exodus." The 1881-1882 correspondence was filed under "Freedman's Institute, Relief Association." 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


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
A Specimen of the Diet that Produces Kansa Washington, Texas, November 18th, 1879. The following is a true and correct copy, verbatim et leteratum, et spell at um, et punctu at um, of an original now in my possession. Leabenworth, Nov. 1, '79. Mr. Anthnoy Burress, Esq. Washington. Honble Sur:—I vail myself ob de fus chance I hab to tell you all de news, we got here all rite, de people along de rode gib us all as much pound cake gib us all as much pound cake and wine want, and when we get here de govenii John came and he say—whar dese Texas gentlem an ladies who just came here? we say, we is dey, and he say berry happy to see you gentlem and ladies, and I gwine to gib a party dis ebenin', and hopes you will all be dar, and we say we will, hab de honable pleasure ob being dar sah. De govnir's daughter, Sylphide, she say to Bill, what yo name yung gentlem? and he tell her and she say yu Texas yun men is so nice and genteel, Bill you plese come and see me. De fac is I tink it was lub at fist sight, Den de member for congress he com. de member for congress he com and want us all to dine wid him and want us all to dine wid him tomorrow, and den we is be at de ball party ob de sectry ob de govmint on tuesday night, and den we will had all our names rolled on de lists, and to tell dem how much land and how many mules we all want, an dey will be furnished free, an beside dis de state pays us for all de will be furnished free, an beside dis de state pays us for all de work we do on our own land, so yu see we get all de land we want for nuffin, and we get pay for all de work we do it. An de govnir say he will provide ebery family wid \$500.00 cash beside De govnirs wife, she kiss my wife, and say my dear sister I be so happy to see yu nice Texas people cum hear, we is all alike hear, and she say de truth, for de nice white gals come among us, and I kno de come looking for boas. Dere has been about twenty Texas yung been about twenty Texas yung gentlem freedmen married to beautiful white gals since we come, wid big fortunes too. I think Bill and the govnirs nice darter will be de nex to marry I tink we all get into big offis here soon, for we is berry high standing here. until de govnir gives us our land and mules and \$500.00 and has our houses \$500.00, and has our houses built, which is to be 15 by 300, six story high, wid a Fandango all round and a revenue in front

spectable hotel, includin wines Oh it is lovely to be sociating wid govnirs and congerassers and walsin wid de fus class white gals.

I mus quit to pare for de big dinner, but I write yu more tic-I had honah to be Respectable, Mr. Thomas Johnsing, Esq.

































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




















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




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




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
