J. a. Baker, the secretary of the Central Labor Union in Parsons, Kansas, sends Kansas Governor Henry Allen, of Topeka, a resolution protesting the proposed industrial court legislation. Baker refers to the resolution as the most autocratic and un-American legislation ever proposed in Kansas. The industrial court legislation was passed into law in 1920 but remained on the books for only a few years when it was declared unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court.

Dear Sir: Attached you will find a resolution protesting the enactment of the proposed Legislation, which you have called a special session of the Legislature to enact.

We are spesed to the enactment of this Legislation, be cause we beleive it to be, undemocratic unpatriotic and unamerican. All the sacrifices that Labor made in this great strugle that has just ended, and all the premises that we have received, that out of this conflict we would receive industrial democracy and freedem as well as world democracy and freedem, we are now to receive those premmises in the form of the Cummins Bill and the Legislation you have in mind.

We denot beloive in strikes, there is no one that feels the pinck of hunger quicker than the one who is on strike, but to Legislate the wookers out of the only weapon they have to force an unwilling empolyer to terms of justice is unthinkable.

Laws of this kind has been tried in England and has failed, and we have no doubt if enacted in this country will also fail, Woodrow Wilson has said "the right to bargain collectively must be reconized, and the right to strike cannot be denied" yet there is a few people in the State of Kansas, as well as in the Nation, that would like to see, the workers shackeled and compeled to serve their employer, regardless of what the conditions might be, and the compensation paid. There is one thing that hasent been denied Laber as yet, although it wouldent surprise us that it would be attempted in the furture, and that is the right to vote.

And as we have that right, there is one bright thought in our minds and, that is, that in the furture there will be another election day in the State of Kansas, and when that election day comes, there is a few men in the State of Kansas, that is going to receive special and careful consideration.

WHERAS: we believe this proposed measurer is the most autocratic and unAmerican peice of Legislation ever proposed in the State of Kansas and its sole purpose is to intimidate the workers and at the same time to distract attention from the socalled special interest group and.

WHERAS: as patricetic Law abideing and liberty leveing Citizens, and have a fair conxeption of the functioning of our State Government, we ask that these intrusted with its direction and Administeration do their whole duty and,

WHERAS: today Laber is giving more attention to Governmental affairs than ever before, no popular cry of Belshetium or reds has excited them or swept them off their feet, but down deep in mind of every worker is the thought that the few who centrels the necessarys of life are the real cause of the present industrial conflict.

Therefore be it RESOLVED

That the Parsons Central Labor Union in regular session assembled protest and ask our Representatives to vote and use their influence against this unAmerican Law. And be it further RESOLVED;

That this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this organization and a copy forwarded to Governor Allen, and one to each of our Representatives and a copy furnished to each of our daily papers for publication.

Unanimously adopted.
