This item contains 4 bulletins published by the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee (KERC) and the Civil Works Administration (CWA) in Topeka, Kansas. The bulletin numbers are #127 (1924-1933), #289 (1934), #355 (1935), and #380 (1936). The year listed by the bulletin number is the year covered; though the bulletin generally had a publication date sometime the next year. Bulletin Number 127 covers a ten year period from 1924-1933. This report has an introduction, information on the KERC; special programs of the KERC; state statistical summaries; and 105 county reports. Bulletin 289 covers state organization; accomplishments under Work Relief and CWA, special programs in the state and county in 1934; case load and expenditures; state and county statistical summaries; 105 county reports; wage rates, labor relations, and complaints; economic conditions affecting relief load; grants and loans from State and Federal Agencies other than Relief; and maps and charts. Bulletin Number 355 covers the Relief Department, Accounting and Finance Department, Engineering Department; state and county statistical summary; 105 county statistical reports; relief obligations and case load, Homestead Rehabilitation Department; economic conditions affecting relief load; relief appropriations and relief laws; the coordination of public and private welfare service; grants and loans from federal state agencies other than relief. Bulletin Number 380 covers Legislation of 1936, social service development in 1936; case load and case work service and the cost of public assistance and administration; accounting procedures for funds, equipment, materials and commodities; production and distribution projects; Boards of County Commissioners and County Social Welfare Personnel; KERC publications, KERC Audit Reports, and KERC Personnel and Pay Rolls. Also, information on the State and Social Welfare Building, Trust Deed, and the Kansas Homestead Rehabilitation Corporation, State Charter and KHRC Audit Reports. Each of the first three bulletins has an index at the end.

OTTAWA SUBSISTENCE GARDEN

Approximately 375 subsistence gardens were raised by relief clients in Franklin county during 1934. Garden leaders who measured and inspected gardens were selected from relief rolls. Such supervisors worked out their budgets on garden projects instead of on general work projects. The picture (upper left) shows one of the larger subsistence gardens at Ottawa during the growing season.

STONE BRIDGES AND CULVERTS

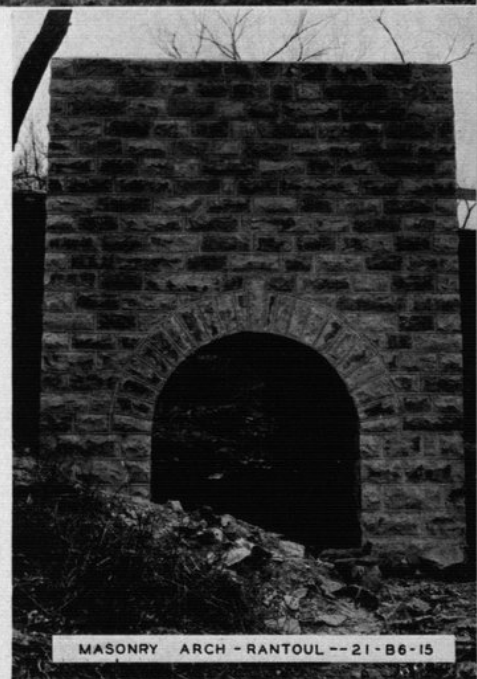
The three pictures on the right are close-ups of outstanding stone masonry bridges and culverts constructed as a part of the general road building and improvement program of Franklin county. Thirty-five similar structures had been constructed under the CWA and county work relief programs by the close of the year. Water conduits, floor systems, sidewalls, and, in the case of the upper bridge, abutments—all were constructed of native stone which is available in all parts of the county. In the lower bridge, small openings were left in the sidewalls to provide drainage facilities during heavy rainfall. Some bridges were built with treated wood floors and stringers, and several were refloored or otherwise repaired.

CLEAR WELL UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The clear well (lower left) was built as a part of the water works improvement project at Ottawa. Work was begun under the CWA and completed under a county work relief project. The clear well, nearing completion in the picture, is used as a final receiving basin for water which is later pumped into the city water mains. Water is stored inside the concrete clear well to prevent pollution and provide a reserve supply. The improvement project also provided for grouting brick pavement on the inside slope of the lake at the water plant, back-filling excavated material around and grading over the clear well, and making connections for the clear well. All equipment and materials were furnished by the water and light department of the City of Ottawa. Work relief laborers also removed and relaid one-half mile of water pipe line in Ottawa, made necessary by paving work done on State Highways 50-S and 73-W.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Developments under the water conservation program have been of great value to Geary county, according to a report on the accomplishments under the CWA and the county work relief programs (October, 1932, through December, 1934). However, the construction of permanent highways at Fort Riley, the improvement of playgrounds, and an addition to the high school gymnasium at Junction City also were notable accomplishments.

To relieve the water shortage during 1934, 42 farm ponds were constructed, 18 emergency wells dug, and seven emergency pumping plants were set up in the county.

Almost all the county roads leading into Junction City, the only large population center, were surfaced under the road improvement program. The surfacing materials varied in different sections of the county, gravel, shale, or crushed rock being used according to their proximity to the road to be surfaced. One quarry and rock crusher operated at Junction City. Approximately 75 miles of county and township roads were improved, construction of a one and one-half mile township road begun, 14 small culverts built, and 12 blocks of city streets improved at Junction City.

The greatest improvement made by CWA labor was on the Junction City high school building and athletic field. The seating capacity of the gymnasium was almost doubled, and the athletic field was improved by the filling in and leveling of the field and the construction of a running track. Care was taken to construct this field so that it would drain properly.

Additional improvements at Junction City consisted of work on the courthouse and one city warehouse, the laying of 300 feet of storm sewer, and 472 feet of sanitary sewer. General improvement work in the county included repair of six schoolhouses and the construction of 35 sanitation units. The sewing room located at Junction City produced approximately 1,800 garments in 1934.

The number of persons dependent on relief in Geary county during the latter part of 1934 averaged somewhat over 500 per month. In addition to the drought a number of layoffs by the Union Pacific railway and the motorization of the local street railway and inter-urban system connecting Junction City with Fort Riley and Manhattan were contributing factors to the increase in the relief load, county officials report.

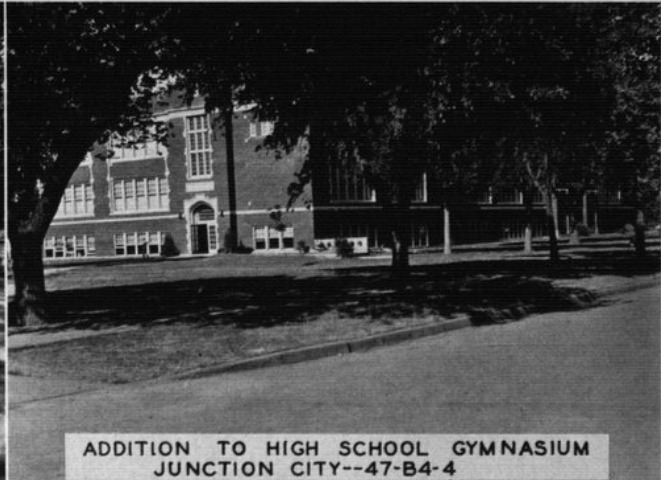

JUNCTION CITY--47-B4-4

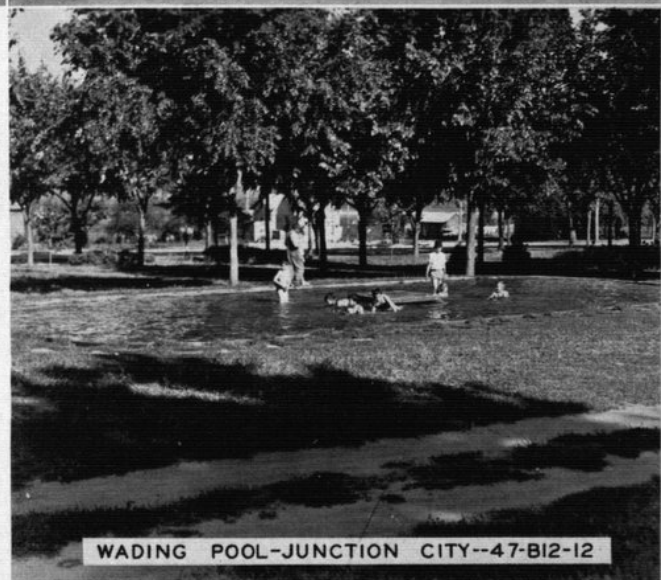
STREET AND RECREATIONAL IMPROVEMENTS

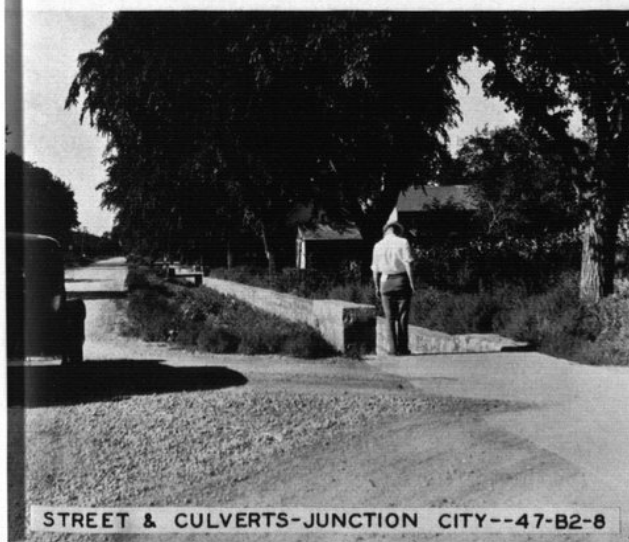
The concrete wading pool at the right was constructed to provide summer recreational facilities for Junction City children. A small fountain was built in the pool. The well house below shelters valves which regulate the flow of water into the city's water supply.

HIGH SCHOOL UNDERGOES REPAIRS

The north wall of the Junction City high school gymnasium, shown at the upper right, was torn out, and reinforced concrete bleachers were built on the north side of the gymnasium. A new wall was built, enclosing the bleachers. The seating capacity of the gymnasium was practically doubled. The high school athletic field also was improved by workers filling and leveling the football field and constructing a running track. Drainage facilities were provided.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Chiefly because it is one of the more sparsely populated counties, Gove developed a less varied program of work relief projects under the Civil Works Administration and county work relief programs than most counties in the western part of the state. Graveling of roads and streets and the construction of bridges have been regarded by county relief officials as the most beneficial types of projects carried out. A survey of accomplishments of the work programs and Civil Works Administration made for the period beginning October, 1932, and continuing through December, 1934, shows to what extent public improvements have been carried out in meeting the relief needs of the county and in providing worthwhile and permanent improvements.

State highway work consisted of the grading and surfacing or repairing of 250 miles of highway. Other such work included 350 miles of county and township roads and 124 blocks of city streets, chiefly in Quinter, Grainfield, Buffalo Park, and Grinnell.

Three bridges and large culverts were built in connection with the road improvement program, and 52 small culverts were placed, largely at entrances to farms and fields. One garden pond and 15 farm ponds were either constructed or were in the process of construction at the close of 1934. Cemetery improvements at Grinnell and Grainfield were considered outstanding as projects developed for general repair and renovation of public property. At Grinnell the grounds were replotted, all lots were staked, permanent corners were fixed, and an ornamental front was constructed. In addition to these improvements the cemetery was fenced on all four sides and all driveways were gravelled. Similar though less extensive renovation work was done on the cemetery at Grainfield.

Distress caused by drought and resultant crop failures and unemployment in Gove county, according to the poor commissioner, is temporary, dependent on moisture conditions. During 1934 at the peak of the drought neither farmers nor business men were able to hire any laborers, and the result was a marked increase in the relief load. The water conservation program was regarded by the county relief administration as a most beneficial movement to augment the water supplies which are so vital to the success of western Kansas farming.

GOVE COUNTY

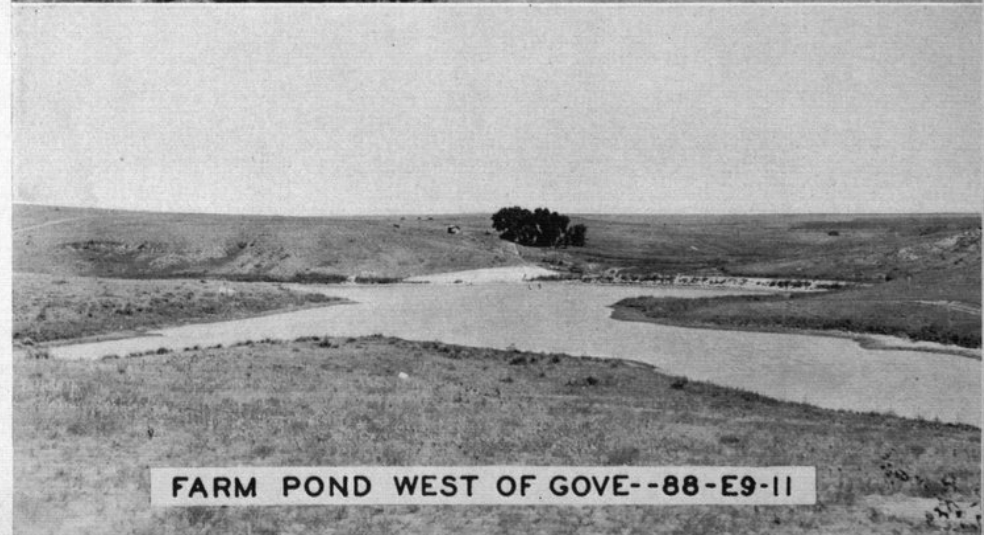

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Outdoor improvements of benefit to the county as a whole comprised the greater part of the accomplishments made under the Civil Works Administration and county work relief programs in Graham county, dating from the time the first relief program was set up in October, 1932, until the close of 1934.

Under the Civil Works Administration practically all the work done by relief labor was on county roads. The work consisted of making small fills, extending head walls of culverts, and graveling county and township roads and state highways. By the end of 1934 approximately 58 miles of roads had been graded, 29 miles surfaced, and four miles both graded and surfaced; 40 small culverts, largely at farm entrances, and 24 large culverts and bridges had been constructed on related projects; and 102 blocks of city streets had been improved in Hill City and Morland. Street improvements consisted chiefly of grading and graveling.

To combat the water shortage problem in the county, the construction of garden and farm ponds, as well as work on one county lake, was undertaken as work relief projects under the emergency water conservation program. The low water supply in the summer of 1934 necessitated the digging of six emergency wells, and six garden ponds and 80 farm ponds were completed during the year. The county lake project near Morland, which is known as the Morland Dam, was begun in 1934 and furnished work relief for a number of laborers.

General repair work was done on 78 rooms in 26 schoolhouses throughout the county, including rural high schools at Morland and Bogue; 17 rooms in the county courthouse at Hill City; and one water plant there. Two cemeteries, located at Hill City and Morland, also were improved. The sewing room operating at Hill City gave work to women relief clients who produced approximately 989 garments in 1934.

The total number of persons dependent upon relief in Graham county at the end of 1934 represented a large increase over 1933. The county is strictly an agricultural district, but has suffered crop failures for the last three years because of bad weather conditions, county relief officials report. Owing to these successive failures there has been no regular employment in the county.

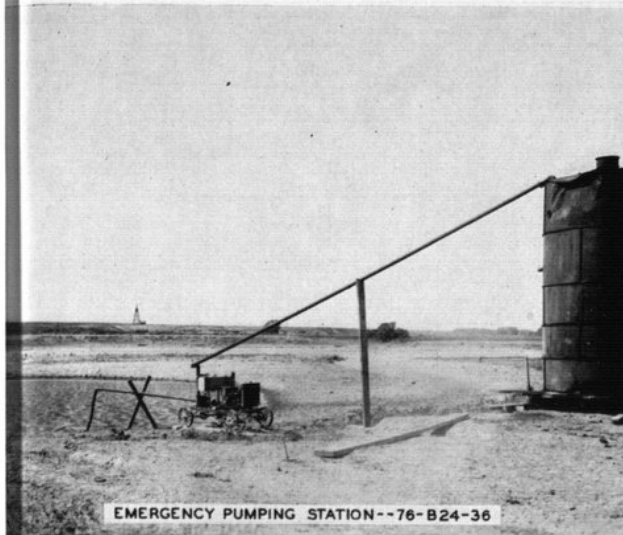

Farmers furnished mowers and rakes, and work relief clients performed the labor (picture upper right). The farmers received half of the crop, and the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee the remaining half, which was stored for later distribution as feed for subsistence animals.

LAKE AND PUMPING STATION

This recreational lake (pictures at bottom and center right) was constructed two miles west of Morland on Antelope creek. Clearing of the lake bed and construction of the earth fill dam, which was riprapped with stone, required the labor of approximately 125 work relief clients, who represented 71 per cent of all workers employed on the project.

The emergency pumping station (upper left) was set up early in the summer to alleviate drought conditions; emergency wells also were provided for on the same project.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

As possibilities for promotion of other projects of benefit to the community were small, all efforts in Grant county were directed toward the improvement of roads under the work relief and CWA programs, although the construction of garden ponds became quite popular during the summer of 1934. The Grant county engineer took advantage of the Civil Works Administration, and his efforts to build and improve as many miles of road as possible met with success, with the result that Ulysses, the county seat, was made easily accessible to residents in all parts of the county.

A survey of accomplishments under the county work relief and CWA programs (October, 1932, through December, 1934) shows to what extent work has been carried out. Sixty miles of state highway were improved and work on county and township roads consisted of surfacing one mile, grading 73 miles, and repairing 11 additional miles. Thirty-nine small culverts and five bridges and large culverts were built and placed throughout the county.

The high school grounds at Ulysses were filled and necessary surfacing was done. One other school building was repaired in the county, and improvement work was done on the Ulysses water plant. Twenty-two sanitation units were installed.

A jackrabbit eradication project was approved in Grant county near the close of the year.

The Grant county farmers were greatly benefited by the water conservation program, the county relief administration reports, chiefly in garden ponds which are reservoirs for storing water pumped from underground sources. Sixty-four garden ponds and two farm ponds were either completed or were nearing completion at the close of 1934.

The relief load in Grant county remained stationary throughout the year except for a short period during the harvest when practically all work relief was stopped because the clients could work for \$2 to \$3 per day in the fields. Because of a lack of the usual harvest transient labor, farmers even had to go out of the county to get help. Also through October and November, the relief load decreased slightly owing to rental or home utilization of wheat pastures which some clients were fortunate enough to have. In October approximately half of the relief clients were on homestead rehabilitation.

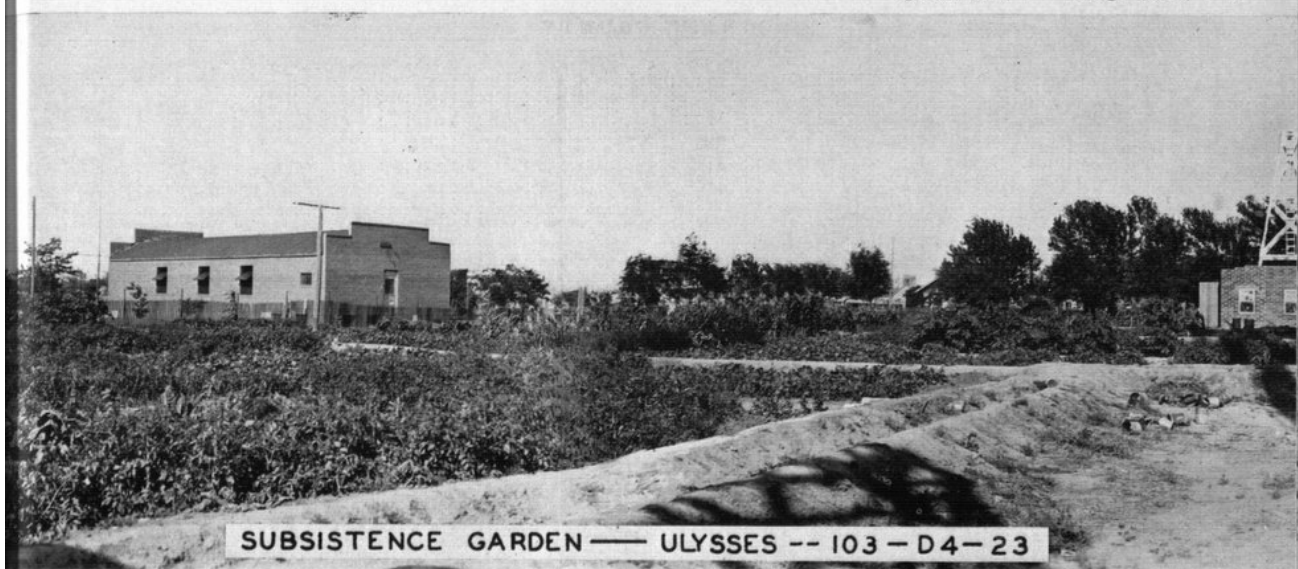

IMPROVING LEGION HALL AND HIGH SCHOOL GROUNDS

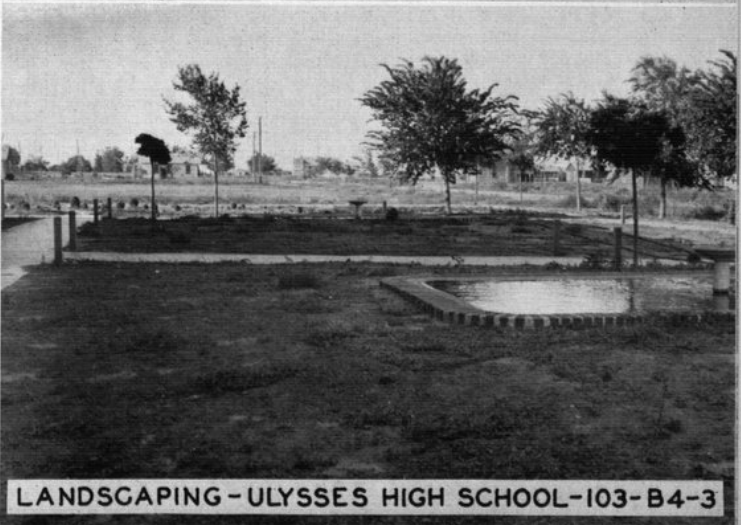

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Among accomplishments under the work relief and CWA programs in Gray county (October, 1932, through December, 1934) the most outstanding have been the construction of an athletic field and stadium for the new Cimarron high school, the razing of the old high school building there, and the construction of 50 miles of standard graded roads.

A total of 102 miles of roads were improved, and four bridges and large culverts and 197 small culverts of concrete tile were placed. The use of the tile greatly improved drainage conditions. Sixty-two blocks of city streets at Cimarron, Ensign, and Montezuma were improved.

Repair of school buildings included two schools each at Ensign and Ingalls, one at Copeland, and 17 rural schools. The courthouse, where a rock garden was built, and the library at Cimarron were improved. Work on public utilities included the cleaning of a water plant, laying of 300 feet of storm sewer, and cleaning of 880 feet of sanitary sewer at Cimarron. Work was done on a park at Ingalls, on five cemeteries located in various sections of the county, and on a cemetery at Cimarron. At Montezuma and Copeland dump grounds were cleaned up.

Seven garden ponds and eight farm ponds were constructed under the water conservation program.

The sewing room at Cimarron turned out 1,435 garments during the year.

The county relief administration reports that the weather was the temporary factor which increased the relief load in 1934. Another factor was over expansion on the part of farmers and business men during the year preceding the depression and drought. Farmers bought land and machinery planning to pay for it with future crops, and business firms expanded accordingly on the strength of the farmers' hopes. Consequently the majority of the people were so involved that when crop failures came they were heavily in debt and obligated to meet interest payments and family needs with funds too depleted to do either. Employment conditions in Gray county during 1934 were helped by the fact that two new schoolhouses were built, one in Cimarron and one in a rural district. These employed men from November, 1933, to September, 1934.
