This item contains 4 bulletins published by the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee (KERC) and the Civil Works Administration (CWA) in Topeka, Kansas. The bulletin numbers are #127 (1924-1933), #289 (1934), #355 (1935), and #380 (1936). The year listed by the bulletin number is the year covered; though the bulletin generally had a publication date sometime the next year. Bulletin Number 127 covers a ten year period from 1924-1933. This report has an introduction, information on the KERC; special programs of the KERC; state statistical summaries; and 105 county reports. Bulletin 289 covers state organization; accomplishments under Work Relief and CWA, special programs in the state and county in 1934; case load and expenditures; state and county statistical summaries; 105 county reports; wage rates, labor relations, and complaints; economic conditions affecting relief load; grants and loans from State and Federal Agencies other than Relief; and maps and charts. Bulletin Number 355 covers the Relief Department, Accounting and Finance Department, Engineering Department; state and county statistical summary; 105 county statistical reports; relief obligations and case load, Homestead Rehabilitation Department; economic conditions affecting relief load; relief appropriations and relief laws; the coordination of public and private welfare service; grants and loans from federal state agencies other than relief. Bulletin Number 380 covers Legislation of 1936, social service development in 1936; case load and case work service and the cost of public assistance and administration; accounting procedures for funds, equipment, materials and commodities; production and distribution projects; Boards of County Commissioners and County Social Welfare Personnel; KERC publications, KERC Audit Reports, and KERC Personnel and Pay Rolls. Also, information on the State and Social Welfare Building, Trust Deed, and the Kansas Homestead Rehabilitation Corporation, State Charter and KHRC Audit Reports. Each of the first three bulletins has an index at the end.

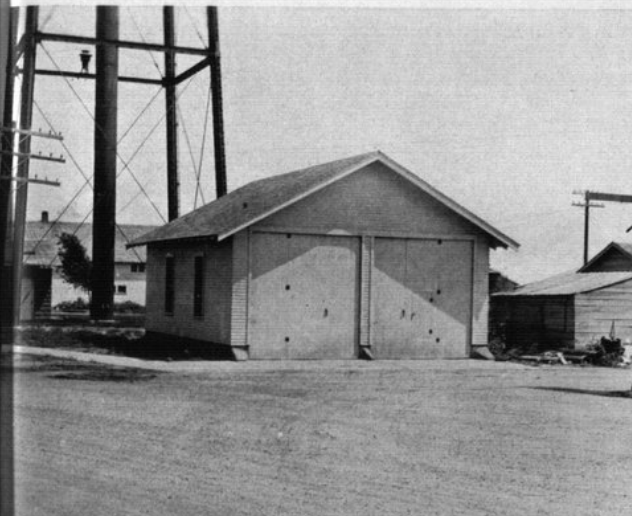

COUNTY SHED AND PIPE PLANT

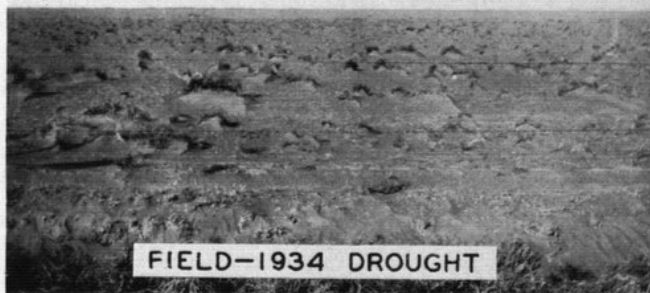
The frame structure (upper left) was built by relief clients at Montezuma to serve as a shed for storing county equipment and various tools used on county projects.

The concrete pipe plant (upper right) was operated at Cimarron in connection with the road improvement program. This pipe was used to facilitate drainage throughout the county, particularly in the construction of culverts, 197 of which had been placed by the end of the year.

ATHLETIC FIELD AND FARM POND

The athletic field and stadium (lower left) for the Cimarron high school was one of the outstanding work relief improvements made in the county. The old high school building, which was razed, furnished part of the materials.

The farm pond (lower right) was built for a farmer not on homestead rehabilitation by work relief laborers. The dam is in the background at the right.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Although road improvement projects carried out under the work relief and CWA programs involved comparatively few miles of highway, they were of greatest value to Greeley county, according to a report of work relief activities for the period, October, 1932, through December, 1934. Actual work of surfacing the roads was supplemented by cutting, filling, and the improving of drainage conditions. Only 22 miles of roads were surfaced. In addition, three concrete slabs and five concrete retaining walls were built across dry draws, and nine fills, averaging 100 feet in length, were made. Eight large culverts and four small culverts were built, and 108 blocks of city streets were improved, including the sanding of streets in Tribune and in Colon township.

Under Civil Works one mile of water pipe in the City of Horace was lowered to minimize possibility of freezing during cold weather. General improvements to public buildings involved the remodeling of seven rooms in the courthouse at Tribune; work on the city hall there; the remodeling of 21 rooms in three schoolhouses, one a new structure; and improvement of the county poor farm.

Under the water conservation program, this county, which depends entirely upon agriculture and consequently upon rainfall, drilled two emergency wells, and built a total of 83 ponds, 80 of them garden ponds and the remainder farm ponds.

Other projects in the county included a sewing room at Tribune where women work relief clients produced a total of 394 garments.

Owing to crop failures in this district many persons were thrown out of employment in 1934. The continuous drought after 1931 had increased in severity, and records indicate that more persons were on relief during 1934 than for all other years combined. Relief funds literally kept the citizens of this county from starvation and distress, the county relief administration reports.

The year was important not only from a standpoint of alleviating suffering, however, but also because a system of compiling and filing of efficient and valuable records was set up. Relief officials report that up to the beginning of 1934 few public records pertaining to public welfare service were available, but that at the close of 1934 a detailed and accurate check of information was being made.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Work relief activities in Greenwood county under the county work relief and CWA programs (October, 1932, through December, 1934) were concentrated almost entirely on road and street improvement, although women's work projects and several other general types of work were important.

Road work partly consisted of surfacing or otherwise repairing some 58 miles of state highway. County and township road work included the grading and surfacing of 176 miles, of which 134 miles were surfaced and 42 miles graded. Under the CWA one-third of the work done at the county was that of widening the right-of-ways along county and township roads to 60 feet, a task which was considered by county officials especially beneficial in making a more nearly uniform road system. Some 160 blocks of streets were improved in the cities of Eureka, Severy, and Madison. Besides this work 15 bridges and large culverts, built to Kansas State Highway Commission standards, and 15 small culverts were constructed and placed where needed.

Emergency wells played an important part in maintaining water supplies during the summer of 1934 when cattle were suffering from lack of water, especially near Virgil and Madison. By the close of 1934, 22 wells were completed, seven farm ponds constructed, and seven pumping plants were set up along streams. Flood prevention measures consisted of changing the channel of the Verdigris river for about half a mile at Madison.

At Eureka, 12 rooms in one schoolhouse were repaired, the courthouse was repaired and the lawn improved, a model athletic field lighting system was installed, and repair work was done at the relief office. Improvements were made on the cemeteries in Pleasant Grove township and near Reece. Thirty-three sanitation units also were set up. Sewing rooms at Madison, Eureka, and Severy produced 1,203 new and remade garments. Wood cutting projects were operated to obtain fuel for relief clients, and toward the latter part of the year hay and straw baling projects were set up in the county.

Work on pipelines caused a decrease in the case load early in 1934, but the number of relief clients increased during the summer when the drought set in.

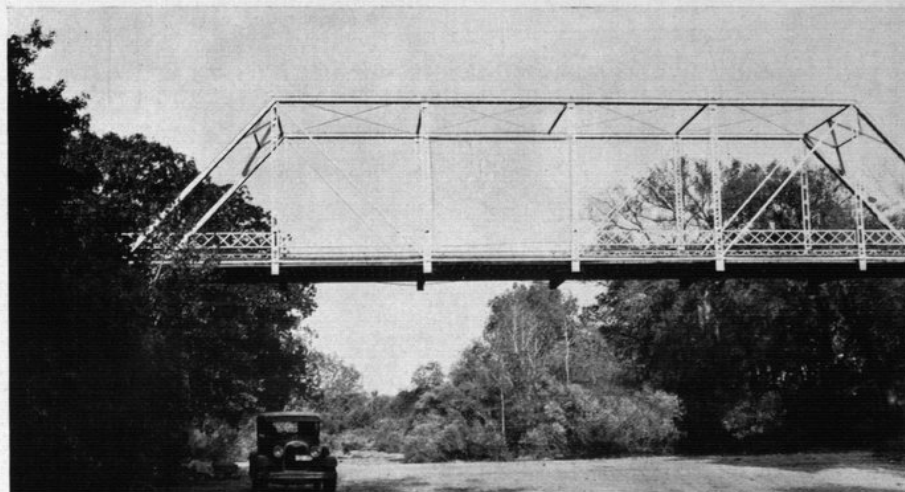

BRIDGE ON STATE HIGHWAY

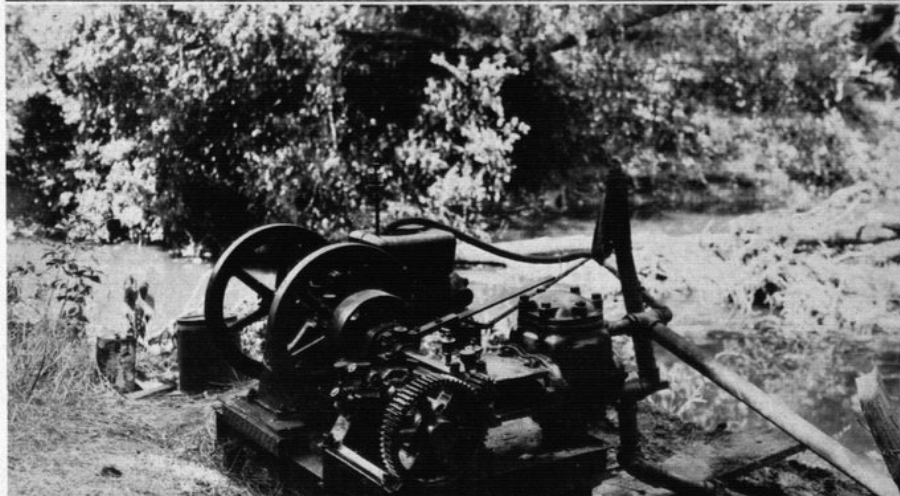
The bridge (adjacent picture) was constructed on State Highway No. 11 (and U. S. Highway No. 54) in Greenwood county between Eureka and the west county line. Work on this highway, begun under the Civil Works Administration and completed under a county work relief project, furnished employment for as many as 100 laborers, approximately 80 per cent of whom were unskilled. The bridge structure is of steel with steel guard rails and a floor system of wood. The automobile parked beneath the bridge shows the condition of the stream bed during the 1934 drought.

EMERGENCY PUMPING PLANT

Emergency pumping plants and emergency wells played an important part in alleviating water shortages in Greenwood county during the summer of 1934. The pumping plant (shown in the center picture) is one of seven installed during the summer under the emergency water conservation program of the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee. Twenty-two emergency wells were drilled or dug. A part of the stream, from which water is pumped, may be seen at the extreme right of picture.

PUMPING PLANT STORAGE TANK

Heavy iron storage tanks, similar to the one in the accompanying picture, were usually installed in connection with emergency pumping plants. Water was pumped into the tanks and thus made more easily available to farmers who hauled water for their livestock. Farmers are shown here filling a truck tank from the storage tank. The pumping equipment is not visible, but the connecting pipe which carried the water may be seen above the front of the storage tank.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

One of the most extensive road improvement programs in the state was carried on in Hamilton county under the CWA and work relief programs from October, 1932, through December, 1934. The work accomplished was of outstanding importance in point of benefits rendered the communities and the projects were well scattered, with the prime objective that of building efficiently as many miles of road as possible. Motorized county-owned equipment, therefore, was used almost entirely in the program.

Up to the close of 1934 improvements were made on 764 miles of roads, including both county and township roads and state highways. Of this amount 123 miles were graded and surfaced, 27 miles were surfaced, 180 were graded, and general improvements were made upon the remaining 506 miles. Ten large bridges and culverts and five small culverts were constructed. Streets were improved in Syracuse and Kendall. Next in importance to the road building program under the CWA was the flood control project at Syracuse. Work consisted of building a dike along the south side of a canal just north of the city. The dike will avert, to a certain extent at least, the flooding of streets and basements as has been the case after previous heavy rainfalls.

Sixteen garden ponds and seven farm ponds were completed under the water conservation program.

General improvements involved the repairing of 19 rooms in two schoolhouses and the improvement of two parks at Coolidge and Syracuse and three cemeteries at Coolidge, Syracuse, and Kendall.

Prior to the last few years, livestock raising was the important industry in this county, but later grasslands were plowed under to permit the extension of wheat acreage. Continued crop failures for the past three years, however, and the absence of extensive livestock have made it necessary for the citizens to obtain some type of employment in order to feed and clothe their families, the relief administration reports. Without any income from agricultural sources they have been obliged to rely on relief for subsistence. There are no business enterprises in the county which produce any material salary income. The outstanding accomplishment in this county, the administration believes, has been the support and maintenance given persons who were unable to care for themselves.

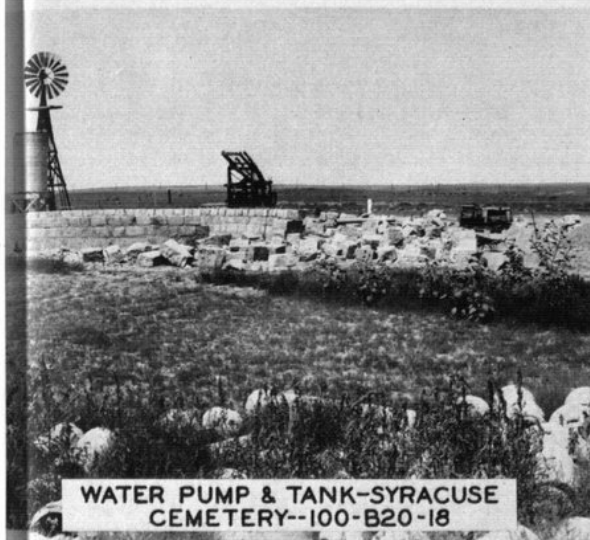

WATER PUMP AND TANK

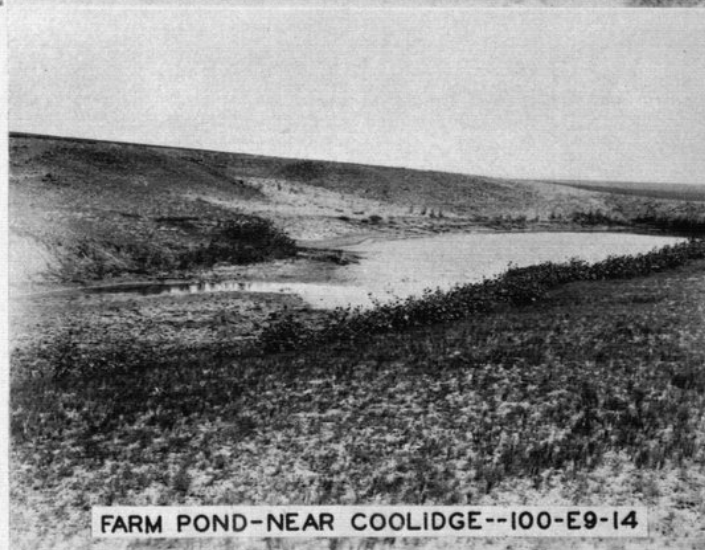
The water pump and storage tank (upper left) were constructed as a part of a project developed to provide water supplies in the cemetery at Syracuse. Relief laborers drilled the well, manufactured the well casing, constructed a stone reservoir for storing the water, and built a stone pump house. A windmill was installed to pump water from the well into the reservoir which was plastered inside to make it water tight. Other general improvements made in the cemetery included the sanding and graveling of all streets, alleys, and roads leading to and into the cemetery, and the construction of curbing inside the cemetery. The windmill, tank, and a part of the reservoir under construction are visible in the picture.

RELIEF FARM POND

This farm pond (center right) was constructed on a dry water course for a homestead rehabilitation client. Seven similar ponds were constructed in this county under the water conservation program during the summer of 1934, in addition to 16 garden ponds. The view is from the lower end of the pond looking toward the earth fill dam at the extreme right of the picture.

Other improvements provided for on the same project include shoulder and ditch alignment, building of fences, widening fills on roadbed, quarrying stone to be used in building the bridge and abutments and for riprap elsewhere, and replacing smaller culverts.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

The water conservation program, which was initiated in Harper county in July, 1934, made considerable progress during the remainder of the year. Notable accomplishments of permanent value include the construction of a city lake at Anthony (not completed in 1934), completion or near completion of 14 farm ponds, and the construction of six emergency wells.

Water conservation projects employed practically all of the work relief laborers toward the latter part of 1934, with the exception of those employed on county road projects. Projects for the improvement of roads, however, were carried out under the work and CWA programs, beginning in October, 1932, and continuing through December, 1934.

Road work consisted of surfacing with gravel and the building of bridges. All were small bridges, the longest having a 20-foot span, and a few wooden culverts were built. At the close of 1934 six miles of state highway and 50 miles of county and township roads had been improved, six bridges and large culverts constructed, and 45 small culverts built. Fifty blocks of streets were improved at Anthony and Harper.

Building and extending the waterworks system at the city of Harper was the most notable project under the CWA. Lines were extended to serve parts of the city which had never had a water system, and old mains were repaired. Nine hundred eighty-five feet of water main were laid and one water plant improved. Storm sewers to the extent of 607 feet were laid, eight blocks of sanitary sewer were cleaned, and 140 community sanitation units and 12 septic tanks installed.

Public buildings improved were the courthouse at Anthony and one schoolhouse. Outdoor improvements consisted of work on two parks, two playgrounds at Anthony and Attica, and one cemetery at Anthony.

The relief load in Harper county showed an increase in the fall of 1934 at the close of the harvest season. Farm labor has always been the main source of employment in the county with the exception of a few industrial plants. The flour mills at Anthony and Harper continued to operate in 1934 and furnished employment, but the salt plant at Anthony was closed down. Employment was considered temporary by county relief officials, however.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Construction of large bridges was considered the most outstanding project sponsored in Harvey county throughout the county work relief and the Civil Works Administration programs. During the period, October, 1932, through December, 1934, a total of 26 bridges and large culverts were constructed in locations where they were badly needed.

The building of a storm sewer in the northern part of Newton was considered one of the most meritorious accomplishments under Civil Works. The sewer, two and one-half miles in length, was three feet by nine feet, built of concrete with catch basins and manholes. Curbings and streets torn out to build the sewer also were replaced by CWA laborers.

Improvements made on roads consisted of the grading and surfacing of 14 miles of county and township roads, the surfacing of 35 miles, and the grading of 15 miles. Eighty-five small culverts were placed along the roads for drainage purposes. Seventy-five blocks of streets were improved in Newton, Halstead, Hesston, Burrton, and Sedgwick. Also at Newton one mile of water line was laid, 10 miles of sanitary sewer cleaned, and Sand creek was widened and the low places along the banks were diked. One-half mile of river improvement work was done as a flood control measure.

A good shelterhouse was erected and other general work was done on the Halstead park project. Workers landscaped the grounds around the swimming pool at Newton and placed markers along the city streets. Parks at Newton and Burrton also were improved and cemetery improvement work was done at Walton, Newton, Burrton, and Sedgwick.

Four schoolhouses and two other public buildings were either repaired or in some manner improved. Two water plants and sewage disposal plants were improved at Newton and Hesston, and 124 sanitation units were set up in various parts of the county. The sewing room at Newton produced 3,120 garments, either new or remade.

Problems and conditions affecting the relief situation and the community were discussed in weekly social forum luncheons, which were thought by county relief officials to create a better understanding of the purposes of the administration and to promote a better spirit of co-operation between the relief administration and the community.
