This item contains 4 bulletins published by the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee (KERC) and the Civil Works Administration (CWA) in Topeka, Kansas. The bulletin numbers are #127 (1924-1933), #289 (1934), #355 (1935), and #380 (1936). The year listed by the bulletin number is the year covered; though the bulletin generally had a publication date sometime the next year. Bulletin Number 127 covers a ten year period from 1924-1933. This report has an introduction, information on the KERC; special programs of the KERC; state statistical summaries; and 105 county reports. Bulletin 289 covers state organization; accomplishments under Work Relief and CWA, special programs in the state and county in 1934; case load and expenditures; state and county statistical summaries; 105 county reports; wage rates, labor relations, and complaints; economic conditions affecting relief load; grants and loans from State and Federal Agencies other than Relief; and maps and charts. Bulletin Number 355 covers the Relief Department, Accounting and Finance Department, Engineering Department; state and county statistical summary; 105 county statistical reports; relief obligations and case load, Homestead Rehabilitation Department; economic conditions affecting relief load; relief appropriations and relief laws; the coordination of public and private welfare service; grants and loans from federal state agencies other than relief. Bulletin Number 380 covers Legislation of 1936, social service development in 1936; case load and case work service and the cost of public assistance and administration; accounting procedures for funds, equipment, materials and commodities; production and distribution projects; Boards of County Commissioners and County Social Welfare Personnel; KERC publications, KERC Audit Reports, and KERC Personnel and Pay Rolls. Also, information on the State and Social Welfare Building, Trust Deed, and the Kansas Homestead Rehabilitation Corporation, State Charter and KHRC Audit Reports. Each of the first three bulletins has an index at the end.

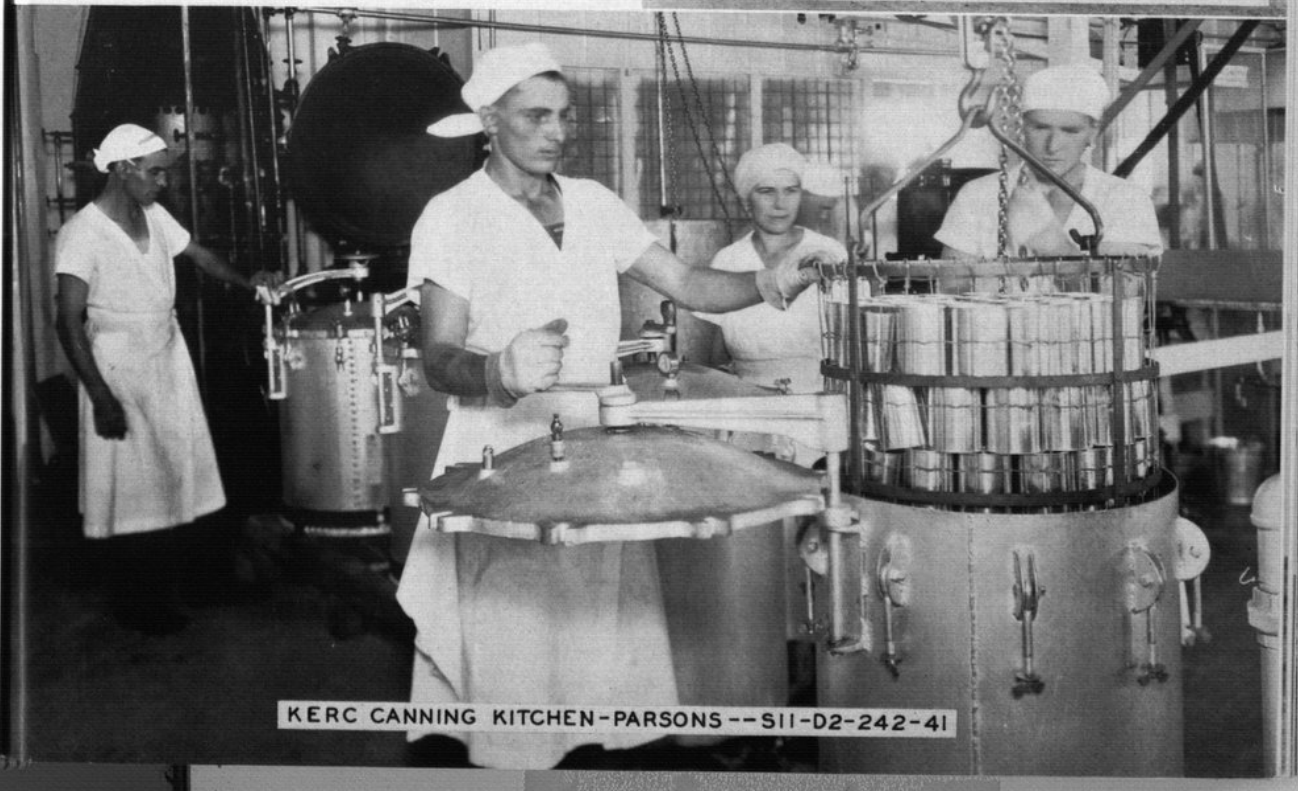

CANNING PLANT AT PARSONS

This Kansas Emergency Relief Committee canning plant (lower picture), which opened on August 1, was the first of nine plants developed in the state to can a portion of the drought stricken cattle obtained from Kansas farmers under the Drought Relief Service cattle purchase program. A total of 959,852 cans of beef and beef stew was processed at this plant during the year.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

School repair and road improvement projects were considered more advantageous to Lane county than any of the other projects undertaken under the CWA and county work relief programs because they accommodated and served the greater portion of the people all the time, the county relief administration reports, and at the same time furnished the greatest diversity of jobs possible for all classes of labor.

School renovation projects were numerous in this county. With the exception of installation of furnace equipment, seven school buildings in the county were modernized, and 11 other school buildings were overhauled and repaired and left in excellent condition.

Road and street work kept a large number of men employed. Between October 15, 1932, and the close of 1934, 51 miles of county and township roads were surfaced and 15 miles were graded. Also 82 blocks of city streets were surfaced chiefly in Dighton and Healy. Twenty small culverts were built as farm entrances on main traveled county and township roads, principally in the western half of the county.

In Dighton, five blocks of water main (not of the emergency type) were extended. No emergency wells were dug anywhere in the county, but six garden ponds were built and a total of 20 farm ponds was constructed. The general plan of water conservation engineers has been to locate farm and garden ponds where they were most needed and in as varied places as possible to raise the water table generally rather than only in one or two sections of the county.

Improvement work was done on the 40-acre Memorial cemetery near Dighton. The Lane county courthouse underwent improvement work and a library was repaired. Laborers also were kept busy for some time on the park and playground projects which involved one park and three playgrounds covering a total of 42 acres in Dighton and Healy.

Women work relief clients in the sewing rooms at Dighton and Healy made or remade approximately 50 garments during the year 1934. Women's work under the county work relief program consisted entirely of library work and sewing which assisted many women who were without means of support. It is considered to have helped them to keep their self-respect and financial standing in the community without resorting to direct relief.

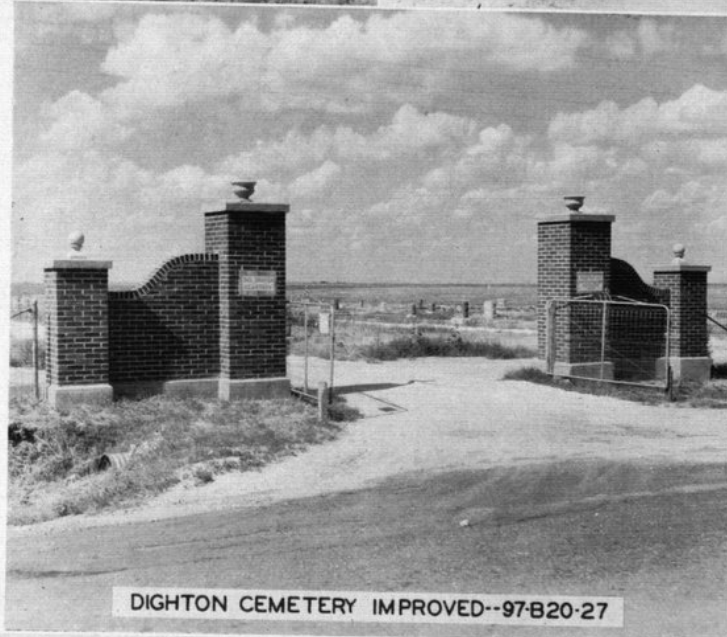

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

General outdoor improvements, including road work, were carried out to a great extent in Leavenworth county under the county work relief and CWA programs between October, 1932, and December, 1934. Approximately 44 miles of county and township roads were graded or surfaced or both, more than 16 blocks of streets and alleys in the City of Leavenworth were improved, three bridges and large culverts were built, and 25 small culverts placed. Street work also was done in Linwood, Tonganoxie, and Easton. Work consisted of grading, cutting down hills, making fills, building concrete culverts, and surfacing with gravel and crushed rock. Rock quarries were operated in connection with the road program.

An important flood control project was begun under the CWA on Three Mile creek, which runs through Leavenworth, in order to clean the channel and construct a retaining wall on each bank to prevent soil erosion during heavy rains.
Six parks, two cemeteries, and the airport in Leavenworth were improved under the county work relief program. Repairs on public buildings included inside and outside improvement of six schoolhouses, the county courthouse, and one water plant. One hundred eight community sanitation units were installed throughout the county. Two sewing rooms at Leavenworth provided work for women relief clients who turned out 1,616 garments; approximately 250 pillows were made on a feather project. The canning plant at Leavenworth processed approximately 250,000 cans of beef.
Under the water conservation program three garden ponds, four farm ponds, and three emergency wells were constructed; five emergency pumping plants were set up; and one and one-half miles of emergency water pipe laid.
The greatest single factor which affected the relief load in Leavenworth county was the drought in the agricultural area of the county, although several of the large industrial plants in Leavenworth were closed or operated with small forces, the local relief administration reports. Seasonal labor, however, re-employed a number of men in the summer months. The outstanding development of the public welfare service program, the county reports, was the close co-ordination of activities of all relief-giving agencies which enabled the community to provide more and better relief, devoid of duplication by the various agencies.

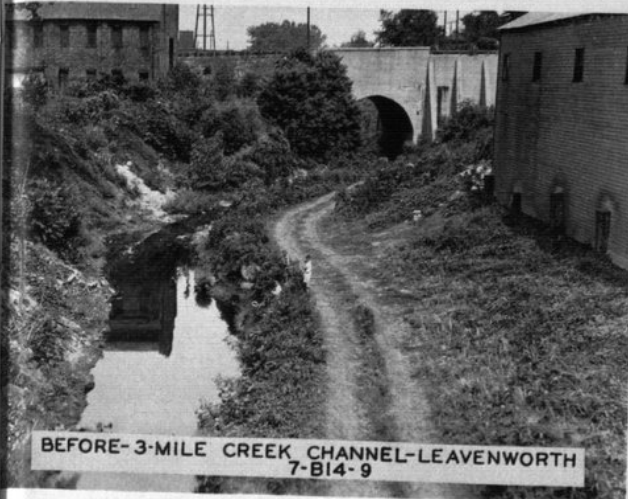

Approximately 35 relief clients worked on a flood control project on Three Mile creek which runs through Leavenworth. The creek channel (upper photographs) was cleaned, and a dry rock wall was constructed on each bank to prevent soil erosion. The channel is 35 feet wide at the base, and the walls were laid to make it much wider at the top. This project was about two-thirds complete when the CWA program closed and was completed by county work relief laborers.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

One of the most extensive bridge building programs in the state was developed in Lincoln county under the CWA and county work relief programs between October, 1932, and December, 1934. Fifty-four bridges and large culverts and 118 small culverts, built largely of native materials, had been constructed by the close of 1934. The structures were badly needed because no drainage facilities had previously been provided on many miles of roads. This type of work also reduced material costs and truck rentals. A limited number of small bridges were constructed under the CWA, but not until the close of this program did Lincoln county launch an extensive bridge and culvert building program.

Next in importance, and first in the number of men actually employed on the projects, was the road building program. Approximately 185 miles of roads and 114 blocks of city streets were improved. Under the CWA 95 blocks of streets in Sylvan Grove, Beverly, and Barnard were surfaced with gravel (work was done later on streets at Lincoln), and about 40 miles of roads were improved.

As water conservation measures 74 farm ponds and six emergency wells were started; construction work was about 50 per cent complete as the year closed.

Additional improvements were made on the courthouse, the city hall, one schoolhouse, a park, and a playground at Lincoln. One schoolhouse at Sylvan Grove and a rural school also were improved. Nearly two miles of water main were laid, two 80-foot wells were dug, and a water plant was improved at Lincoln. Sewing rooms located at Lincoln, Beverly, and Barnard produced a total of 93 garments and 100 comforters. A pest control project was approved in 1934 and 100 tons of poison mash prepared.

Case load increases during the year were due to complete crop failures. The only employment was furnished by a stone company which operated only part-time. The outstanding development in public welfare service, county relief authorities report, requiring skill and craftsmanship. The extensive bridge and culvert construction program was welcomed as a chance to remove the majority of the workers from purely pick-and-shovel jobs. Common laborers, masons, painters, carpenters, and other skilled workers were used.

BRIDGE-NE. OF LINCOLN --66-B5-2



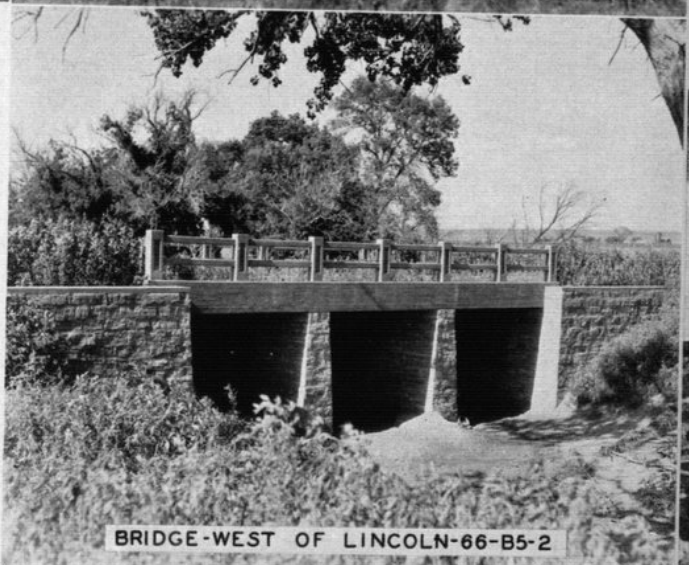

THREE LINCOLN COUNTY BRIDGES

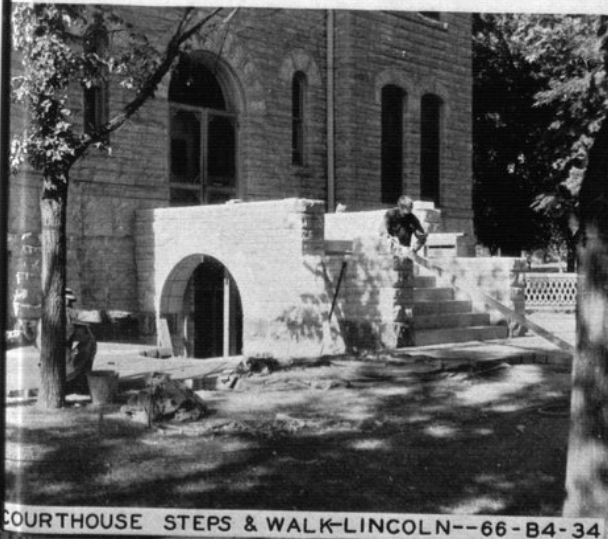
One of the most extensive bridge building programs in the state was launched in this county. Native stone suitable for bridge and building construction is abundant, and unskilled workers, under the supervision of skilled masons, had completed 54 bridges and large culverts and 118 small culverts by the close of 1934. Smith bridge, northeast of Lincoln (upper left), is a single arch stone structure. Right center, a triple box culvert with reinforced concrete floor system and stone piers and abutments; lower right, a double arch bridge built entirely of native stone laid by relief workers.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Linn county was quick to get work projects under way, and at the beginning of the relief program in October, 1932, projects were put through for the improvement of the bridges, culverts, roads, and other types for the betterment of the county. These same types of projects were continued more extensively under the CWA and also under the 1934 work relief program.

A city lake in Pleasanton furnished employment for most of the county laborers in November and December of 1934. When the ground was too frozen for the improvement of earth the men worked in the stone quarry which supplied riprap material for the dam. Baling of hay and straw was another means of furnishing work for clients. In the late summer and early fall approximately half the work relief laborers were busy doing this type of work.

Improvement of farm-to-market roads by grading and surfacing was regarded by Linn county officials as the most helpful of all projects. During the whole period, October, 1932, through December, 1934, three miles of state highway were graded and surfaced; 185 blocks of city streets were improved in Pleasanton, Mound City, LaCygne, and Blue Mound; 19 miles of county and township roads were both graded and surfaced, 68 miles were surfaced, and 13 miles were graded; four bridges and culverts were constructed and one small culvert placed.

Water shortages were somewhat eliminated by the 15 emergency pumping plants set up along the Marmaton river and other streams. Three emergency wells were dug and 11 farm ponds constructed. Besides augmenting water supplies, farm pond construction made it convenient for many farmers on relief to go only short distances for work rather than travel many miles to work on other projects.

Workers in LaCygne, Pleasanton, and Mound City improved cemeteries in their respective cities under Civil Works. Three rooms in the Pleasanton city hall were repaired. Women in the sewing room at Pleasanton produced 830 garments.

The county relief administration regarded the increased case load during 1934 as temporary and believed that with a good crop year most of the clients again would be self-sustaining. About one-third of the persons on relief rolls were farmers who were forced on relief in the fall because of the continued drought.

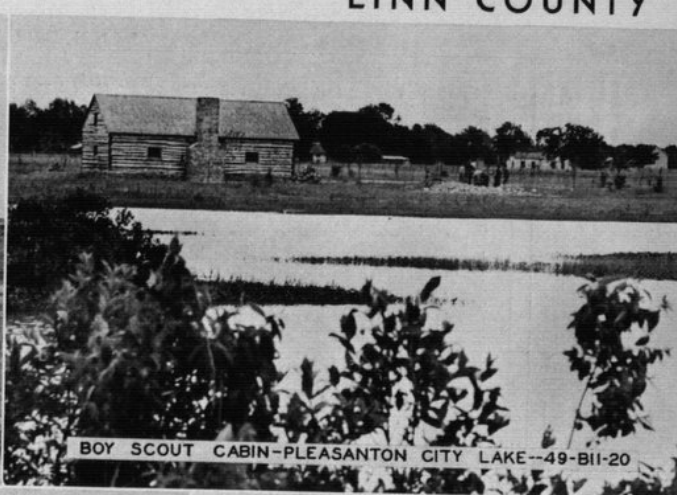

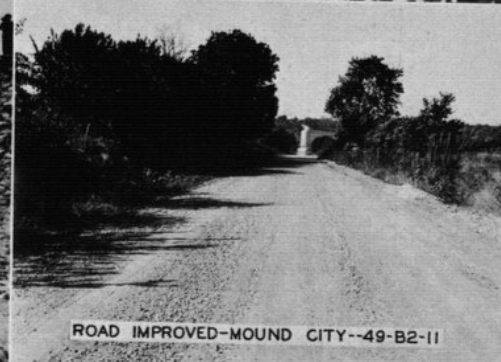

PLEASANTON LAKE SHELTER HOUSES

Landscaping and construction work, which ranks among the best of its kind, begun in connection with the major water conservation lakes, has been accomplished in the park area (110 acres) surrounding Pleasanton lake. The picture (upper left) shows a typical park shelter house; it was built of native stone and timber, and in design follows closely plans for shelter houses drawn up by Kansas Emergency Relief Committee draftsmen near the beginning of the water conservation program. At the upper right, a boy scout cabin, constructed of native logs, has been built to extend recreational facilities. The view is from the bank looking across the lower end of the lake.

LAKE SPILLWAY AND RIPRAP

Pictures (above and at the right) show actual construction work done on Pleasanton lake, which has a surface area of 25 acres and impounds 208.75 acre-feet of water. The spillway was constructed of reinforced concrete with stone riprap at each side. The picture at the right shows a large area of stone riprap on the dam which was laid to prevent wash action or erosion of the dam during periods of heavy rainfall.

IMPROVED ROAD AND FARM POND

This road (center right), located near Mound City, had just been surfaced with crushed stone when the picture was taken. More than 100 miles of roads in this county had been improved by the close of 1934. Particular efforts were made to improve farm-to-market roads.

The non-relief farm pond (lower right) is typical of 11 such ponds built to alleviate water shortages in this county during the summer of 1934.

WORK RELIEF AND CWA, OCTOBER, 1932, THROUGH DECEMBER, 1934

Work relief accomplishments in Logan county under the water conservation program, initiated in July, 1934, were among the most extensive in the state. At the close of the year, 55 emergency wells, located largely for the benefit of rural residents, had been drilled, and 48 garden ponds and 128 farm ponds had been or were being built. A small city lake was begun at Oakley at this time.

Farm ponds were valuable particularly in rural areas because they stored up water where it was most needed and because farmers could work at home or on neighboring farms without having to travel several miles to work. Besides construction of wells and ponds, work projects in Logan county included the building of roads, the placing of culverts, and improvements on public buildings and grounds.

Under the work relief and CWA programs, from October, 1932, through December, 1934, 70 miles of county and township roads were surfaced and eight additional miles were graded. The county graded and graveled 25 miles of roads connecting Russell Springs and Oakley with Scott City and the territory farther south, and with the state road system. The county also built three pile trestles on county and township roads. The cities of Oakley and Winona graded and graveled their streets, and Oakley used CWA funds to install two badly needed culverts. In all, six bridges and large culverts and three small culverts were built.

One schoolhouse was repaired, and a jail was built out of native stone as an addition to the county courthouse at Russell Springs. An electric light plant also was improved. Work was done on playgrounds at Winona, Monument, Russell Springs, and Page City, and on cemeteries at Winona, Oakley, and in Elkader township. An airport was constructed at Oakley under the CWA. Sewing rooms at Oakley, Winona, and Russell Springs produced 240 garments and 710 sheets.

The relief administration reports that conditions will not improve in the county until agricultural conditions and livestock raising improves. Many farm animals were unable to do hard work because of a lack of adequate grain and water in 1934. In the summer and fall all cattle possible were moved to good pastures.
