

## Kansas Board of Pharmacy reports

### Section 37, Pages 1081 - 1110

These reports, published by the Kansas Board of Pharmacy, may include the secretary's annual report to the governor, board proceedings, cases prosecuted, laws, rules and regulations, legal decisions, and lists of registered pharmacists, pharmacies, and assistants. Names are frequently listed alphabetically and by county. Some reports contain short sketches of deceased members. A fifth annual report is not known to exist. The fourth and sixth reports were both published in 1891. Gaps in publication or holdings exist in 1900; 1917-1934; 1936; 1939; 1941-1947; 1949-1954; 1956-1957; 1959-1966; 1968-1971; and post 1972. Funds to underwrite the digitization of these reports, Board of Pharmacy Examination questions (Item # 214023), and the Board of Pharmacy Rules and Regulations (Item #214924) were provided by the Jere Matchett Memorial Fund. This donation also funded the scanning of photographs of drug stores across Kansas to include them in Kansas Memory.

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dispenser. Any person procuring from any pharmacist articles enumerated in schedules A, B, and C, under fraudulent representations, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and be liable to a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 5. Any person who may desire a certificate as registered assistant pharmacist shall apply to the board of pharmacy for examination, and shall pay to the secretary of said board the sum of three dollars. If the board find that he has had two years' experience in a drug store or pharmacy, where physicians' prescriptions were compounded and dispensed, and is otherwise duly qualified, they shall duly register him, and issue him a certificate as a registered assistant pharmacist. In case of failure to pass a satisfactory examination, a second examination shall be granted him at any meeting of the board within six months without further payment. No registered assistant pharmacist shall open or conduct a pharmacy on his own account, or be granted a certificate as registered pharmacist until he has passed an examination as herein provided.

Section 6. Nothing in this act or in the act to which this is supplemental and amendatory shall be so construed as to prohibit the employment in any pharmacy of an apprentice for the purpose of being instructed in the practice of pharmacy, but such apprentice shall not be permitted to prepare and dispense physicians' prescriptions, or to sell or furnish poisons, except in the presence of a registered pharmacist, or a registered assistant pharmacist.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the state board of pharmacy to investigate all complaints of disregard, non-compliance with or violations of the provisions of this act, and the act to which this is supplemental and amendatory, and to bring all such cases to the notice of the county attorney of the county where such person is doing business, and it shall be the duty of such county attorney to diligently prosecute any such violation.

### CHAPTER 164.

Section 1. Any holder of a certificate of registration as a pharmacist or assistant pharmacist, heretofore issued under the provisions of section 6042, of the General Statutes of 1889, and remaining uncanceled shall be entitled to have such certificate annually renewed by registration by the secretary of the state board of pharmacy, on paying to said secretary an annual fee of



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one dollar. On the first day of July, each year, the secretary of the state board of pharmacy shall send written notice to this effect to every registered pharmacist and every registered assistant pharmacist, and shall inclose with such notice a proper blank for such registration, to be filled out and returned to the said secretary; and if said blank so filled out, together with the said fee of one dollar, shall not, on or before the first day of August of the same year, be received by said secretary from any pharmacist or assistant pharmacist so notified said secretary shall strike from the register the name of such pharmacist or assistant pharmacist; but at any time thereafter and previous to the first day of July of the next succeeding year, any pharmacist or assistant pharmacist, whose name shall have been so removed from the register, may have the same restored by the said secretary upon paying to him, within said period, a fee of five dollars. Any person who shall make any false statement to secure registration, or the continuance of his name on the register, under the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars; and the justice of the peace of the court before whom, or which, such conviction shall be had, shall immediately certify the fact to the secretary of the board of pharmacy, who upon receipt of such certificate, or in default thereof, upon satisfactory information of such conviction otherwise obtained, shall strike from the register the name of the person so convicted.

Section 2. If satisfied of the applicant's moral fitness and sobriety, the board of pharmacy may hereafter, without examination, register any graduate of a recognized school of pharmacy upon payment by such applicant of a registration fee of five dollars.

Section 3. That section 6044, of the General Statutes, be, and it is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 6044: Every registered pharmacist or assistant pharmacist who shall change his place of business shall, by letter, notify the secretary of the board of pharmacy of such change, and enclose a fee of fifty cents, and upon receipt of said notice and fee, the said secretary shall make the proper alteration in the register. Annually, during the month of September, the secretary of the board of pharmacy shall cause to be published, or shall print, a list of all persons whose names then rightfully remain on the register as pharmacists or assistant pharmacists, and shall mail a copy of





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such list to each and every registered pharmacist and assistant pharmacist in the state. Previous to the publication or printing of said list, the secretary shall first remove from the register the names of all pharmacists and assistant pharmacists who may have died, removed from the state, ceased to do business, or failed to re-register, or who shall have been convicted of making any false statement under this act, or who, for any other legal reason are no longer entitled to have their names remain upon the register.

#### CHAPTER 175.

Section 1. Any person, company, or corporation who shall sell, trade, or give to any other person, any morphine, cocaine, or chloral, except upon the prescription of a physician, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days, either or both, in the discretion of the court.

The following chapter from the Session Laws of 1907 is also given for the guidance and information of itinerant vendors of drugs and medicines:

#### CHAPTER 246.

##### Relating to Licenses of Itinerant Vendors of Drugs and Medicines.

An act to license itinerant vendors of drugs, medicines, nostrums, ointments, or appliances of any kind for the treatment of diseases, injuries, or bodily defects, and for the enforcement thereof, and further providing for the fees for licenses and the disposition thereof.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. Any itinerant vendor of any drug, medicine, nostrum, ointment or appliance of any kind for the treatment of any disease, injury, or bodily defect, and such itinerant vendors who publicly profess to treat or cure diseases, injury, or deformity of the human body, shall pay to the county clerk of the county in which he wishes to pursue his occupation, an annual fee of fifty dollars, upon receipt of which the county clerk shall issue a license for one year from its date, authorizing such itinerant to pursue his occupation within said county.

Section 2. Any intinerant vendor who shall pursue such occupation without first obtaining a license as aforesaid, or who shall



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upon demand of any sheriff, constable or householder of the county, refuse to produce his license and permit the same to be read, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars.

Section 3. All sums received by the county clerk for itinerant vendors' licenses shall be by him deposited with the county treasurer and converted into the general fund for the use of the county.

Section 4. Nothing contained in this act shall be deemed to conflict with or modify the provisions of section 1 of chapter 157 of the Session Laws of 1897.

Section 5. This act shall take effect and be in force on and after its publication in the statute books.

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#### RECOGNIZED SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

Following will be found the requirements for recognition of schools of pharmacy as adopted by the Kansas Board of Pharmacy:

1. The institution shall be incorporated as a college or school of pharmacy, or be a department of a regularly incorporated educational institution, or a department of a state university, or conducted by an incorporated pharmaceutical society.
2. The school or college shall have been in continuous operation for at least five years prior to the date of application for recognition.
3. The value of the apparatus and equipment belonging to such school or college shall be at least five thousand dollars.
4. The dean or presiding officer of the faculty must be a graduate in pharmacy, and a trained practical pharmacist.
5. The institution shall include in its courses of instruction oral lectures, personal laboratory work, recitation and reviews.
6. The requirements for admission of students to the school or college shall be (1,) a minimum age of 17; (2,) a common school education, entitling the student to enter a high school, or equivalent education.
7. The course of study given by the school or college shall consist of not less than two years of thirty-one weeks each, and at least two months intervening between the first and second year. In each week's work there must not be less than ten hours devoted to lectures and recitations, and not less than fifteen hours devoted to laboratory work.
8. Only such school will be recognized as maintain day sessions.
9. No time allowance is accorded the diplomas of doctors of medicine, dental surgery or veterinary medicine in lieu of the professional requirements for admission to the pharmacy licensing examination.



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#### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The following general policy has been adopted in registering pharmacists in Kansas:

All applicants for registration must be residents of Kansas.

##### Diplomas.

Graduates holding diplomas from recognized schools of pharmacy may be registered upon application and without examination on payment of a registration fee of five dollars.

##### Examination.

1. To be eligible to registration by examination the applicant must pass a satisfactory examination before a board. No certificate from any other pharmacy board entitles the holder to registration by the Kansas board.
2. Every person appearing for examination must have had four years' actual practice in pharmacy, if candidate for registration as pharmacist; or two years' experience, if an applicant for registration as assistant. An affidavit setting forth these facts must be filed by each applicant before the examination will be granted.
3. The preceding examinations are required.
4. The examination commences at 9 o'clock, a. m.
5. The examination fee for pharmacists is \$5, and for assistant pharmacists, \$3. In the event of failure to pass a satisfactory examination a second examination will be given without payment of further fees, if taken within six months.
6. The examinations are conducted in writing, are based upon the United States Pharmacopoeia of 1900, and other standard works named in section 4, chapter 174, page 2 of this report, and embrace pharmacy, materia medica, chemistry, and the identification of specimens consisting of crude drugs and chemicals.
7. Sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. are required to pass, of which not less than fifty per cent. must be made in each branch of the examination, viz: Pharmacy, materia medica, chemistry, and the identification of specimens, and the answers to the questions relating to each of them.





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8. The examinees are not allowed to converse with each other on subjects pertaining to the examination, nor in any way communicate by signs or otherwise, to assist each other. They are not allowed to leave the room without permission, and for not more than five minutes at a time, while engaged on any branch of work. One and one-half hours are given to the consideration of each of the branches of the examination. A violation of any of the rules will forfeit a certificate at that meeting.

9. The result of the examination will be made known to the examinees by mail, as soon as possible, and under no circumstances on the same day of the examination.

10. Certificates stating the percentage obtained by the examinees will be issued with notice of success or failure.

11. Temporary permits will be granted to the licentiates of other states by examination, who furnish evidence of good standing in such state at the time of filing such application, and whose applications for sufficient cause are made between the meetings of the board. The fee for this permit is \$1.50. The holder of such permit is expected to appear for examination the day following its expiration, and to return the permit.

12. It is not the duty of the secretary to inform candidates who fail to pass the cause of their failure; such information will however, be given in response to inquiry.

13. Duplicate certificates are issued only upon the return of the original, or upon the sworn statement that the original is lost or destroyed, and has not been given away or disposed of to some other person. The blank form of affidavit required will be furnished by application to the secretary. The fee for duplicate is \$1, and should accompany the affidavit.

14. Remittances should be made in currency, postoffice or express money orders, or drafts payable at Ellsworth, Kansas City, Chicago, St. Louis, or New York. Checks on country banks are not acceptable.

15. The renewal of certificates or re-registration of licentiates is required by law, and such renewal must be made during the month of July in each year, on the blank mailed from the secretary's office on the first day of July. The fee for renewal is \$1, and must accompany the notification of continuance in business. Failure to comply with this provision of the law will result in the erasure of the name of the pharmacist from the register.

16. Restoration may be made by the pharmacist whose name has been stricken from the register for non-renewal, by the pay-



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ment of a fee of \$5, and the presentation of an affidavit, to be furnished on application, to the secretary.

17. A pamphlet copy of the pharmacy laws will be furnished to applicants by mail on receipt of postage.

18. When complaint is made of violation of the law, always give the name and address of the party, and of the county attorney, and information of the kind of evidence that can be secured.

19. The members of the board, being sworn officers of the state, request their personal friends and others to abstain from giving letters of ability or testimonials of competency to the applicants for examination for registration, as such writing can have no influence on the conduct of the board.

20. All correspondence should be addressed to the secretary, W. E. Sherriff, Ellsworth, Kansas. Letters of inquiry should contain return postage.

21. Copies of questions are not kept for distribution.

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#### NOTES AND INFORMATION TO PHARMACISTS.

In order that everyone may become familiar with the requirements of the pharmacy law, the following rulings and interpretations of the law by the board of pharmacy have been printed, to which the special attention of every druggist in the state is called, and your assistance and co-operation in maintaining and enforcing the same is respectfully solicited by the board.

##### Who Has Charge of Your Store.

The very first requirement of the law is that every pharmacist or retail drug or chemical store shall be under the direct supervision of a REGISTERED PHARMACIST, who shall take charge of and manage the same.

##### Temporary Absence.

The board of pharmacy construes the words, "temporary absence," to mean that a registered pharmacist can only leave his store in charge of an assistant pharmacist when it is necessary for him to be absent on duties in connection with that business, not to exceed two or three days at a time; that he can go out to meals, be out for an afternoon or evening, but that he cannot go out on a vacation of two weeks, nor can he engage in any other business, and put in an hour or two at his store, unless he has in his employ a registered pharmacist who is in charge of the store. The expressed intention of the pharmacy law is to keep every drug store or pharmacy under the immediate charge and supervision of a registered pharmacist during all the time the drug store or pharmacy is open for business.

##### Assistants or Apprentices.

Assistants may only sell medicines, poisons, or put up prescription when working directly under the supervision of a registered pharmacist.

##### Display of Certificates.

Every certificate must be kept conspicuously displayed in the store in which the holder of the same is engaged.

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#### Dealers.

Dealers, other than pharmacists, cannot sell drugs, poisons, medicines, or chemicals for medicinal use.

#### Forwarding Certificates.

Certificates or diplomas are forwarded by mail, but if so desired, they can be sent by registered mail or express on payment of charges.

#### Copies of Questions

Sets of questions are not kept for distribution, and cannot under any circumstances leave the hands of the members of the board.

#### Ownership.

Any person or firm may own a drug store, but there must be a registered pharmacist in charge.

#### Application Blanks.

Application blanks are furnished by the secretary. When filled out, they must be sworn to before a notary public, and returned to the secretary with the fee.

#### Change of Address.

If you change your address at any time during the year, please notify this office at once in order that we may change our registration books accordingly, and that mail from this office may reach you promptly.

#### Deaths.

Please notify this office of the death of any registered pharmacist or assistant pharmacist occurring within your knowledge during the year, giving the date thereof, if possible.

#### Complaints.

During the past year the board has received a number of complaints in regard to violations of the pharmacy law, all of which were accorded prompt action.

It is the earnest desire of the board that all infringement of the law be at once brought to the attention of the secretary, especial care being taken that the complaint is filed in proper form, as it is obviously impossible for the board to expend the public funds in investigating vague or trivial charges.



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The following data is necessary to justify the board in taking up a complaint.

1. Name of proprietor or firm.
2. Name of business, city or town, street number.
3. Who sold the poison or compounded the prescription?
4. Name the article sold. Sample should be marked and retained by the purchaser.
5. Date and time of day of purchase.
6. Who was in the store and witnessed the purchase?

Complaints made in proper form will receive immediate and impartial attention, and the board wishes at this time to emphasize the fact that to fully enforce the requirements of the law it needs the co-operation and assistance of all good citizens and especially of the registered pharmacists, who should render all possible aid in upholding the board in its work.

The statute provides that certain domestic remedies and medicines may be sold by dealers in rural districts, provided such dealers in rural districts first obtain a license from the State Board of Pharmacy empowering them to make such sales.

The secretary desires to offer the thanks of the board to the following leading pharmaceutical journals:

Western Druggist, National Druggist, Meyer Bros.' Druggist, Merck's Report, The Druggist Record, The Druggist Circular, The Practical Druggist, The American Druggist, The Rocky Mountain Druggist, The Drug Clerk's Journal, The Pharmaceutical Era, and Northwestern Druggist.

Every druggist in the state should join the American Pharmaceutical association and the Kansas Pharmaceutical association.

Look through the roll of registered pharmacists and see that your name and address is correctly printed. If not, advise the secretary. Also advise him of anyone engaged in the drug business whose name is not on the list.

The secretary is not in the druggists' exchange business. However, he as a rule has a list of applicants on hand wanting positions. Also a list of druggists wanting clerks, and will be glad to answer all communications promptly at all times. All those apply should be as explicit as possible. Those wanting positions, state age, if registered, number of years' experience, previous employer, etc.

All communications addressed to the secretary will be answered promptly on the day same are received.



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#### Rules for Dispensing Poisons.

It shall be unlawful for any person to sell at retail any poison enumerated in the following list, except as follows: Articles shall not be sold without distinctly labeling the box, vessel, or paper in which said poison is contained, and also the outside wrapper or cover, with the name of the article, the word "Poison", and the name and place of business of the seller. It shall be unlawful for any proprietor, or owner of any drug store or pharmacy, or any registered pharmacist to sell or deliver any article included in the schedule, without before delivering the same to the purchaser, causing an entry to be made in a book kept for that purpose, stating the date of sale, the article sold, the quantity thereof, the purpose for which it is represented by the purchaser to be required, the name of the dispenser, and the name and address of the purchaser signed by himself. Such book to be always open for inspection by the proper authorities and to be preserved for at least five years:

Arsenite lead, arsenic, acid nitric, acid sulphuric, acid muriatic, acid oxalic, acid carbolic, aconite, all fly poisons, bed bug poison, bichromate potash, black hellebore, blue vitriol, butter of antimony, biniodide of mercury, belladonna, codein, caustic potash, caustic soda, chloroform, cobalt, corrosive sublimate, creosote, croton oil, cyanide potash, cantharides, carbon disulphide, colchicum, conium, denatured alcohol, digitalis, Fowler's solution, formaldehyde, hydrocyanic acid, henbane, lysol, London purple, mercury and all preparations, nitrate silver, nux vomica, opium, oil bitter almonds, oil cedar, Paris green, phosphorus, prussic acid, prussiate potash, all rat poisons, red precipitate, strychnia, sugar of lead, sulphate of zinc, tincture aconite, tincture belladonna, tincture cantharides, tincture cannabis indica, tincture digitalis, tincture hyoscyamus, tincture iodine, tincture nux vomica, tincture opium, tincture verat veride, white hellebore, white precipitate, wine antimony, wood alcohol, and all other virulent poisons.



### KANSAS STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY.

#### REPORT.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Kansas State Pharmaceutical Association:

I have the honor to submit herewith a brief report of the business affairs of the State Board of Pharmacy for the past year.

The quarterly meetings of our board, which are required by law, were held as follows:

The first in Salina, May 26 and 27, 1910. There were forty applicants in attendance for examination for registration, and of this number fifteen were successful, and received certificates as registered pharmacists.

To fill expiring terms, two new members of this association received appointments to the board—W. S. Henrion, of Wichita, and W. S. Dick, of Lawrence. The board was organized with the following officers: M. W. Friedenberg, president; W. E. Sheriff, secretary; W. W. Naylor, treasurer. W. S. Henrion and W. S. Dick were appointed as a finance committee.

The second meeting was held in Beloit, August 24 and 25, with thirty-five applicants for examination. Of this number only seven passed satisfactory examinations for registered pharmacists, and two for registered assistants, the smallest proportion for many meetings.

The third quarterly meeting was held in Pittsburg, November 15 and 16. We had thirty-eight applicants at this meeting, and nineteen of those examined received requisite grades to entitle them to certificates of registration. We were favored at this meeting with an interesting address by Prof. L. E. Sayre, dean of the school of pharmacy at the Kansas State University, who is well known to all of you. Although the address had not been advertised well enough to attract a large audience, it was well received and highly appreciated. It is to be hoped that something of this nature can be made a regular feature of our quarterly examinations.

The fourth quarterly meeting was held in Wichita, February 14 and 15, with a good class of sixty-nine in attendance, twenty-nine of these making satisfactory grades to receive certificates.



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In addition to these regular meetings there were held, January 2 and 9, two special meetings of the board in Topeka in conference with the State Board of Health and the executive committee of your honorable association for the purpose of formulating amendments and new laws to be urged for passage by the last legislature. You were all duly advised of the result of our deliberations, and you doubtless, also, know the fate of the proposed legislation.

Our board has also held an informal conference with the attorney general regarding certain features of our pharmacy laws. For some time past we have been endeavoring to draw more closely the restrictions of our pharmacy laws covering the sale of medicines of every nature by other than registered pharmacists. The present laws are not explicit in a great many particulars, and allow considerable latitude for different interpretations and applications.

We want these features more clearly defined, and for this reason felt the need of conference with the legal department of our state government, the result of which was highly satisfactory.

If you have conditions in your home town or community which you feel are not strictly in accord with the spirit or letter of our pharmacy laws, send in a report, and let us handle the case.

Again we have occasion to express satisfaction with the amount and character of inspection work that has been accomplished since our last meeting. We have been fortunate in securing a man for this work who has given the most painstaking and thorough service ever had. In addition to this, we have been particularly fortunate in having two members of our board, Mr. Henrion and Mr. Naylor, who have been able to devote a great deal of time to this work in their own parts of the state, and the influence of their work must certainly be felt for the good of the profession.

Our regular inspector has been compelled to confine his work to the southeastern quarter of the state so far, but long before another year rolls round expect him to have visited every town and village in the state. We also expect you to aid him in every way possible in his work.

One year ago we reported the number of registered pharmacists in good standing as 1889. At the present time there are 1876, this being the second time that our report has shown a decrease, which fact is eloquent with reminders that many of the old guard are passing away, or are become too old to labor,





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and that new pharmacists do not appear fast enough to take their places.

The registered assistants now number 28, as against 32 last year. Last August 133 pharmacists were stricken from the register. This is the largest number yet recorded. One was taken from the register for violation of the pharmacy laws.

Owing mainly to the diligence of our three workers in the field, the number of licensed merchants is larger than ever before, the number being 594.

The total number of applicants for registration examined at our quarterly meetings was 182, while last year we examined 190. Successful applicants for registered pharmacists numbered 70, as compared with 89, and 2 assistants as compared with 4, for the preceeding year.

#### SPECIAL MEETING.

Topeka, January 2, 1911.

The board met in session with the State Board of Health and the executive committee of the Kansas Pharmaceutical association for the purpose of discussing what laws the legislature should be asked to pass for the betterment of Kansas druggists. The entire day was taken up formulating such an act as was wanted.

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#### SPECIAL MEETING.

Topeka, January 9, 1911.

The board again met with the State Board of Health and the executive committee of the Kansas Pharmaceutical association. Members of the board present: W. S. Dick, and W. E. Sherriff. The other members of the board were unable to arrive on time on account of lateness of the trains.

The following amendments to the pharmacy laws were adopted, and the executive committee of the State Pharmaceutical association asked to present the same to the legislature, and ask for passage of same:

*An act to amend sections 8104 and 8105 of the General Statutes of Kansas for the year 1909, being an act regulating the practice of pharmacy. .*

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas*

Section 1. That section 8104 of the General Statutes of the state of Kansas, for the year 1909, be, and the same is, hereby amended so as to read as follows:





### KANSAS STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY.

Section 8104. It shall be unlawful for any person who is not a registered pharmacist to retail any medicinal preparation containing alcohol or acid, or dispense and compound any medicines or poisons, except a medical practitioner, not a registered pharmacist, may, in cases of urgent necessity, administer such articles as he may deem fit and proper. And it is also further provided that, in rural districts, where there is no registered pharmacist within five miles, it shall be lawful for retail dealers, in case they procure a license from the Board of Pharmacy at a fee of ten dollars annually, to sell the usual domestic remedies and medicines in unbroken package, not including any article enumerated in schedules A and B of this act. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars, and not more than one hundred dollars for each such offense.

Section 2. That section 8105 of the General Statutes of the State of Kansas for the year 1909, be, and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows:

Section 8105. Pharmacists registered as herein provided shall have the right to keep and sell under such restrictions as herein provided, all medicines and poisons authorized by the National American or United States Pharmacopoeia, as of recognized medicinal utility. Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to shield any apothecary or pharmacist who violates or in anywise abuses this trust for the legitimate and actual necessities of medicines, from the utmost rigor of the law relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors; and upon the conviction of any violation of the prohibitory law, his name shall be stricken from the register. It shall be unlawful for any person on and after the passage of this act, to retail any articles enumerated in schedules A, B, and C, except as follows:

### SCHEDULE A.

Arsenic, and its preparations, corrosive sublimate, white precipitate, red precipitate, biniodide of mercury, cyanide

of potassium, hydro-cynic acid, chloroform, strychnine, morphine, and all other poisonous vegetable alkaloids and their salts, essential oil of bitter almonds, opium and its preparation, except paregoric and other preparations of opium containing less than two grains to the ounce.

#### SCHEDULE B.

Aconite, belladonna, colthium, conium, nux vomica, henbane, cantharides, creosote, digitalis and their pharmaceutical preparations, croton oil, chloral hydrate, sulphate of zinc, sugar of lead, mineral oils, carbolic acid, oxalic acid, permanganate of potassium, formaldehyde, Paris green, London purple, and wood alcohol, denatured alcohol, and all other virulent poisons.

#### SCHEDULE C.

Oil of savin, oil of tansy, ergot and its preparations, cotton root and its preparations and all other active emenagogues, or abortives. Articles enumerated in schedule A and B shall not be sold without distinctly labeling the box, vessel or paper in which said poison is contained, and also the outside wrapper or cover, with the name of the article, the word "poison", and the name and place of business of the seller. Nor shall it be lawful for any person to sell or deliver any poison enumerated in schedules A and B, unless upon due inquiry it be found that the purchaser is aware of its poisonous character, and represents that it is to be used for a legitimate purpose; nor shall it be lawful for any proprietor or owner of any drug store or pharmacy, or any registered pharmacist to sell or deliver any articles included in schedules A and B without, before delivering the same to the purchaser, causing an entry to be made in a book kept for that purpose, stating the date of sale, the article sold, the quantity thereof, the purpose for which it is represented by the purchaser to be required, the name of the dispenser, and the name and address of the purchaser, signed by himself; such book to be always open for inspection by the proper authorities, and to be preserved for at least five years. No article enumerated in schedule C shall
