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

Honorable Robert Fechner, Director, Civilian Conservation Camps, Washington, D. C.

My dear Mr. Fechner:

Governor Landon, of Kansas, is writing you suggesting that several hundred of the young men from this state who are now serving in Civilian conservation Camps in other states be transferred back to Kansas for employment during the coming winter in the construction of a lake which it is hoped may be built on the Military Reservation at Fort Riley. I should like to join in that suggestion and express the hope that favorable action may be taken on it.

Application for the construction of the lake is being presented to the appropriate authorities of the War Department. It is believed that the construction will be authorized. A large lake can be constructed at Fort Riley at a very minimum of cost by using men from the Conservation Camps, a s the government owns the land and there are ample barracks and other facilities at the Fort to house some 600 additional men.

Fort Riley offers an ideal site for a large lake and it would prove beneficial to the entire surrounding country. Furthermore, the construction of it would afford employment for several months to a very considerable number of men who need work and would fit admirably into the President's unemployment program. I hope you can authorize the use of these men on this project.

Mr. Robert Fechner, Director Emergency Conservation Work Washington, D. C.

Dear Mr. Fechner:

In the event that a second enrollment period is authorized for the Civilian Conservation Corps, I desire that the following additional projects be undertaken in Kansas this winter.

Three camps within the Fort Riley Military Reservation. Two of these will undertake construction of a large reservoir having tactical value, and approval from this viewpoint by the Commander at Fort Riley, as well as value for storing flood water in the Kansas River. Public recreation is also involved. The third camp will do erosion and flood control work on the Kansas River and its tributaries within the reservation, and will also undertake considerable tree planting and forest land-scaping.

One camp at Scott City. This project contemplates the restoration and enlargement of a dam recently destroyed by floods. Land involved aggregates 1280 acres now in state ownership, and project is essentially flood control.

Ten camps at various points in the state to undertake new reservoir and lake construction. The State Forestry, Fish and Game Commission has a large number of projects programmed which involve the acquisition by purchase or donation of privately owned lands in key drainage locations and their development for public purposes.

All of these proposed camps are figured on the basis of 200 men per camp.

The program contemplated involves 14 entirely new camps. There are six camps now operating in the state which can be continued throughout the winter without difficult, thus making a grand total of twenty camps or projects planned.

Preliminary estimates on each project are now in course of preparation, and detailed reports will be submitted whenever you are ready for them.

Trusting that these may receive your favorable consideration, and assuring you of my personal interest in this conservation work, I am

You know something, in a general way, about what the conditions are in this part of the state with the general depression, cyclone, and the protracted drouth which has put us in a condition with no crops of any kind and very little money. As a result, anything that can be done which will put any outside money into this community will be a great help. I have in mind a new federal building as a post office for Liberal. For years we have been trying to get this, but, for some reason or other, we have been put off and put off until it seems as though they have entirely forgotten us. Occupying the position that Liberal does in this great Southwest as a center of trade territory, and being inhabited by the best people on earth whose indomitable frontier spirit is about all they have left. should entitle it to some favors from the Federal Government. It occurs to me that this is the psychological time for such an appropriation, as our present facilities are not in keeping with the town and its inhabitants. Then again, it will make several thousand dollars available for material and labor at a time when both are sorely needed and will help more at this time than any other.



Dear Governor:

I am writing you asking that you use your influence in securing a Federal Building for Liberal, Kansas at this time.

The postoffice here in Liberal has been inadequate for a good many years as the business transacted by this postoffice is quite in excess of the average amount of business out of a town of this size. Liberal is on the approved list for a new Federal Building and a site could be purchased at a very reasonable figure at this time, also the building material could be purchased at a lower figure now than it can perhaps in many years to come.

Liberal was visited by a tornado early this spring which did considerable damage to our city and many people are out of homes and are being cared for by the county, the Red Cross and by Federal Aid; this condition, together with the drought this part of the country has suffered this year, has put many people in need of financial aid; at present there are 1800 people receiving aid; if we could have the Federal Building built at this time many of these people could have employment for a time at least and thus relieve this terrible expense.

Your influence in this matter will mean a great deal to us and we will be very grateful to you for your support.



Will you kindly use your efforts and influence with the department to assist us in realizing upon our efforts to secure this recognition from the Government?







I am returning Mr. Merriam's and Mr. Bone's letters herewith.





My dear Governor Landon:

A Mr Chapson of Alamosa, Colorado, deeded enough property to Highland College to build a Memorial library building, retaining a life interest in it. Mr Chapson is eighty years of age.

After our conversation yesterday on the phone the thing came to me that funds might become available through the R.F.C. to put up this building using, if necessary, Mr Chapson's property as security for the loan. I therefore put in an application for \$25,000 for a new library building. Mr Chapson's property is ample to cover such a loan. Considering Mr Chapson's health it is quite improbable that he will be "on this side" for even ten years.

As you may know Highland College was made an orphan by the Presbyterian Church thirteen years ago. We have been making our own way, which is no easy task in times like these. We have stuck to it because the College is needed here in this part of Kansas. Not until the school laws of Kansas are revised can there be junior college privileges, other than Highland offers, for the young folks of this corner of Kansas. Anything done for Highland College is for the public good. If there is a chance that this may get through it will be a boon for these four or five counties. I thank you for calling.

I think it undoubtedly would be possible for you to secure a contribution from the public works program to the extent of thirty per cent of the cost of your proposed building. These plans and specifications should be submitted to the Kansas board named by the President to approve of these projects. The members of this board are:

I think the sidewalks could undoubtedly be included in this program, and I am sure you can secure help to the extent of thirty per cent from the Public Works program of the National Industrial Recovery Act.



It was thought this might be included under the same head as paving in other towns.





I appreciate your kind letter of the $6\,\mathrm{th}$ which came to my office during an absence from the city.
