

Pres. Fra nklin D. Roosevelt

May I earnestly solicit your administration support in the House of Representatives for the Johnson bill, which gives to each state a better control over its own utility problems Stop It is the most constructive piece of utility legislation in my judgment, which has been offered in the last decade Stop The theory of rate regulation by state consissions has been made a mockery by the delays, evasions and general obstructive tectics permitted in the lower federal courts Stop The present procedure has come to be looked upon by the public as amounting to a distinct prejudice against the state findings. Stop By their being all too ready to grant restraining orders and injunctions cases have been kept in court for years, without final determination on their merits Stop The Johnson bill terminates this evil without donying any parties right of appeal for final adjudication on the sols question that should be considered that of confiscation of property Stop Certainly our state Suprese Courts and the United States Suprese Court may be trusted to consider these questions without equity and with justice and to protect property rights as well as public rights. The various state commissions have been haspered in accomplishing the useful purpose for which they were created by reason of the almost scendalous interference of the lower federal courts Stop The Johnson bill offers a specific remedy for this intolerable situation Stop I am urging our Kansas delegation to give full support to the measure.

I am enclosing copy of my telegram to the President, sent last evening, urging his support of this measure. I have also written all members of the Kansas delegation in the House of Representatives.



Accordingly we would appreciate it very much, if under your rules and practice you can and will return to us our correspondence with you regarding the above matter.



Dear Governor Landon:

Receipt is acknowledged of telegram of October 15, signed by you, Mr. J.R. Mercer, Secretary, Kansas Livestock Association, and Harry H. Umberger, Drought Relief Administrator, addressed to Mr. Davis, which has been referred to me for reply since Mr. Davis is out of the city.

The fact that the money appropriated for emergency cattle purchases has been nearly all exhausted has necessitated the discontinuation of cattle buying in a number of the emergency drought states and a drastic curtailment of buying operations in the few states in which cattle purchases are still being made.

In consideration of the serious situation that we know exists in Kansas, that state has been allocated an additional cattle purchase quota of approximately 50,000 head, within which quota purchases may be made up to November 15.

Mr. Harry Reed of this office is now making an investigation of the livestock and feed situation in the Southwestern States including Kansas, and upon Mr. Reed's return to Washington we expect to proceed with plans for feed utilization and distribution. Mr. Reed expected to confer with Mr. Umberger and Mr. Mercer while in Kansas relative to the situation in that state.

While cattle purchases will be terminated when the quota now authorized is exhausted, we expect to proceed with plans for feed utilization on the basis of the recommendations of the men in the Southwestern States as reported by Mr. Reed.

I am enclosing petition signed by a few farmers of our county showing the destressed cattle we have here. The total number of head shown on these petitions is 5807 and we do not have all of the farmers of the county. But only what some of the boys could get signed up from some of the townships. However this is enough to give you an idea of the seriousness which confronts our county. We should have a quoto of at least 8,000 head of cattle for government purchase in this county to be at all eased up from this destressed condition. I have a letter this morning from Mr. Umberger who has said Sheridan county has been allotted \$10500.00 additional. This is less than 1/10 the amount needed.
