Dear Senator Capper:

I have your telegram of the 13th, and note that you had a very satisfactory conference with Under-Secretary Tugwell.

Assistant Sakretary Wilson phoned Bob Laubengayer Friday that he would be in here this morning, and I am leaving with him, Dean Umberger, Dr. Grimes and Prof. Throckmorton of the college today. At Garden City tomorrow there is a conference of technical men from five states. This conference has been kept quiet, but I have no doubt but that the story will break on it tomorrow.


Our situation has grown very much worse. In my first conference at the college about March 10th it was estimated that it would be necessary to list 2,500,000 acres of land. That was the estimate when I left for Washington on March 22nd. Dean Umberger told me Saturday it would now probably be necessary to list 6,000,000 acres. There was another bad storm yesterday. I don't know the answer. Certainly I am inclined to feel that the size of the problem has outgrown our original application. I hope we shall have some better idea after this meeting at Garden City tomorrow, and will advise you promptly.

We do not have any printed copies of the law dealing with this subject passed by the recent session of the legislature, and will not have them until the statutes are published probably the latter part of June. However, I am herewith inclosing a pamphlet which contains a copy of the bill under which the county commissioners operate in preventing soil blowing, and also contained in the same pamphlet are instructions sent out from the attorney general's office to county commissioners and county clerks.

Senate Bill No. 39, mentioned in the marked paragraph in this pemphlet is just the same as section 19-2611 R. S. 1933 Supplement, copied into this pamphlet, except that Senate Bill No. 39 makes the law applicable to all counties in the state instead of just to counties with less than 15,000 population.





Dear Governor:

Have just sent you a telegram, as follows;

"Thousands of Acres or land being blown today. Delay in getting funds on loan or or grant for wind erosion prevention program will mean irreparable loss".

We are sending this telegram on behalf of the people in the vacinity of Plains in Meade and Seward Counties. We realize that you are doing all that you can to put this program over and thought that something of this kind would help you out.

The air is so filled with fine dust during these storms that it is almost unbearable. It is a wonder that there is not more sickness than there is. A large per cent of our wheat immediately around Plains is still holding and has a chance of making some wheat but we have to go only a short distance west of here, 8 to ten miles until we get to where it is all blown out.

Some of the ground in Western Kansas is so dry that listing is not going to stop the blowing because a lister will not go into the hard crust and put the clods on top. Where the ground is wet enough so that it can be listed pretty deep, and it is listed pretty solid, it can be handled.

Thanks for telegram advising of administration's attitude attitude on wind erosion problem stop It should be emphasized that this is not a western Kansas problem alone stop It involves an area embracing at least parts of the following states: Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Colorado stop We would still have dust menacing health conditions over central western United States even though we check our wind erosion in Kansas unless this problem is solved as a whole stop It is too big for the individual, a county, or one state alone to solve without assistance and the cooperation which can be obtained only through the federal government as the agency which steps in when you have an interstate problem stop Even if we had a good general rain it would not solve the problem stop It will assist of course and make the work that must be done easier stop The Immediate emergency can be met only by the listing and the planting of row crops stop Again let me emphasize that this is not the problem of a single state.

Wallace's Help Asked Dr. Farrell Explains the Kansas Soil Situation

Manhattan, Kas., March 20-Assistance of Secretary Wallace in seeing that FERA administrators are permitted to allot funds for the purchase of gasoline and oil in an emergency soil erosion control program was asked in a telegram sent late today by F. D. Farrell, president of Kansas State College.

Farrell's wire described the soil blowing situation in Kansas and "adjacent states north, south and west" as extremely serious, and said that a program to check erosion by extensive use of lister furrows is being undertaken.

"This program is retarded by fact that many landowners in the area are unable financially to purchase necessary gasoline and oil for operating listers." Farrell wired. "Large numbers of these landowners are on relief. It

"But to be effective, the lister strips must be made as nearly simultaneously as practicable on a large number of fields in a district where soil blowing is widespread.

"While the lister is being used effectively right now by many farmers in Western Kansas, every farm where soil blowing continues unchecked menaces neighboring farms.

"Land in the region now being damaged belongs to persons in varying circumstances. Some are able and willing to make use of the lister. Others who are willing are unable to purchase gasoline and oil for tractors or feed for work stock. Many of these persons are on relief. Much of the land is operated by non-residents who normally do not see their farms regularly. Many of these farms are blowing.

"This organization work is progressing, and efforts are

"This organization work is progressing, and efforts are being made to obtain authorization for allotment of FERA funds for purchase of gasoline and oil where necessary."

The lister method of control will not be effective on sandy soil, which has started to blow because of extreme dryness, but this type of soil is limited compared to the whole affected

It was recalled here that extensive blowing took place in Thomas County in 1912, which was checked by the lister control method.

Wind erosion is much easier to prevent than to control after it has once started, said R. I. Throckmorton, head of the agronomy department at Kansas State college. Disc plows are of little or no value as they do not make the soil turned up sufficiently rough to stop blowing. Implements such as the mold board plow, lister, spring tooth harrow, duck foot cultivator and lister equipped with chisel points roughen the soil surface and leave clods and coarse material on the surface.

lest summer salter Pitkin, of Columbia University, a typical "Brain Truster", was reported by the Assoicated Press to have made the following atatement:

The people of Renses and Nebraska are making a terrible mistake by staying where they are. Federal relief among the farmers of the middle est is amounting to more than a billion dollars and won't help the farmers in the long run. The farmers must organize, in groups of loo and look families, and ride the covered wagons to more fortile lands, the Carolinas would be a good place, then let the drought land be what it used to be, just an open range country for cattle and sheep."

Such erroneous and falsifying statements should be stopped, as they are doing this country great harm and anage. Congress can certainly stop it on the part of government employees.

The statement of R. M. Bennett, that 800,000 eares of Kenses land has been destroyed by dust storms is an absolute falsehood. I am confident that not 100 eares of land in the whole state of Kansas have been destroyed. We could lose two or three feet of our top soil by wind erosion, and the soli left would be much more productive than millions of acres of virgin soil in some of the eastern and southern states.

I have lived in Carden City for 30 years, and I know that 25 or 30 years ago, there was more disastrous soil erosion from sind, in this county than there has been during the last two or three years; yet during the last 25 years there has been a marvalous development here, and great wealth has been added.

Just why those eastern "bran Trusters" who have no practical knowledge of this mestern country, want to destroy it is beyond comprehension. Instead of trying to induce the Covernment to spend millions of dellars in buying up what they call marginal, or sub-marginal land, they could more misely recommend spending this money on such projects as the proposed Caddon Dam. This project, if installed, would assist in flood control, and would furnish water to irrigate thousands of seres of the richest lend in the United States, where fundators of families could be located on from 10 to 40 acres and make a comfortable living, and thus help to solve the unemployment proposition.

RESOLUTION

meeting at Garden City this date to discuss soil erosion, shomit the following:

Fifty per cent of the cultivated land in this district is drifting under high winds.

Operators of farms are unable financially to do the work necessary to do the work necessary to correct this condition and counties have no funds with which to assist except to a very limited extent.

We respectfully urge immediate action by congress through appropriation or allocation of relief or other funds already appropriated, setting out a fund at the rate of fifty cents per acre for working drifting fields.

Conditions existing for seven consecutive days has caused death by suffocation to livestock and is a dire menace to the health of people in this district. A state law provides a remedy, but makes no provision for funds needed except as taxes are collected, and some lands are two or more years in arrears.

This condition must be corrected, and we appeal to our delegates in congress to take immediate action in our behalf.

Topeka, Kansas, March 20, 1935 Hon. Arthur Capper Washington, D.C. I have sent the following telegram to the President today: "Unprecedented wind erosion in a large drought stricken area of several states is not only killing out meager crop prospects but is damaging farm land stop Dust from such erosion in this and other states is creating public health menace stop Also limited supply of stock feed being badly damaged by infiltration of large amounts of dust stop I recommend federal government undertake controlling soil movements by listing with uniform and concerted action on a wide area of several states stop I believe this could be accomplished if the federal government could furnish necessary feed gasoline and oil through relief administration and advisory service through agricultural department stop This castastrophe is of such size and importance that it is more than the problem of a single state. " This erosion has reached kisk unprecedented proportions affecting almost fifty per cent of the state and extending as far east as Abilene stop It can only be attacked and brought under some measure of control by a concerted effort over a wide area, which only the federal government is capable of making.
