### BLUFFVILLE.

A settlement formed in 1867 on Bluff creek, in the southeast corner of Ellsworth county, 16 miles from Ellsworth, the county seat, 10 from Elm creek, on the Kansas Pacific Ry., the nearest shipping point, and 153 from Topeka. Its principal exports are live stock and wood. Stage to Ellsworth once a week. Semi-weekly mail. L. W. Boggs postmaster.

## BURLINGAME.

A thriving city of the 3d class, first settled in 1854 and located on Switzer creek and the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe R. R., in the northwestern part of Osage county, 16 miles from Lyndon, the present county seat, 26 from Topeka, 76 from Atchison and 92 from Kansas City. Its principal manufacturing establishments are a flour mill and a cheese factory, both using steam power. The city contains 3 churches—Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist and a graded free school. It has also 1

bank, a weekly newspaper, the Osage county *Chronicle*, and 3 hotels. Coal has been found in the immediate vicinity, and has been quite extensively mined since 1871. 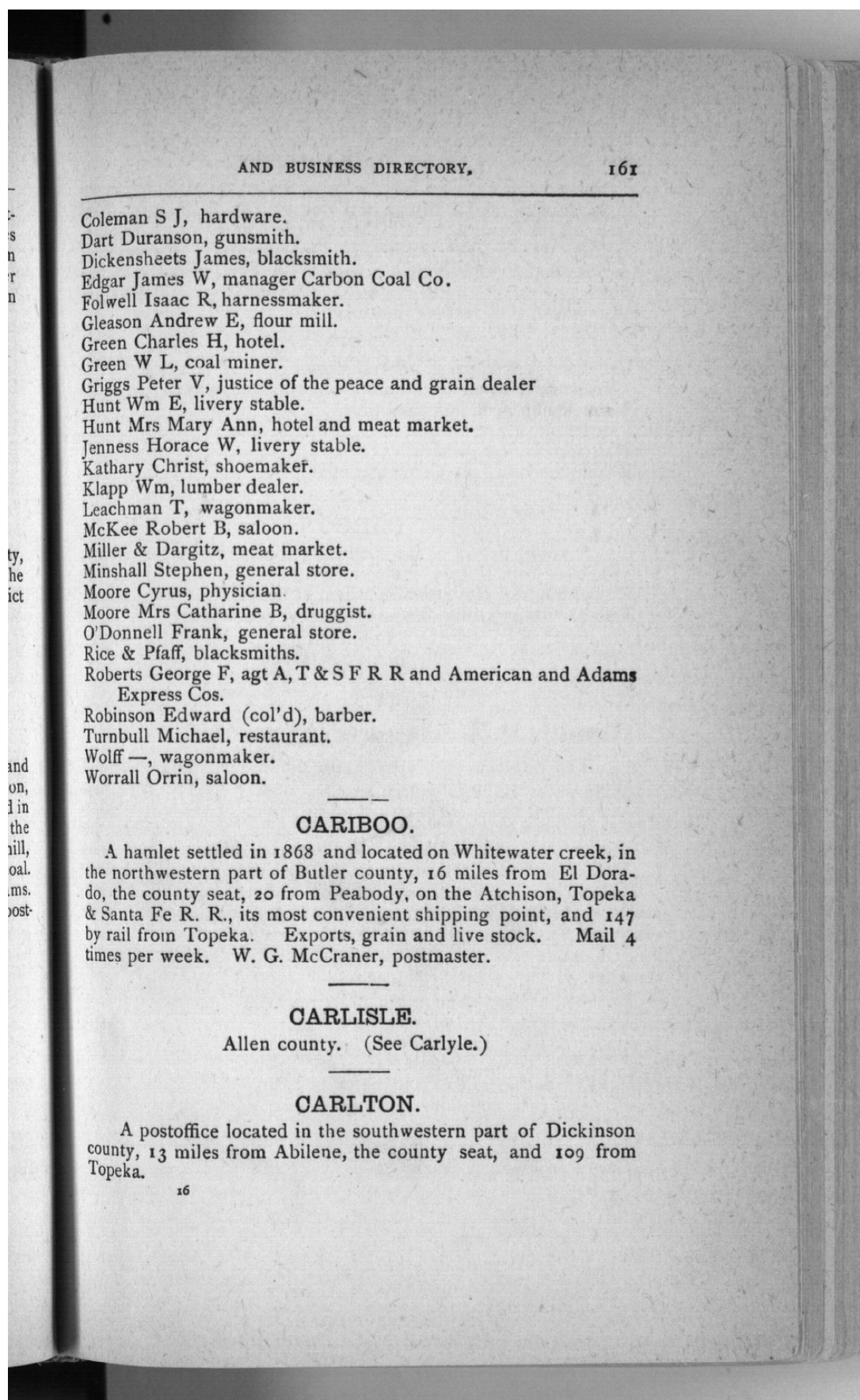

#### CEDAR BLUFF.

A hamlet located on the south branch of Solomon river, in the central part of Rooks county, 7 miles from Stockton, the county seat.



## **CEDAR BLUFFS.**

A hamlet settled in 1872, located on Beaver creek, in the extreme north of Decatur county (unorganized). It is 55 miles from Buffalo, on the Kansas Pacific Ry, the nearest shipping point, and 338 from Topeka. Principal exports, live stock. Stage to Wilsonville and Buffalo. Tri-weekly mail. Clarence Demmick, postmaster.

## **CEDAR CREEK.**

A country postoffice, located on the stream from which it takes its name, in the northeastern part of Cowley county, 27 miles from Winfield, the county seat, and 56 from Independence. Stage to Elk Falls and Wichita. Daily mail. Silas H. Miller, postmaster.

## **CEDAR FORD.**

A hamlet located on Rock creek, in the southern part of Butler county, 22 miles from El Dorado, the county seat and shipping point, and 158 from Topeka. Stage to Douglass and Elk Falls. Daily mail. Andrew B. Woodruff, postmaster.

## **CEDAR GROVE.**

A station on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe R. R., located in the extreme west of Chase county, 15 miles from Cottonwood Falls, the county seat, and 100 from Topeka. Population, 100.

## **CEDAR JUNCTION.**

More commonly called De Soto Junction, a small place, located on Kansas river and Cedar creek, in the northwestern part of Johnson county, at the junction of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe and St. Louis, Lawrence & Western R. Rs., 11 miles from Olathe, the county seat, 43 from Topeka, and 23 from Kansas City, Mo. Principal shipments, grain and stock. Telegraph, Western Union. Express, American. Daily mail. T. Bonney, postmaster.

## **CEDAR POINT.**

A village located on Cottonwood river, in the extreme west of Chase county, 20 miles from Cottonwood Falls, the county seat,  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile from Cedar Grove, on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe R. R., and 100 from Topeka. It contains a water power flouring mill, Methodist Episcopal church, and district school. Principal shipments, grain. Daily mail. Population, 55. C. A. Garlick, postmaster.
