





THE NEW SANTA FE TRAIL.

When Christopher Columbus first landed in the West Indes (1492), which he so named, little did he dream of the rich and fertile country, which he was opening to the world for civilization.

Twenty years after Columbus discovered America (in 1512), Ponce de Leon, an aged Spaniard, accidently discovered the main land and he named it Florida, from the abundance of flowers he saw. The Spaniards, believing Florida to be a rich country, in 1539 De Soto landed on its shores and for three years wandered westward and reached the Mississippi River. Constructing rude crafts they crossed it and proceeded westward. He died and his comrades buried him at the dead of night in the Father of Waters for fear of the Indians. They proceeded-three of them reaching a Spanish colony in Mexico-these being the first to traverse the great Santa Fe Trail.

Louisiana, as this territory was called through which this great trail passes, was visited by La Salle, who discovered the mouth of the Mississippi River in 1691; and an unsuccessful attempt was made at I'berville in 1699. It was named after Louis XIV, who made a grant in 1712, and was subsequently purchased by the Mississippi Company of John Law, after whose failure it was restored to the crown. In 1762 it became the property of Spain in whose possession it remained until 1800, when it was given back to France, then under the control of Napoleon.

Louisiana at that time comprised nearly all of the territory between the Mississippi River and the Rocky Mountains. In 1803 this immense territory was ceded to the United States by France for the sum of THE KANSAS CITY AUTO SUPPLY CO.

\$15,000,000. Then came the real development of the Trail. When William Beeknall, blue-eyed and long-legged, unloaded in 1821 two saddlebags of Spanish silver on the puncheon floor of a country store at Franklin, Missouri, the Santa Fe Trail was placed on the map of the world's commerce.

Before Becknell there had been traders in furs and finery with the Spanish-speaking inhabitants of Santa Fe and the Indians of the mesas nearby. Baptiste La Lande, a French creole, had gone out in 1804 as agent for a merchant of Kaskaskia, Illinois, William Morrison, had sold the merchant's goods, kept the money, married a Mexican maiden and never returned to "the states." James Pursley, a Kentuckian, had followed in Lande's footsteps, become infatuated with the caressing climate of Santa Fe and there took up his abode. Zebulon Montgomery Pike, lieutenant in the United States army and lover of adventure, had led Pike's expedition in 1805, discovered the high mountain that bears his name and, after suffering from the iron hand of the Mexican, had returned to the United Statesc with fervid accounts of the commercial possibilities of the distant and mysterious Southwest. A half dozen other Americans, leaders of parties of large or small numbers, followed, but there was no regularly organized expedition from the United States to Santa Fe until Becknell. after his first trip, tumbled his Spanish coins into a heap on the floor of the Franklin store.





A. A. Van Sauter, of New York City, who has toured Switzerland, France, and other countries several times, is planning a motor cycle trip through these lands early in 1912.


The Canadian Militia Department liked the work of the motorcycle riders in the maneuvers last summer so well that the motorcycle corps has been made permanent.

MOTORCYCLE SHOW.


The motorcycle show which was held in Madison Square Garden, New York, January 6-13, was the most successful and most interesting in the history of similar exhibits. The motorcycles shown were the finest product of the makers' art and embody many ideas looking to the comfort and convenience or riders. Additional interest of the show is the fact that it was the last one to be staged in the Garden. This building is to be demolished in February.

Any person that looks for a radical change in motor car design and construction is probably doomed to disappointment this year. From all general appearances the cars of 1912 are not much different from their brothers and sisters of previous years and on close examination of the running gears you will say, "They built cars like that in 1909." While the price is practically the same, the material and workmanship are much superior. The \$1200 runabout and touring car for 1912 are equal to cars costing four or five times that much four years ago. There is compactness of design and reduction in number of complicated parts for 1912. The torpedoes are universally the same, all of the doors being the same height and the straight line effect is produced from rear to dash, and may even continue to include the top of the motor bonnet and radiator. The concealed hinges and inside locks and handles on the doors eliminates all the unsightly projections of previous models, giving the flush sides as they, are called; also the running boards have been kept free from numerous impediments that marred the beauty of the graceful outlines. We find an increased tendency to carry the spare tires at the rear of the body with gas tank, tools and battery boxes under the floor boards and seats, so as to conceal them from view


January 6 to 12 marked the twelfth and last automobile shows to be held in Madison Square Garden, New York, as that famous place is to be torn down in the spring.











THE SANTA FE TRAIL.

(Continued.)

The return of Becknell and his emptying of his saddle bags of Spanish coins into a heap on the floor of a Franklin store, gave rise to the expression that "The Santa Fe Trail was born with a silver spoon in its mouth."

This being the first time any traders had returned with their treasure to share the profits with the ones who had helped to finance the trip. The purpose of this new route was purely convenience. Many other new routes have been started to make homes and colonize a new country-not so with this one-it was to reap a rich harvest in a commercial way, or find a mountain of gold. For example, "The Boone-Lick Road," which made Missouri, was blazed by Nathan and Daniel M. Boone, who were sons of the great frontiersman. It made the highway to the interior of the state of Missouri, from St. Charles, the first capital, that homes might be built along its pathway so that men and women might dwell, be protected and build a new state. U. S. soldiers, government trains of supplies, the adventuring trader and fortune hunter traversed this Santa Fe trail. Government forts or camps were set up now and then, but no comfortable homes where families were reared were ever seen. Dick Wooton and a Mexican officer sat at the seat of customs at the other end. The bones of the unfortunate bleached by the roadside. Death camped along the trail in the form of marauding bands of savage Indians, outlaws who had escaped from justice. But men risked their lives, with never a thought of danger, to turn this Great American Desert (as it was then called) into homes on these broad rich prairies. The great thought predominating at that time was the Spanish silver dollar at the end of the trail they traveled on foot, horse back, by ox team and by stage coach. The mirage was ever of gold in limpid lakes of silver in the distant

The government of the United States set its seal on the starting point of the Santa Fe Trail in 1825. This point was Fort Osage—now Sibley, Jackson county, Missouri, a few miles east of Kansas City. Missouri traders wished the government to mark this trail, and Thomas Hart Benton, "Old Bullion," in 1824, brought about the passage of a bill in congress authorizing the president of the United States to appoint a commission to survey a road from the Missouri river to the boundary line of New Mexico, and also on

Mexican territory with the consent of Mexico. One of President James Monroe's acts was to sign this bill, and President John Quincy Adams appointed the commission.

AN AUTO SAVES ARMY OFFICER FROM PRISON.

Lieut. J. R. Bannister, of the United States army, lately stationed at Leavenworth, Kan., is blessing the Hudson "30" these days. Without it he would have overstayed his leave, have been left behind when his regiment started for Wisconsin, and have risked imprisonment. Mr. Bannister had been away on a furlough, and had missed the owl car from Kansas City to Leavenworth, on which he had relied to take him over in time. He could find no liveryman who would start a horse on the 25-mile trip with less than three hours to make it. At last, however, he dropped into the Hudson garage and found the night man willing to try. The twenty-six miles were made in the dark over an unknown road in one and one-half hours, reaching Leavenworth just as the regiment was defiling into the train.

TO MAKE NEW ROUTE PERFECT.

Central Kansas and Colorado Boulevard to Be Finished Soon.

Tribune, Kan., Feb. 10.-Clement L. Wilson, president of the Central Kansas and Colorado Boulevard, has recently made a trip west into Colorado along the Missouri Pacific, and he finds that at Eads, Colo., the county commissioners of Pueblo county, Colorado, with the state highway commission of Colorado, have made arrangements to complete the central Kansas and Colorado boulevard through the sand hills of Kiowa county. The county commissioners have not decided whether they will jipp the road or oil it, but that one or the other things will be done early this spring so that the automobile travel may be brought through central Kansas along the Missouri Pacific from Salina, Hoisington, La-Crosse, McCracken, Utica, Scott City, Leoti and Tribune, thence west to the state line at Towner, Sheridan Lake, Eads, Haswell, Ariington, Sugar City, Ordway, Colo., and thence west into Pueblo. This will make a direct line connecting with Salina and Kansas City,

This road is absolutely level, well built, high and dry. From Hoisington, Kansas, which is east of the central part of the state of Kansas, there will be no creeks to cross, no hills to climb, no irrigation ditches to hinder and delay the automobile driver from Hoisington, Kansas, to Pueblo, Colo. It will shorten the distance between the Missouri river and Pueblo between sixty and eighty miles, compared with any other automobile road proposed between the Missouri river and Pueblo. Starting from west end of Main street, go north 1.2 mi, turn L. 5 mi, turn R north winding around Dragoon creek, following telephone line to Santa Fe trail, marker on BURLINGAME main street 7:5 mi, turn R, to Santa Fe avenue 2 mi, turn L one mile, turn R three miles, turn L around elevator, crossing tracks at SCRANTON depot, continuing north 5 miles, turn R .5 mi, turn L 2 miles, turn R 1 mile, turn L 1 mile, turn R 1 mile, crossing Wakarusa creek, north through WAKARUSA one mile, turn R 5 miles, turn L 0.5 miles, turn R on Tenth avenue .3, turn L on Kansas avenue .5 mi Postoffice.
