Correspondence sent from the Office of Indian Affairs, Central Superintendency in St. Louis, Missouri. The Superintendents of Indian Affairs during this period were Joshua Pilcher, David D. Mitchell, and Thomas H. Harvey. Their correspondence with Indian agents and sub-agencies concerned the disbursement of allotments and annuities, the settling of expenses and treaty stipulations, and the nominations of blacksmiths, interpreters, and farmers for several tribes. Your Communication of the 27th Inst. 17th Feb. am received. I am
pleased at the progress you have made wth the purchase of Cows.

As you suggest, you may procure the breeding of fifty acres of
Potowatamie Creek, and one hundred acres at Sugar Creek; these
quantities may be increased if necessary, two dollars an acre is cost
in the purchase wth the state - the Indian Department pays costs, and it
should get every thing at the lowest prices. I wish to see the most
rigid system of economy adopted in this expenditure, especially wth reference
to the funds for the improvement of the Indians; if the land is breeding
as the Indians will have it with a heavy hand turned, they may
expect poor crops this year.

Every effort in my power has been made and will be continued
for the advancement of the female School at Sugar Creek, I am
extremely anxious to see the ladies at this place have an opportunity
of giving more effect to their labors - if you have an opportunity be pleased
to assure them that no exertion in my part shall be wanting to provide
a liberal appropriation for the School; you will also say to Doctor

Sykes A.D. I have written to Mr. Crawford urging pecuniary aid for his schools, but the Doctor has no doubt seen from the Department's report, that the Chouteau Academy abstract of the Potawatomi fund last year 1825.

You will procure as many work oxen and Milk Cows as are necessary for the St. Joseph & Prairie bands; if it is probable that they would be better Cattle, it would be well to procure some Stock hogs. Your purchases of the above articles must not exceed fifteen hundred dollars. I wish you to make the Indians distinctly understand that for all depredations made upon each other Stock and other property they shall pay double the Value out of their annuities. If it is practicable, I do not wish those Indians who are pebbles and temperate in their habits to receive any of the Stock too.

Arrangements will be made without delay for the payment of the Miller at Laramie Creek. If it is not done, you should enter into triplicate Contracts for the removal of the Mule - two of which should be forwarded to the Office.

You are authorized to contract for the improvement & erection of buildings etc for your Sub Agency at a Cost not to exceed \$3000.

I wish you to communicate frequently and especially in relation to the more recent and history of the Indians under your charge as well as all other matters connected with your Sub Agency this would be of interest to the Office.

Since now the wants & the wants of the Indians, or when they (Should you not have taken any) the Cut-offs of the persons who saw the wants made, I will endeavor to put this in train for Settlement, if practicable.



Sir.
I have received your several letter of the 20 Inst? 44° 6' 8" & 10".
Inst. with their enclosures.

The amount of the Certificate of deposit for \$2747, shall be placed in
the hands of Capt. Dow, as you desire, when his State from this place in the
Spring; you required full regard to the factory Shirts, Drills & Calico shall be
attended to in the same hands as I have no funds for such a purpose, the
purchase will be made in your name and the necessary vouchers
forwarded to you.

With regard to the Cows, you must be aware from the terms of my
former communication to the Agent, that it was intended by the Government to
safely to prevent the Indians of your Agency from suffering by hunger, or
plundering the cities of the upper part of the State, and not by any
means for the purpose of agriculture, but under no circumstances can
any Committee be allowed of the purchase of powder & shot. You are
in error in supposing that \$5000 has been appropriated for your Agency.—
4000 bushels of Corn have been authorized at an estimate of 87¢ per bushel,
which would only require \$3,500.

You seem to intimate that the annual amount of powder & shot you
need be sufficient to prevent the Indians from suffering by hunger; if so,
the object of the Department is accomplished, and there is no need for any
further outlay;—had you any reflection you think they will need more,
let me immediately know & I will forward the sum of the money to
Carry here, and ship it to you in the Spring.





the Cows, it appears to me imminent whether you like them or not
particularly when or for the whole quantity - either late spring or dangerous
property returns. When you do so inform Mr. Hunter Longfellow for the \$100.
be sure to forward at the same time your duplicate receipt to the office
made out in the same manner as your former ones - namely on account
of the Contingencies of the Indians Dependent, being fully paid by Com^{rs}
Indians Ind.

With regard to the complaint of the late & sum not paid of the
Smith lots, you will, as early as convenient, communicate with them from St. Louis
Capt. M^r. Davis or the S. Guard and report the result to the office.

As I shall start for Washington on day or two, then claim for delayed
Shall be brought to the notice of the Com^{rs} Indian office.

You will as early as practicable ascertain the amount due the Miller &
Potawatonia Bank for his losses up to the date of payment due to the Offic.

You will engage the services of a solicitor person or Miller for the
Potawatomies of Potowmuck, or the last terms you can, but at a salary
not to exceed three hundred dollars per annum.

The absence of the Super. who left here a week ago for Washington City, procures me the pleasure of acknowledging the receipt of your letter of the 15th & 22nd March ultimo while I am on duty on yesterday. Many of the topics embraced in these communications will necessarily have to remain suspended upon until his return, which will be about the 4th or 5th of next month.

I have been informed to day that you have drawn on the Super. for the Bank at Springfield a favor of the Bank here for the amount authorized for the purchase of the Osage Corn; should this be so, I desire you will be pleased to forward your receipt to cover the draft, it will produce embarrassment. By referring to the Super's letters of 20th and 19th Febrd last, giving the authority to draw, you will perceive that you were at the same time directed to forward your receipts to the Comptroller. By a rule of the office the receipts should be paid or accompany the draft. Should the latter be presented before the receipt is received, it would be out of my power to meet them.

With regard to the apprehensions of the Osage that the amount of the Com. on the Corn out of this amount money, I think their fears are unfounded - at least if such be the intention of the Department we have no knowledge of it now. The Superintendent desired to be gratified with the pay of the Government to aid those who suffered by the hypothes.


