They participated in the removal of Seneca Indians from Sandusky County, Ohio to St. Louis and further west and similar emigration of Delaware Indians from Muncie, Indiana to the west. The records show cash amounts received for services and expenditures such as the purchase of wagons and horses. Partial funding for the digitization of these records was provided by the National Park Service.

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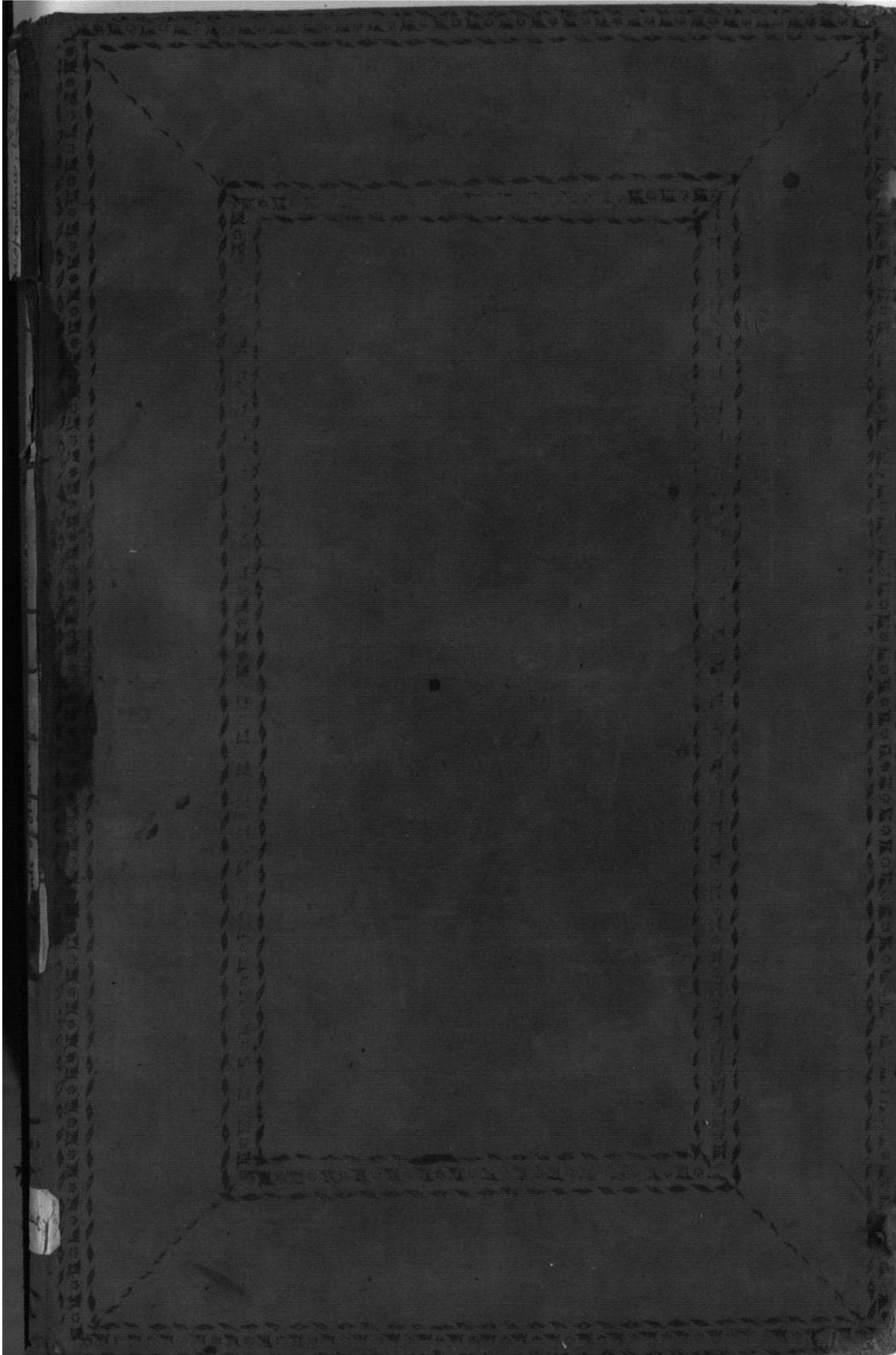
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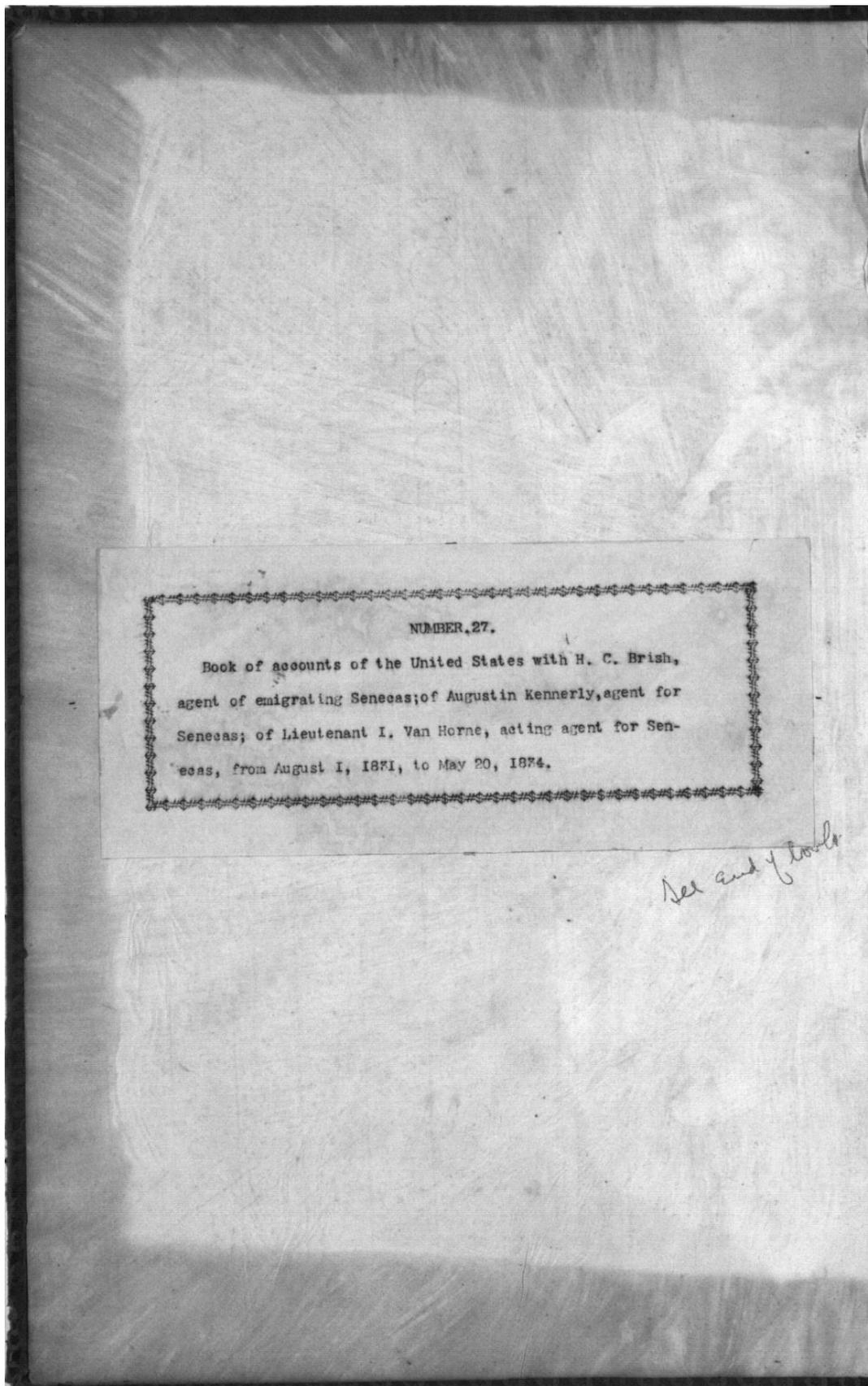

The regular Interpreter Hevron, not speaking the Shawanoes tongue, and some jealousies existing be-tween the Tribes, the Shawanoes became urgent for an Interpreter in whom they place confidence. In order to leave as little just ground for complaint or dissatisfaction as possible, more especially as the Indians from Lewistown had recently arrived in their new country, I employed Baptiste Peoria. On being informed however, by the Supt. that only one Interpreter would be allowed, I dis-continued the services of Peoria; but subsequently employed him upon the dis-charge of Geo. Hevron.
