OUR PALM SUNDAY ANTHEM

It is not often that a professor of poetry produces a hymn that has popular appeal as well as literary excellence, but this is one instance of that unusual com-bination. Henry Hart Milman (1791-1868), an Anglican clergyman, was proroco, an Anginean Ciergyman, was pro-fessor of poetry at Oxford when he wrote this hymn, first published in Re-ginald Heber's posthumous Hymns writ-ten and adapted to the Weekly Church Service of the Year, 1827. Heber, re-ferring to a hymnal he was preparing and for which he had solicited the help ferring to a hymnal he was preparing and for which he had solicited the help of several poets, wrote to Milman after reading the hymn, "A few more such (hymns) and I shall neither need nor wait for the aid of Scott and Southey." Milman was appointed dean of St. Paul's Cathedral in 1848 where he initiated the great services under the dome. He was a successful playwright and wrote a standard work on the History of Latin Christianity, 1854. He is remembered today largely because of this Palm Sunday hymn.

ST. DROSTANE was composed by John B. Dykes for this text in R. R. Chope's Congregational Hymn and Tune Book, London, 1862, but did not come into general use until after its appearance in Hymns Ancient and Modern, 1875. It was named by Dykes for St. Drostane, a nephew of St. Columba and the founder of at least two churches in Ireland and Christian settlements in Scotland.





THE CHURCH GATHERS FOR WORSHIP FOREFATHERS DAY

11 o'clock

In the earliest days the call to church was given on a conch shell or by a drummer. A procession of worshippers to the church in a body was common, because of the need for protection. The meeting house had no heat. Footstoves were brought to the service. Women carried hot stones in their muffs. Ministers preached in overcoats and even wore mittens. Elders or deacons occupied seats at the side of the pulpit.

THE ORGAN PRELUDE—"Andante" The early Congregationalists said that the use of musical instruments was the work of the Devil. Around 1700 the viol and bass viol came into use. In 1713, the first organ was installed in a Boston meeting house.

The early Congregationalists sang the metrical version of the Psalms. The Bay Psalm Book—a hymnbook—was the first book published in America in 1640. A deacon or precentor, using a pitch pipe or tuning fork, gave the key and "lined out" the psalm, singing a line to the congregation, which the people then repeated.

In the earliest days, the congregation stood as the service opened with prayerthe prayer lasting at least fifteen minutes. By the early 18th century the form of invocation like our own had come into use.

Choirs were not common until the time of the Revolution. They sat in a balcon, at the rear of the church. The congregation frequently rose and faced the choir to hear the singing.

THE CHILDREN'S SERMON

There were no Sunday Schools in early Congregational churches, nor would one find a children's sermon in a Puritan service. Religious learning was part of the child's total instruction, conducted, at first, in the home. Later, common schools were established. The child began his learning with that time honored device, the hornbook—a printed alphabet list of one syllable words, together with the Lord's Prayer, held in a wooden frame, the whole covered by a sheet

PASTORAL PRAYER AND CHORAL RESPONSE

Congregationalists emphasized "free prayer" of the minister's own composition, rather than stereotyped prayers. The "long prayer," a term used until fifty years ago, was felt to be the place in the service where the congregation had freest access to God.

The Reading of the Scriptures

The early clergy, called the public reading of scriptures without comment "dumb reading." Some had no regular scripture reading because they disap-

The major part of the service was devoted to the sermon. With their emphasis on reason and intelligence, the early Congregationalists regarded the sermon as the high point of worship. The minister had an hour glass on the pulpit which was turned as the sands of the full hour ran out. Sermons frequently lasted two and three hours. A tithing man kept the people awake by using a long pole tipped with a brass knocker at one end to rap the sleeping "males," and tipped on the other end with a rabbit's foot or a feather for a more gentle persuasion of the sleeping "females." No one was permitted to

The offering was received after the sermon. A deacon rose from his place behind the Communion Table and said, "Brethren of the Congregation, now there is time left for contribution; wherefore, as God has prospered you, so freely offer." The head of each family then walked forward and placed offerings of goods and money on the Communion Table.

The Gospel According To.

We who read the Bible are familiar with those headings in the New Testament: The Gospel According to Matthew, or it may be Mark, Luke, or John. Each writer tells the "Good News" from personal experience. He has learned from the Great Teacher, Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Telling good news is a joy. Nothing can be more important in the Christian's growth than his desire and willingness to tell the "Good News" about Jesus Christ.

If the joy of Christian living wanes, perhaps we can trace this loss of joy to our negligence in sharing the "Good News" about Christ. We need a revival of the yearning to share our knowledge of Christ with others.

The Church, made up of followers of Jesus Christ, is the most important organization in the world. No other organization should have preference in time and money when duty calls us to service in our Church. If the Church fails, we revert to heathenism and barbarism. This little poem is a good reminder:

"You are writing a gospel,
A chapter each day,
By the deeds that you do,
By the words that you say.
Men read what you write,
Whether faithless or true;
Say,—what is the gospel

Library Notes

I'm OK—You're OK, A Practical Guide to Transactional Analysis by Thomas A. Harris, M.D.

This 1967 self-help book is still currently on best seller lists. The cover story of the February A.D. magazine is an article on Transactional Analysis.

Transactional Analysis distinguishes three active elements in each person's make-up: the Parent, the Adult, and the Child (P-A-C). The Parent, a synthesis of behavior taught us by our parents provides our ethics and also many later hangups. The Child, a residue of feelings also absorbed while we are very young gives us many fears, but also our creativity, our spontaneity. The Adult, our reasoning source, needs to be as free as possible of the prejudices from the Parent or infantile fears from the Child. The goal of Transactional Analysis is the strengthening and emancipation of the Adult from the recordings in Parent and Child to make possible freedom of choice and the creation of Transactional Analysis distinguishes sible freedom of choice and the creation of

new options.

The title of the book refers to the response of the mature adult at peace with himself and others. Dr. Harris applies the P-A-C system to problems in marriage and child rearing, adolescence, violence, racial prejudice, religion, and international problems. The chapter "P-A-C and Moral Values" is outstanding, and the final chapter is concerned with the social implications of P-A-C—for there is a National Parent and a National Child.

EAGLE OR VULTURE?

In the opening section of the book of Obadiah, the prophet declares to the high and mighty Edomites (who live in rock dwellings up in the mountain and think that they are beyond the reach of God) that "though you soar aloft like the eagle, though your nest is set among the stars . . I will bring you down,' says the Lord." In some translations, however, the English word is "vulture" rather than "eagle."

The different translations arise from the Hebrew word <u>nesher</u>, which can be used for any large bird of prey. Did Obadiah (or Jeremiah, in whose writings the same line occurs) mean "eagle" or "vulture"? Who knows with certainty?

What a contrast! We are accustomed to think of the eagle as a proud and noble monarch, fit for our country's symbol. But a vulture? Can you imagine a brass band marching to "Under the Double Vulture," or someone with a sash full of merit badges becoming a Vulture Scout?

One lesson from this is the reminder that our studies of Scripture must be interpretative, that is, we have to work at the meanings. We need to recognize that God's Word to us requires a sharing of experience, an openness to the impressions of others, a testing of our own ventures in setting out what it means. Therefore, the Church when gathered to hear the Word is meant to listen carefully, to respond with intelligence, and to resist authoritarian arrogance. A "Bible bigot" is a contradiction in terms.
