
We will handle these officers and men with the equipment they carry on our regular train.


On receipt of our agent's message to-day, we immediately wired him to take up with you and see what disposition or manner you wished the Burlingame company moved, but to this writing have no reply.


Sir:-

I have the honor to submit herewith, copy of my letter of instructions to Geo.Parker, who I have employed as special man in charge of the horses to be shipped from here to Pt.Riley. The car of horses will leave Ellsworth on U.P.No.12 at 4:10 P.M. next Sunday, Sept 28, and will be due to arrive at Pt.Riley Sunday at 10:45 P.M. and will probably have to be unloaded that night. There being no stock yards at Pt.Riley it will be necessary for the two men in charge to have additional help to take the horses to camp. I have written Capt.Norton, Qr.M. of the 2nd Reg.fully relative to the matter and send this for your information.


I trust the horses will prove satisfactory to you in every respect. I would state that two or three of the horses are the private property of some of the officers and would therefore request that no general selection be made by any other officers until my arrival, when I can explain fully the disposition of each horse and point out those claimed as personal property. You will notice that Col.O'Donnell furnishes three horses but he has stated to me that he is willing to surrender the use of his particular horse and ride any other, should such action meet with the pleasure of those having more active work to do.

I presume that curry combs and brushes will be furnished by the Quarter Master. I have engaged Geo.Parker with the understanding that he is to be with the horses during the week, with such assistance as may be necessary.




















Sir: Replying to your communication of Oct. I7, I902, would say: I have made out another report identical with the other, except that I have changed the date of appointment of cooks, musicians and artificer to September 6, instead of September I, the 6th. being the date of my company order appointing them, and the only company order I have issued.

As to the aggregate column, I would like to be advised wherein it is not correct.

about September 20, I recommended the discharge of this man, as he was going to western part of the state. On the 23rd. of September he advised me that he had arranged his affairs so that he could attend the encampment, and was very desirous of going. I needed men, and wrother to Col. Metcalf, requesting that if the discharge had not gone beyond his office, that it be delayed; to which he replied that it had, but that on receipt of the same I could hold it until after the encampment, taking the soldier along, which I did. He attended, mustered and will draw pay therefor. I still hold the discharge, as I have been away from home alomost continuously since the evening of Oct. 6, and have not had an opportunity to see him. Unless directed to the contract. I shall make a note on his discharge, when delivered to the effect that it was withheld until such date as I shall be able to deliver it to him.



Sir:

I inclose you herewith a sample leaf of a Company Descriptive Record Book that I have gotten up, patented and copyrighted, which I would be pleased to have you examine. This leaf is form No.6 for privates. Forms Nol to 5 inclusive are for Officers , Sergeants , Corporals, Musicians and Artificers respectively. I also send you under separate cover a booklet descriptive of this new system which I trust will explain to you clearly all the working details of my book.


This system has now been officially adopted by eight states, and the endorsements and testimonials that I have from other states where the book has been in use for over a year justify me in stating that I have the very best arrangement for these particular records that has ever been brought to our attention.

The loose leaf arrangement is what I point to particularly. Without this arrangement it would be very impractical to attempt to combine into one, the records of four or five books formerly kept. You will note that this has been most effectively accomplished through the medium of my loose leaf arrangement.

Another point that is immensely appreciated is that a Company Commander is enabled to keep separate under one label"Discharged" all the men that have for any reason been dropped, which leaves the front or currant part of the book free from all non-members of the Company. The last division of the book is labeled"blanks" and under this label is kept a supply of extra blanks of each form. When a man presents himself for enlistment in the Company, we turn to this part of the book and fill out the necessary data, obtain the applicant's signature which we give him to understand forms a receipt for the property which will be issued to him later, and recorded on the form which is a part of his page. We allow this page to remain under this division until a copy of the enlistment paper, which is forwarded in duplicate to the Adjutant General's Office, is returned with the Adjutant General's endorsement which makes the applicant a member of the Company. We then unlock the binding, transfer this page to the front or currant part of the book in it's proper alphabetical order, where it remains until the member is for some reason dropped from the Company. When a member is dropped, the date and reason of his discharge are entered, and anyadditional military record is credited to him, and before the member is finally discharged, it is a very simple matter with the record of a man's property before you on the same page with the balance of the information that you have had to refer to, to make out his discharge, to step to the man's locker and assure yourself that all his property for which he is accountable is in the Armory.

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Company Commanders who are responsible for the state's property, appreciate this point immensely. Discharged blanks as used in this and most other states, give mention to a man's ability as a marksman, to give him proper credit for his accomplishment in this respect, all that is necessary for you to do is to turn his page over and on the reverse side you have a comparative record of this man's rifle work for four years which enables a Company Commander to make an intelligent statement in this respect.


When I first conceived the idea of applying this loose leaf feature to our records as formerly kept, I realized at once that I had at last struck upon the very best arrangement for these peculiar records. I made a very close investigation into the system of records as kept by nearly all the other states and found that the old style descriptive book as formerly kept by us was what was in general use through out the United States. I do not at this time recall that I made an investigation into your particular system but feel satisfied that it does not differ much from those of other states. You have undoubtedly had more or less experience with the books and records as kept by a Company Commander and you will agree with me that there is room for improvement in the methods as in use by you at the present time.

With reference to the semi-annual or quarterly muster returns which are undoubtedly required in your state as well as ours, you will appreciate at once the immense advantage of being able to fill out all the necessary information required on these returns from this book where all the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and enlisted men of the Company are alphabetically arranged, and where the current part of the books contain nothing but actual members of the Company. I feel very safe in saying that under your present system these returns are very cumbersome reports to make, as a bound book will fill up very fast as the pages will necessarily contain a great


In the form that I send you provision has been made for every record of any consequence and covers in our state the following books formerly kept; The Descriptive Book, Property Book, Record of Rifle Practice, Assignment Record, Record of Address, and other features more minutely explained in my booklet. However, should the form that I send you not fit your requirments all that will be necessary for you to do will be to send me a lead-pencil sketch covering such points as you would want changed.

I would like very much to mend you by express a completer book so that you can see the actual arrangement. This would be a very much better argument than all the cuts and descriptive matter that I can furnish you. These books are very beautifully made, bound in half morocco and supplied with substantial "Corbin" Locks and leather projecting index, making a very attractive combination. The


