

## Woman's Christian Temperance Union district books

### Section 34, Pages 991 - 1020

These bound volumes contain the records of the third, fifth, sixth, and seventh districts of the Kansas Woman's Christian Temperance Union. The third district included Chautauqua, Cherokee, Cowley, Crawford, Elk, Labette, Montgomery, Neosho, and Wilson County. Jennie M. Kemp was president of the third district (1891-1898) and kept a detailed record of cities within this region that had their own local unions, organizational history, and leadership. Secretaries Ada A. Robinson, Lelia C. Kerwig, Mollie E. Smith, Dora E. Cogdal, and Mary Evelyn Dobbs (later president) recorded the proceedings of the third district from 1895-1908. The fifth district included Clay, Cloud, Davis (now Geary), Dickinson, Marshall, Ottawa, Republic, Riley, Saline, and Washington County. The books for the fifth district include detailed minutes of convention proceedings beginning with the first on March 19, 1885 in Concordia and continuing until 1915. The sixth district included Cheyenne, Decatur, Ellis, Ellsworth, Gove, Graham, Jewell, Lincoln, Logan, Mitchell, Norton, Osborne, Phillips, Rawlins, Rooks, Russell, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Thomas, Trego, and Wallace County. The sixth district was organized in Downs on February 24, 1886 under President Eugenia F. St. John. Convention proceedings for the sixth district are recorded in four bound volumes from 1886-1916. The seventh district records, including photographs of State President Mrs. E. P. Hutchinson, District President Anna M. Taylor, and other officers, cover Barber, Barton, Clark, Edwards, Ford, Gray, Harper, Harvey, Hodgeman, Kingman, Kiowa, McPherson, Meade, Ness, Pawnee, Pratt, Reno, Rice, Rush, Sedgwick, Seward, Stafford, Sumner, and Stevens County. There are several other groups of official Kansas WCTU records on Kansas Memory. They can be found by selecting Collections - Manuscript - KWCTU/Mary Evelyn Dobbs.

Mrs. Henderson of Mankato was then appointed chairman of com. on res. to succeed Miss Winterburn resigned.

Then followed the presentation of the district banner. by Mrs. M. E.

Berry, District President.

Mrs. Berry gave a touching and suggestive address. that was responded to by in a fitting manner by Mrs. Thellie Michener of Beloit.

A motion to accept the banner with the remaining indebtedness. was carried with enthusiasm.

The amount of indebtedness was \$4.76.

This was voluntarily assumed by the locals that had not already contributed toward the expense of the banner.

Mrs. Page then opened the Query drawer and the discussion that followed the



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reading of the questions was interesting and instructive.

After singing the convention was led in heartfelt prayer by Mrs. Grubb following which an adjournment was taken until two o'clock P.M.

Afternoon session opened with scripture reading by dist. pres. and prayer by Baby Bowers.

Reports of department work were then received. These reports were very meager and incomplete. Organization, Evangelistic, and Franchise were deferred till later.

The Question Box was again resumed by Mrs. Fagg. Special attention was given to the membership of our National W. C. T. U. and our state building at Ottawa, followed by a plain and thorough discussion of the "Partisan Attitude" of the N. W. C. T. U. by Mrs. Grubb.

Rev. Fisher was then introduced and gave a short talk on prohibition.

A paper on Franchise written by Mrs. Josephine M. Patten of Beloit, Dist. Supt. of that department of work, was then read by Mrs. Michner.

Mrs. Henderson, Dist. Supt. of Evangelistic Work then read an interesting paper on her work in which she presented the course of study for W. C. T. U. women prescribed by Octav Alfred Wright.

Smith County received the banner.

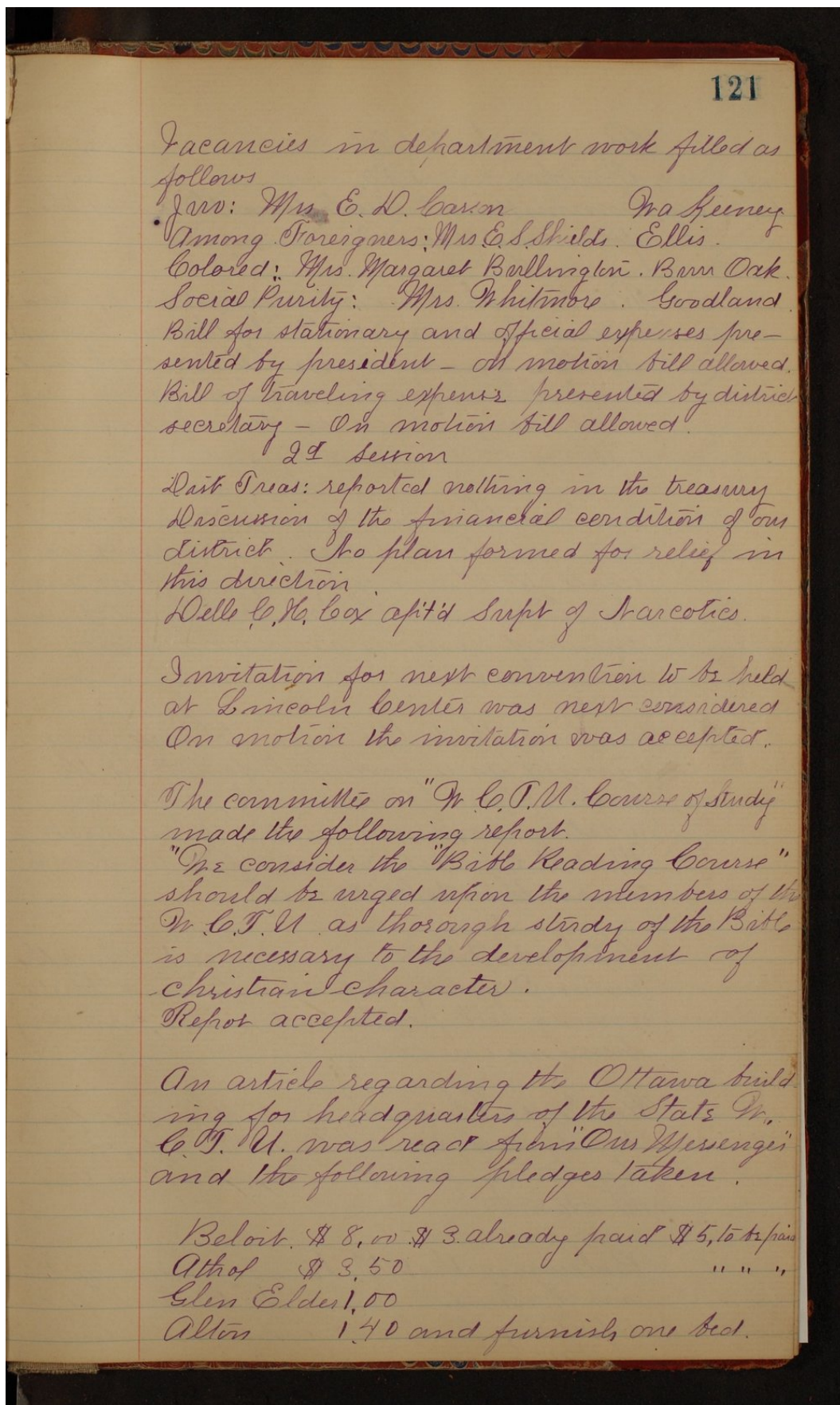

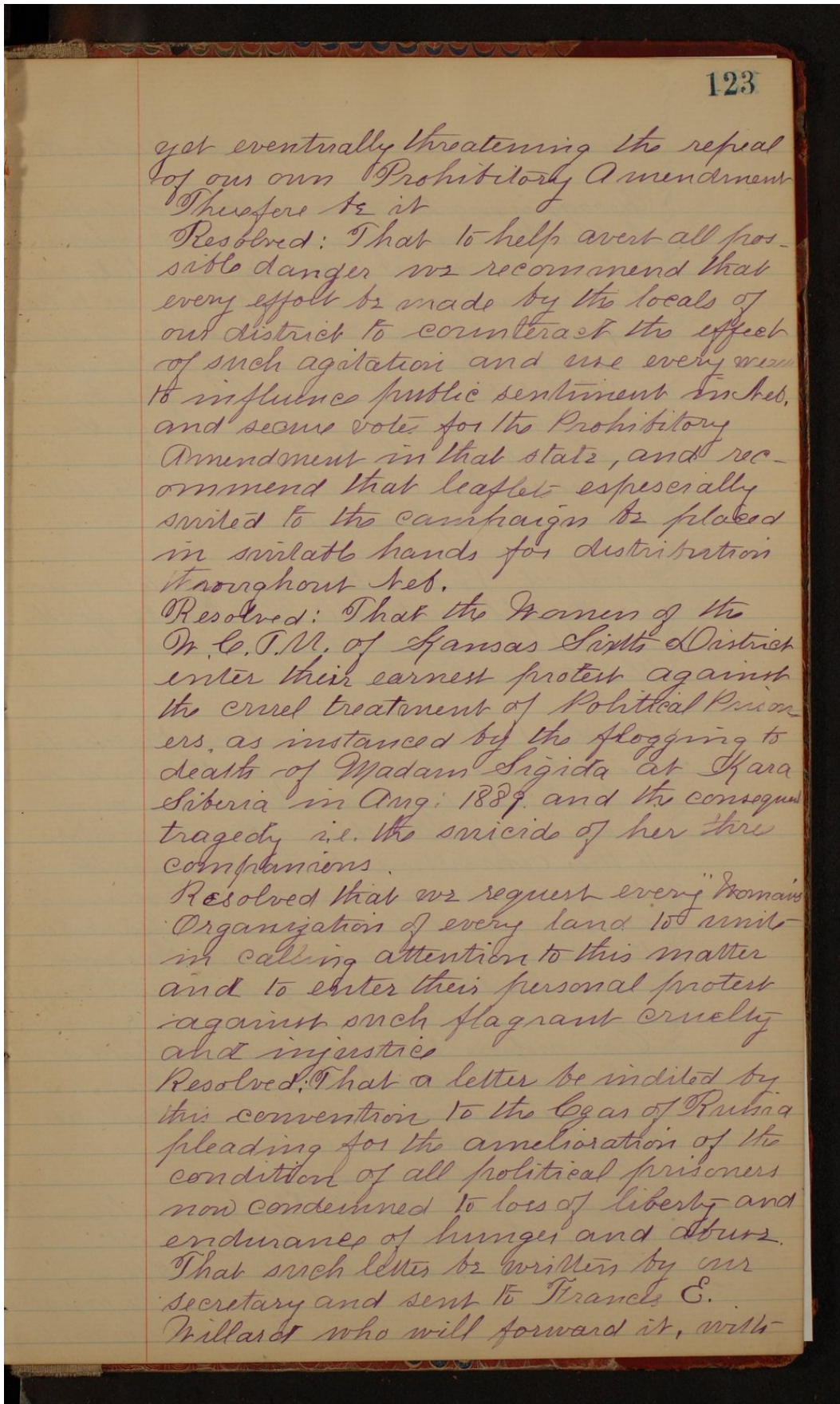
Resolved: That we endeavor to place the "Union Signal," that educator in Truth among all people and nations, in every home in our district.

ommend that leaflets especially  
suited to the campaign be placed  
in suitable hands for distribution  
throughout the.

Resolved: That the Women of the  
W.C.T.U. of Kansas Sixth District  
enter their earnest protest against  
the cruel treatment of Political Prison-  
ers, as instanced by the flogging to  
death of Madam Sigida at Kara  
Siberia in Aug. 1889. and the consequent  
tragedy i.e. the suicide of her three  
companions.

Resolved that we request every Woman's  
Organization of every land to unite  
in calling attention to this matter  
and to enter their personal protest  
against such flagrant cruelty  
and injustice.

Resolved: That a letter be indited by  
this convention to the Czar of Russia  
pleading for the amelioration of the  
condition of all political prisoners  
now condemned to loss of liberty and  
endurance of hunger and thirst.  
That such letter be written by our  
secretary and sent to Francis E.  
Willard who will forward it, with-

countless others to its proper destination.

Recognizing the fact of the wonderful liberality and freedom of opinion and action accorded to us by as state and local unions, thus enabling us to co-operate with each and any party who works for the best interests of our homes against the Lignas Foe. Therefore be it Resolved: That we are in sympathy with our W. C. T. U. and believe its course is but consistent with its declarations of its principals.

Resolved: That we tender our gratitude and hearty appreciation to Mrs. Grubb for the fund of information given us during this convention.

Resolved: That we extend our thanks to the Citizens of Downs for the kind reception and generous entertainment provided for the delegates and visitors to this convention. to the choir for the fine music rendered at our evening sessions, and last but not least to the children of Downs and their efficient leader for their well rendered songs.

On motion the report was accepted as a whole after which the convention adjourned to meet at the City Hall at eight o'clock.

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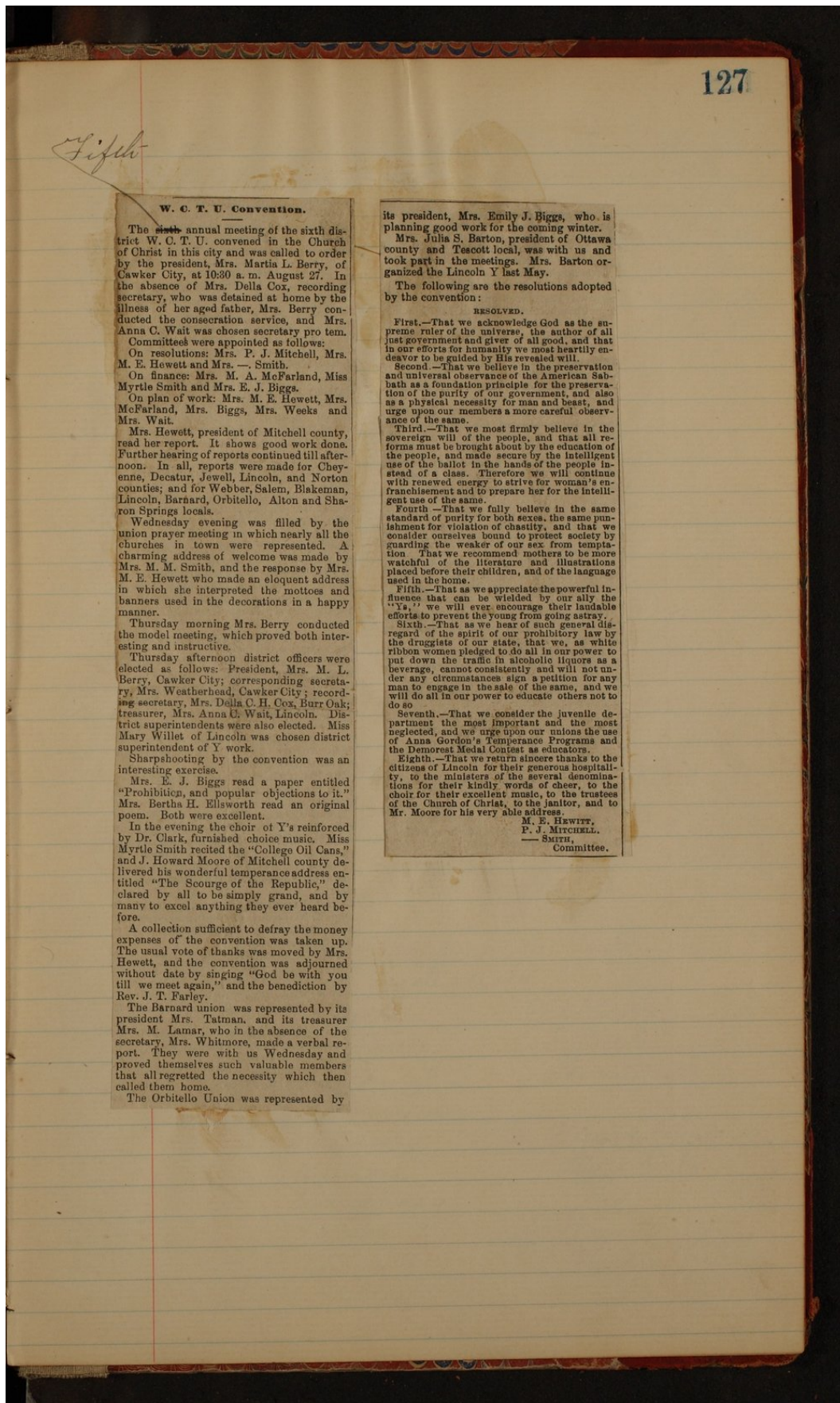

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### W. C. T. U. Convention.

The sixth annual meeting of the sixth district W. C. T. U. convened in the Church of Christ in this city and was called to order by the president, Mrs. Martia L. Berry, of Cawker City, at 10:30 a. m. August 27. In the absence of Mrs. Della Cox, recording secretary, who was detained at home by the illness of her aged father, Mrs. Berry conducted the consecration service, and Mrs. Anna C. Wait was chosen secretary pro tem.

Committees were appointed as follows:  
On resolutions: Mrs. P. J. Mitchell, Mrs. M. E. Hewett and Mrs. — Smith.

On finance: Mrs. M. A. McFarland, Miss Myrtle Smith and Mrs. E. J. Biggs.

On plan of work: Mrs. M. E. Hewett, Mrs. McFarland, Mrs. Biggs, Mrs. Weeks and Mrs. Wait.

Mrs. Hewett, president of Mitchell county, read her report. It shows good work done. Further hearing of reports continued till afternoon. In all, reports were made for Cheyenne, Decatur, Jewell, Lincoln, and Norton counties; and for Webber, Salem, Blakeman, Lincoln, Barnard, Orbitello, Alton and Sharon Springs locals.

Wednesday evening was filled by the union prayer meeting in which nearly all the churches in town were represented. A charming address of welcome was made by Mrs. M. M. Smith, and the response by Mrs. M. E. Hewett who made an eloquent address in which she interpreted the mottoes and banners used in the decorations in a happy manner.

Thursday morning Mrs. Berry conducted the model meeting, which proved both interesting and instructive.

Thursday afternoon district officers were elected as follows: President, Mrs. M. L. Berry, Cawker City; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Weatherhead, Cawker City; recording secretary, Mrs. Della C. H. Cox, Burr Oak; treasurer, Mrs. Anna C. Wait, Lincoln. District superintendents were also elected. Miss Mary Willet of Lincoln was chosen district superintendent of Y work.

Sharpshooting by the convention was an interesting exercise.

Mrs. E. J. Biggs read a paper entitled "Prohibition, and popular objections to it." Mrs. Bertha H. Ellsworth read an original poem. Both were excellent.

In the evening the choir of Y's reinforced by Dr. Clark, furnished choice music. Miss Myrtle Smith recited the "College Oil Cans," and J. Howard Moore of Mitchell county delivered his wonderful temperance address entitled "The Scourge of the Republic," declared by all to be simply grand, and by many to excel anything they ever heard before.

A collection sufficient to defray the money expenses of the convention was taken up. The usual vote of thanks was moved by Mrs. Hewett, and the convention was adjourned without date by singing "God be with you till we meet again," and the benediction by Rev. J. T. Farley.

The Barnard union was represented by its president Mrs. Tatman, and its treasurer Mrs. M. Lamar, who in the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Whitmore, made a verbal report. They were with us Wednesday and proved themselves such valuable members that all regretted the necessity which then called them home.

The Orbitello Union was represented by

its president, Mrs. Emily J. Biggs, who is planning good work for the coming winter.

Mrs. Julia S. Barton, president of Ottawa county and Tescott local, was with us and took part in the meetings. Mrs. Barton organized the Lincoln Y last May.

The following are the resolutions adopted by the convention:

### RESOLVED.

First.—That we acknowledge God as the supreme ruler of the universe, the author of all just government and giver of all good, and that in our efforts for humanity we most heartily endeavor to be guided by His revealed will.

Second.—That we believe in the preservation and universal observance of the American Sabbath as a foundation principle for the preservation of the purity of our government, and also as a physical necessity for man and beast, and urge upon our members a more careful observance of the same.

Third.—That we most firmly believe in the sovereign will of the people, and that all reforms must be brought about by the education of the people, and made secure by the intelligent use of the ballot in the hands of the people instead of a class. Therefore we will continue with renewed energy to strive for woman's enfranchisement and to prepare her for the intelligent use of the same.

Fourth.—That we fully believe in the same standard of purity for both sexes, the same punishment for violation of chastity, and that we consider ourselves bound to protect society by guarding the weaker of our sex from temptation. That we recommend mothers to be more watchful of the literature and illustrations placed before their children, and of the language used in the home.

Fifth.—That as we appreciate the powerful influence that can be wielded by our ally the "Y," we will ever encourage their laudable efforts to prevent the young from going astray.

Sixth.—That as we hear of such general disregard of the spirit of our prohibitory law by the druggists of our state, that we, as white ribbon women pledged to do all in our power to put down the traffic in alcoholic liquors as a beverage, cannot consistently and will not under any circumstances sign a petition for any man to engage in the sale of the same, and we will do all in our power to educate others not to do so.

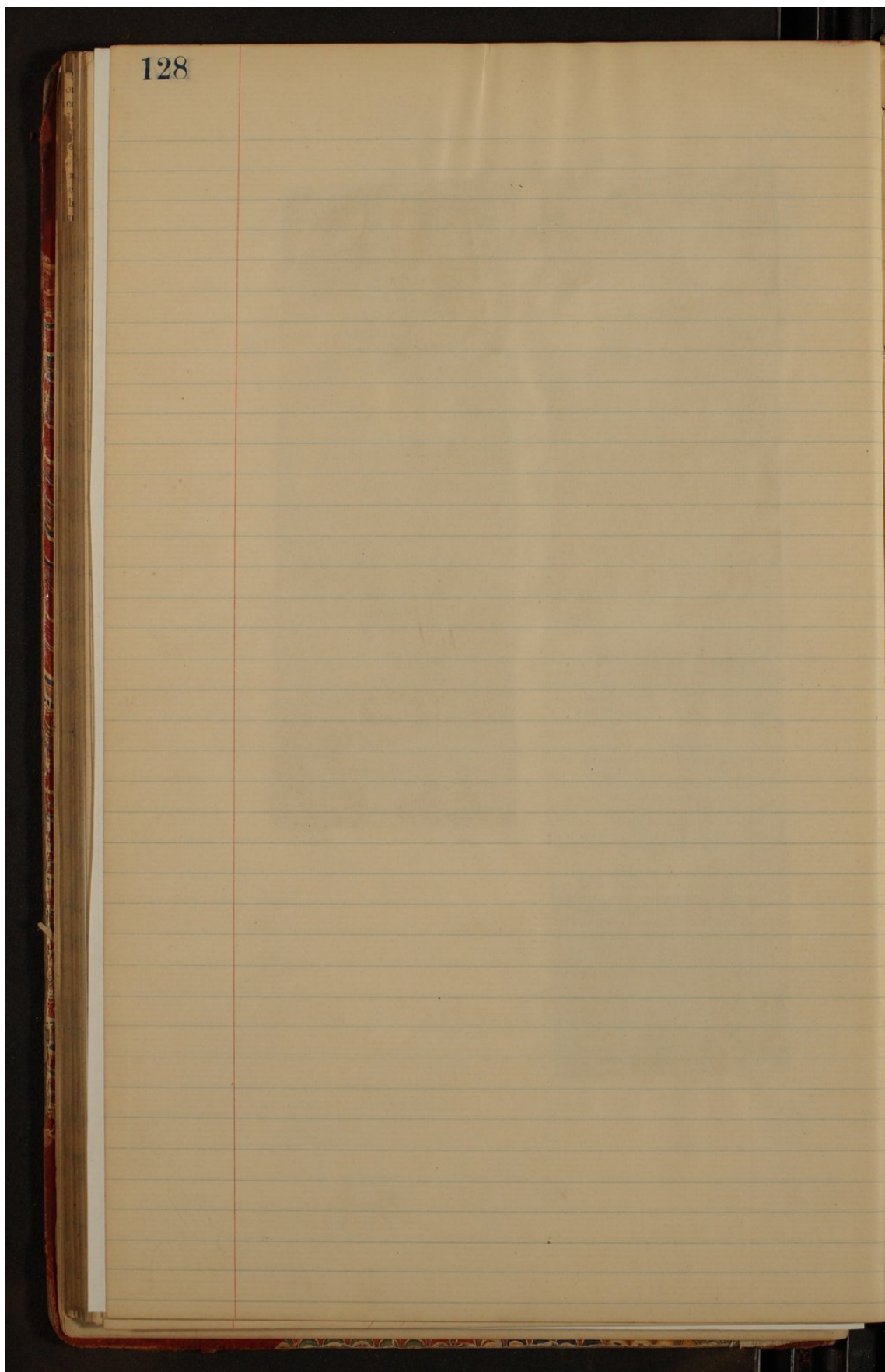
Seventh.—That we consider the juvenile department the most important and the most neglected, and we urge upon our unions the use of Anna Gordon's Temperance Programs and the Demorest Medal Contest as educators.

Eighth.—That we return sincere thanks to the citizens of Lincoln for their generous hospitality, to the ministers of the several denominations for their kindly words of cheer, to the choir for their excellent music, to the trustees of the Church of Christ, to the janitor, and to Mr. Moore for his very able address.

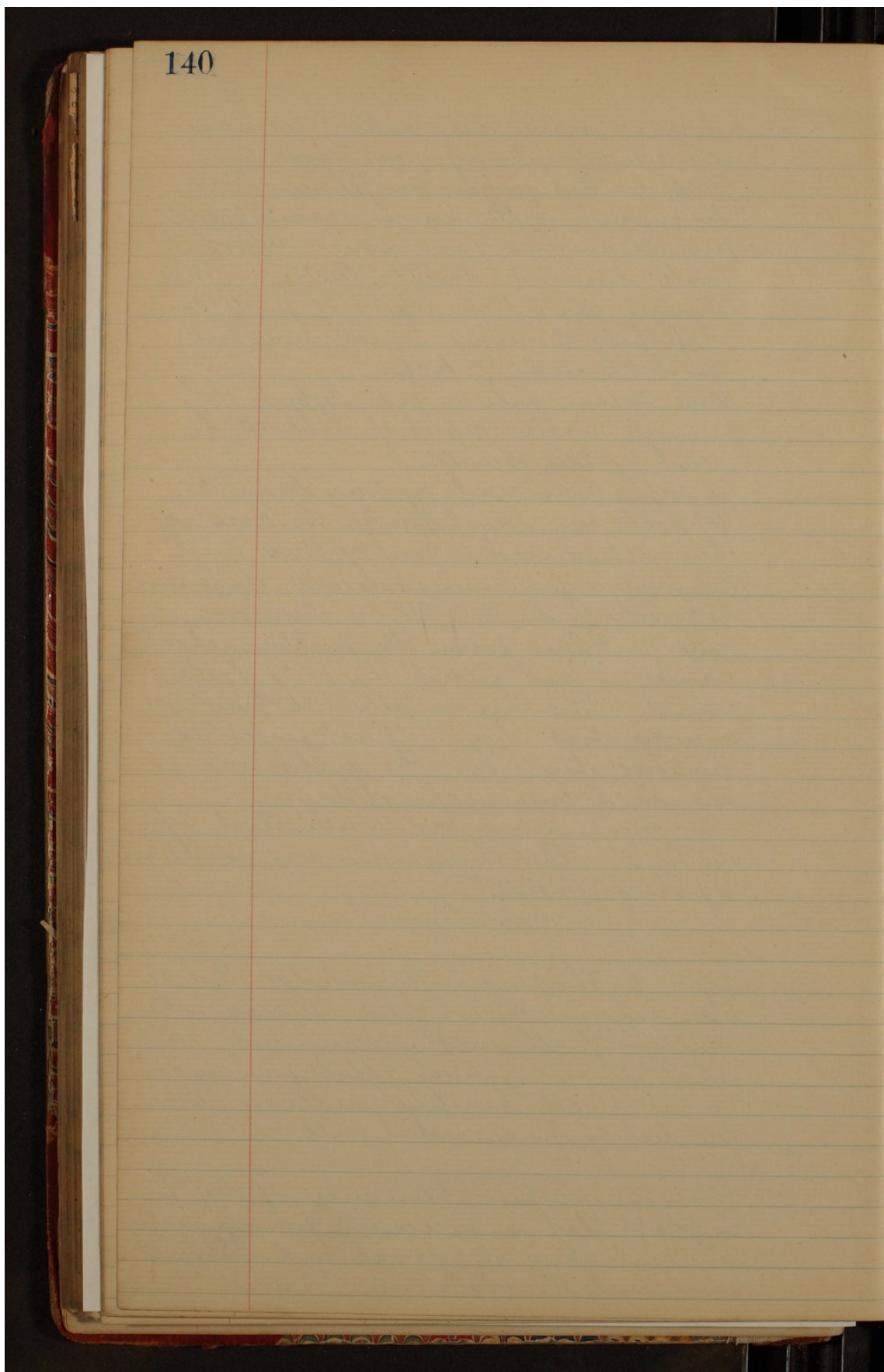
The children from the public school came in and filled the body of the church. Mrs. Carson talked to them in a way that they will not forget as long as they live. The night was as she said an inspiration.

### Resolutions.

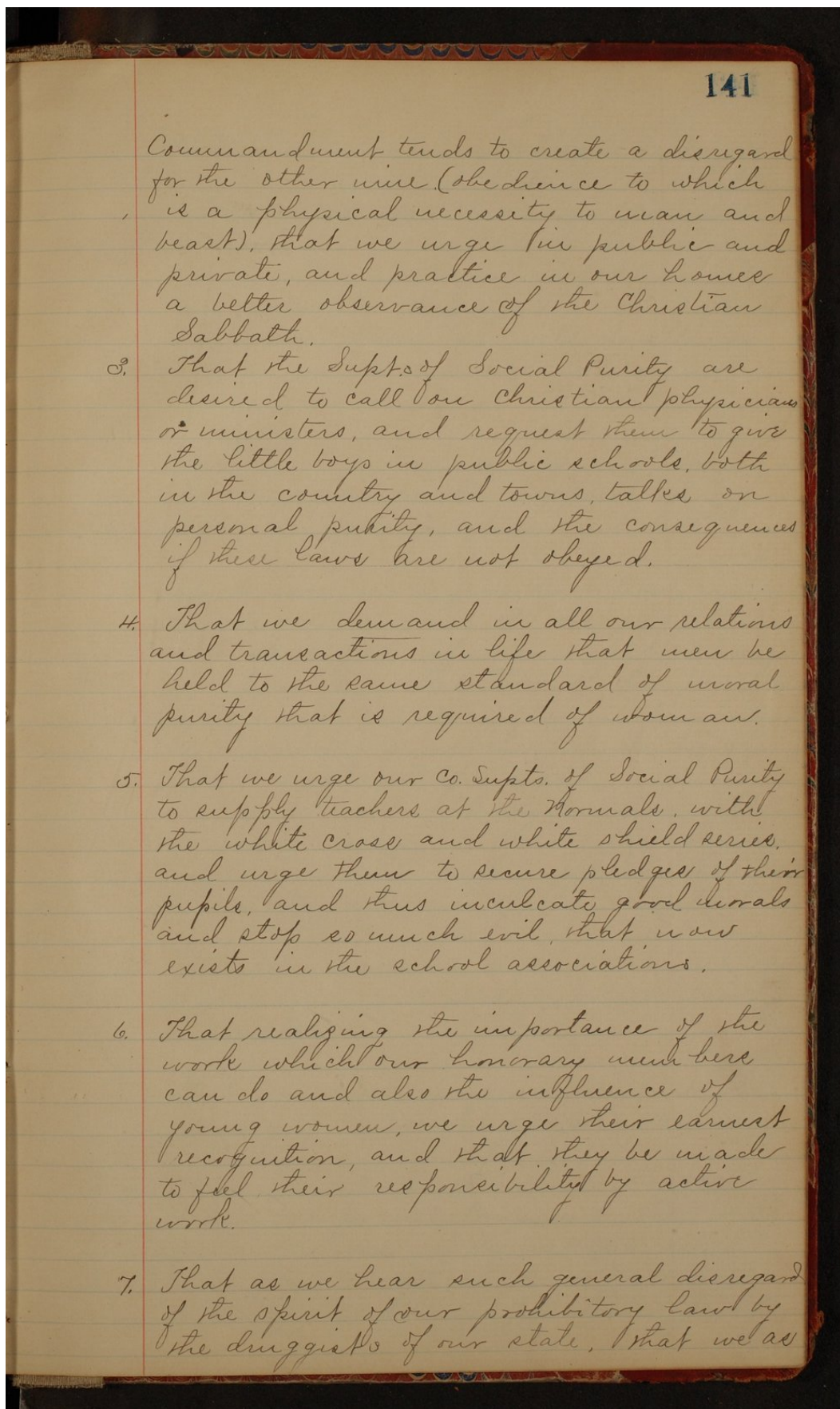

3. That the Supts. of Social Purity are desired to call on Christian physicians or ministers, and request them to give the little boys in public schools, both in the country and towns, talks on personal purity, and the consequences if these laws are not obeyed.

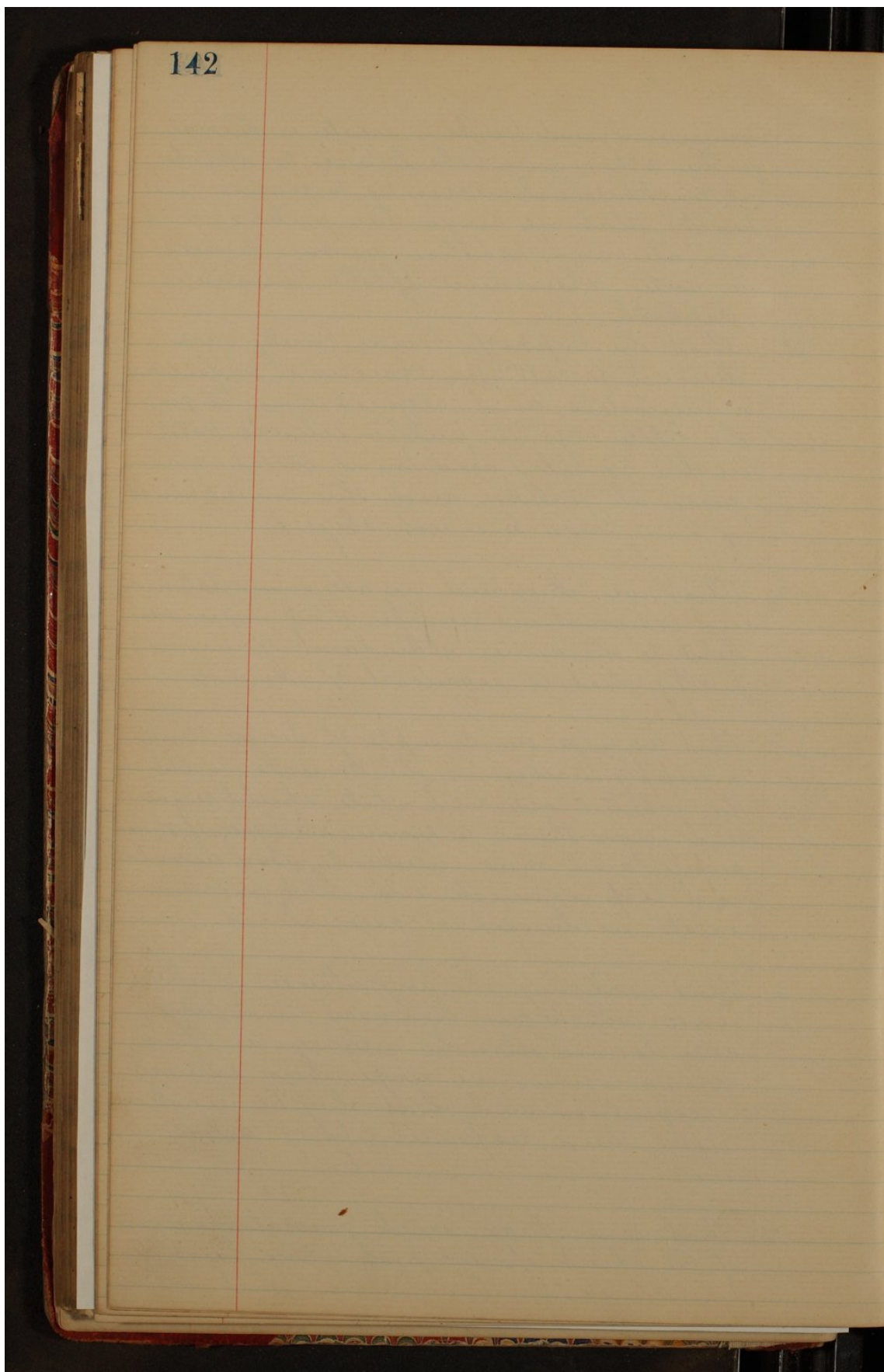
4. That we demand in all our relations and transactions in life that men be held to the same standard of moral purity that is required of women.

5. That we urge our Co. Supts. of Social Purity to supply teachers at the Normals, with the white cross and white shield series, and urge them to secure pledges of their pupils, and thus inculcate good morals and stop so much evil, that now exists in the school associations.

6. That realizing the importance of the work which our honorary members can do and also the influence of young women, we urge their earnest recognition, and that they be made to feel their responsibility by active work.

7. That as we hear such general disregard of the spirit of our prohibitory law by the druggists of our state, that we as

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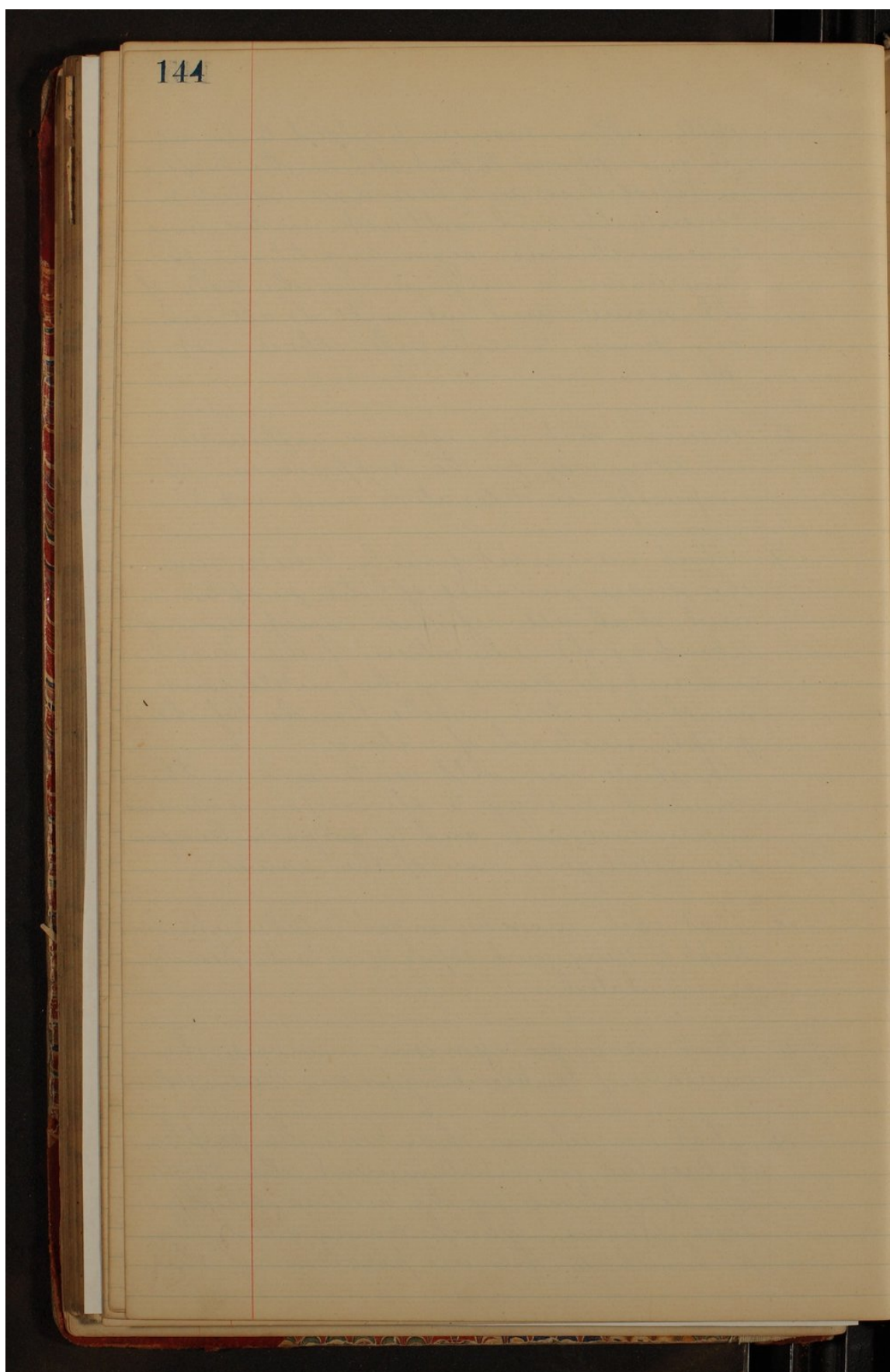

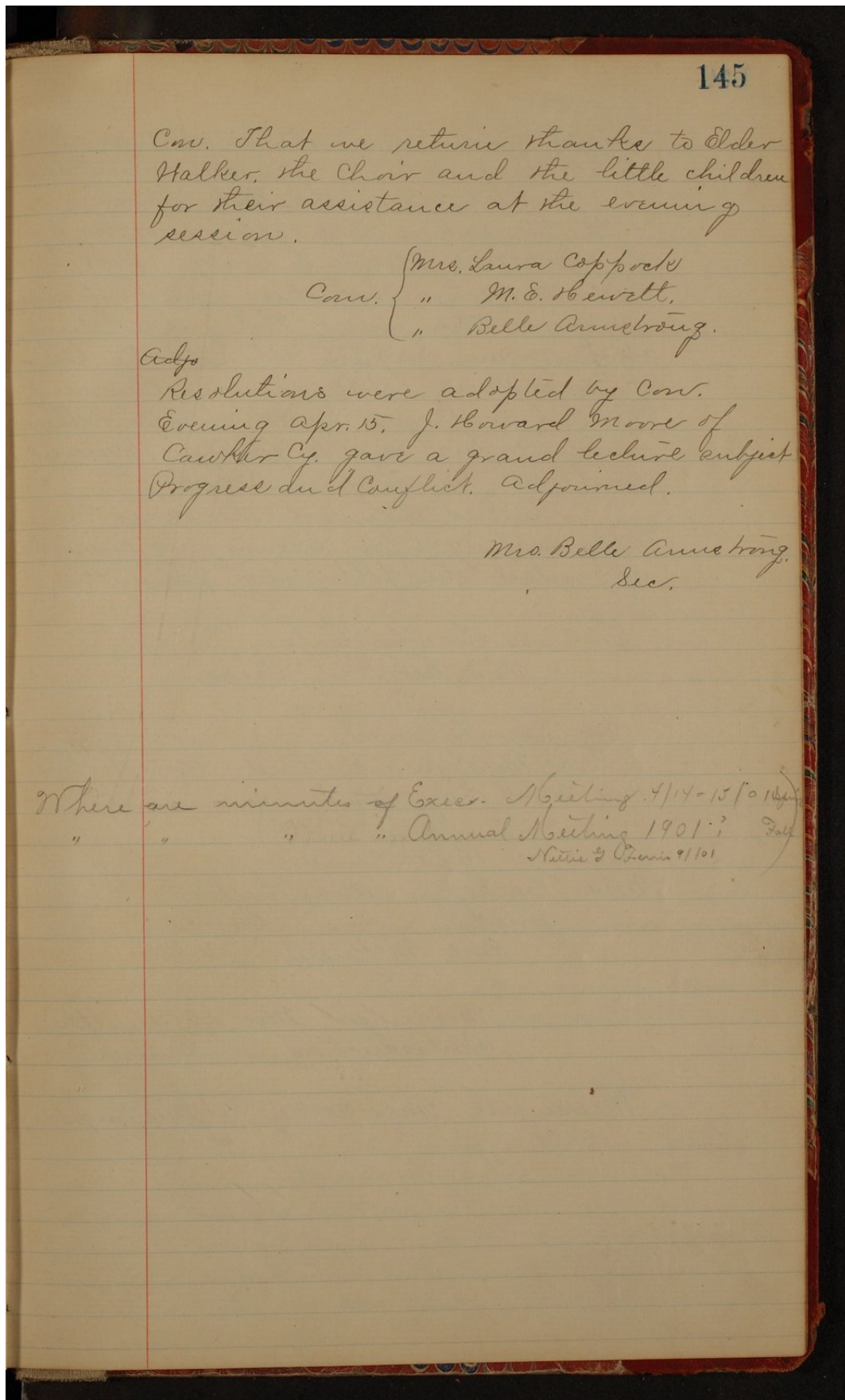
8. Resolved, that we use our influence in every way for the suppression of impurity in literature and art.
