This correspondence was sent and received by Kansas State Temperance Union secretaries Rev. J. E. Everett and Rev. W. L. Dexter. Correspondents include Howard H. Russell, Superintendent of the American Anti-Saloon League, Rev. H. W. Chaffee and Rev. C. S. Nusbaum of the Ottawa Chautauqua Assembly, Harry A. Caton, Mayor of Winfield, Woman's Christian Temperance Union representatives from several states, and several members of Congress. Included are subscription lists with members' names from several counties including Brown, Butler, Jackson, Nemaha, Pottawatomie, and Reno. Much of the correspondence concerns efforts to advance anti-liquor agendas in local, state, and national politics. Although Kansas was the first state to adopt a constitutional amendment prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in 1880, the law was largely unenforced.

It isn't a lack of genuine Prohibition sentiment & real heart conviction in this state, but Inaction, listless supine inaction. The masses of the people believe in the Present Law, but they are asleep while the enemy does his work, & "Sows Tares" in our cultivated fields that will some day bear the fruits of "Anarchy" if we do not wake up. Its so right here in our own Waverly -- this model town. Within the past month I have located two Tigers in full blast. I spoke in my Church to a packed house when the other Churches had services two weeks ago, & plainly told the citizens the state of affairs. It raised a storm of protest against the Tigers.but at the same time.one of the animals ran to cover.But I am on their track hot & ere long I shall spring the trap. One of our Hotels here is a Baudy House of the worst kind & is doing a rushing business in Booze. The other place is in the basement of a vacant building. I am gathering evidence & when I get a case, & not till then if it takes a year, I shall come down on them & break up the nests.

My address all next week will be Leoti, Wichita Co. Please forward the cards at once.



My Dear Brother: I presume you start Monday on your long & sad trip. I assure you my prayers & deepest sympathy go with you. I trust you may realize your most sanguine hopes from your trip in beneficial influences on your wife's health.

Now just a word before you go. Conditions here in Waverly have shaped up the last few days so that the people deeply interested in "Cleaning up" the town do not want to wait till our meetings close before going after the Joints. When I returned & learned of my work on my Western trip they were anxious to organize a League here & clean up this town. Those who are on the "Inside" of the movement are practical & marnest fellows who keep their own counsel & "Bring things to pass." States Attorney Henry Ganse has been up to confer with me since my return & as Candidate for reelection is quite anxious to have me go with him on a Campaign tour. The Heims Brewing company is sending money into this County to defeat him if possible. He has alligned himself with the Temperance & Law enforcement element & is After the Joints in dead earnest. He is very anxious to rip up the thing before election. We have three Joints here in town. If I were a stranger as I used to punch holes in the "Speakeasies"in Illinois I could knock day lights through these fellows, but I am dogged like a lone hair. Ganse has asked me to get the Union's Detective on the ground here as soon as you can arrange for a good, trusty man to come. He also wants to use him at Burlington.
