This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

At any rate, I feel sure that both Kansas and Texas are now rejoicing over the general's victory on election day. As to moving the frame house in which Eisenhower was born to some spot in Kansas, that is a horse of another color.

As you doubtless know, the people of Abilene, Kansas, have established a foundation and have made a national shrine out of the old Eisenhower family residence there. It could be that they might be interested in adding the house in which Ike was born to what they already have. The Abilene folk are the ones to deal with, so I suggest that you write direct to Mr. Charles M. Harger, editor of the Abilene Reflector-Chronicle, and outline for him what you have in mind. 
Dear Mr. Clymer:



We were glad to get your letter and hasten to answer. We will have a linotype machine vacancy here at the end of this week and are anxious to fill it with a competent man. It will be strictly a straight matter job.

In order to describe this situation to you so there will be no misunderstanding, the operator on this job works regular hours on Monday. On Tuesday, he comes to work at 4 p. m. and works six hours. He is off all day Wednesday, and then works Thursday, Friday Saturday. By this means, we help to swell the type output for the middle of the week and have four machines manned for Mondays and Saturdays. I hope you will not object to this arrangement.

We have an apartment available but, as you are single, doubtless you would not be interested in it. We can help you find a good room in town where you are not too far out and will be comfortable.

While our present scale is \$80 for 40 hours, negotiations are now in progress and it is almost certain we shall have a \$4 raise for next year.

If you decide to take this job and cannot come before December 1, that will be all right. We can manage to get along short-handed for one week. But we should greatly appreciate having definite word from you as soon as possible.

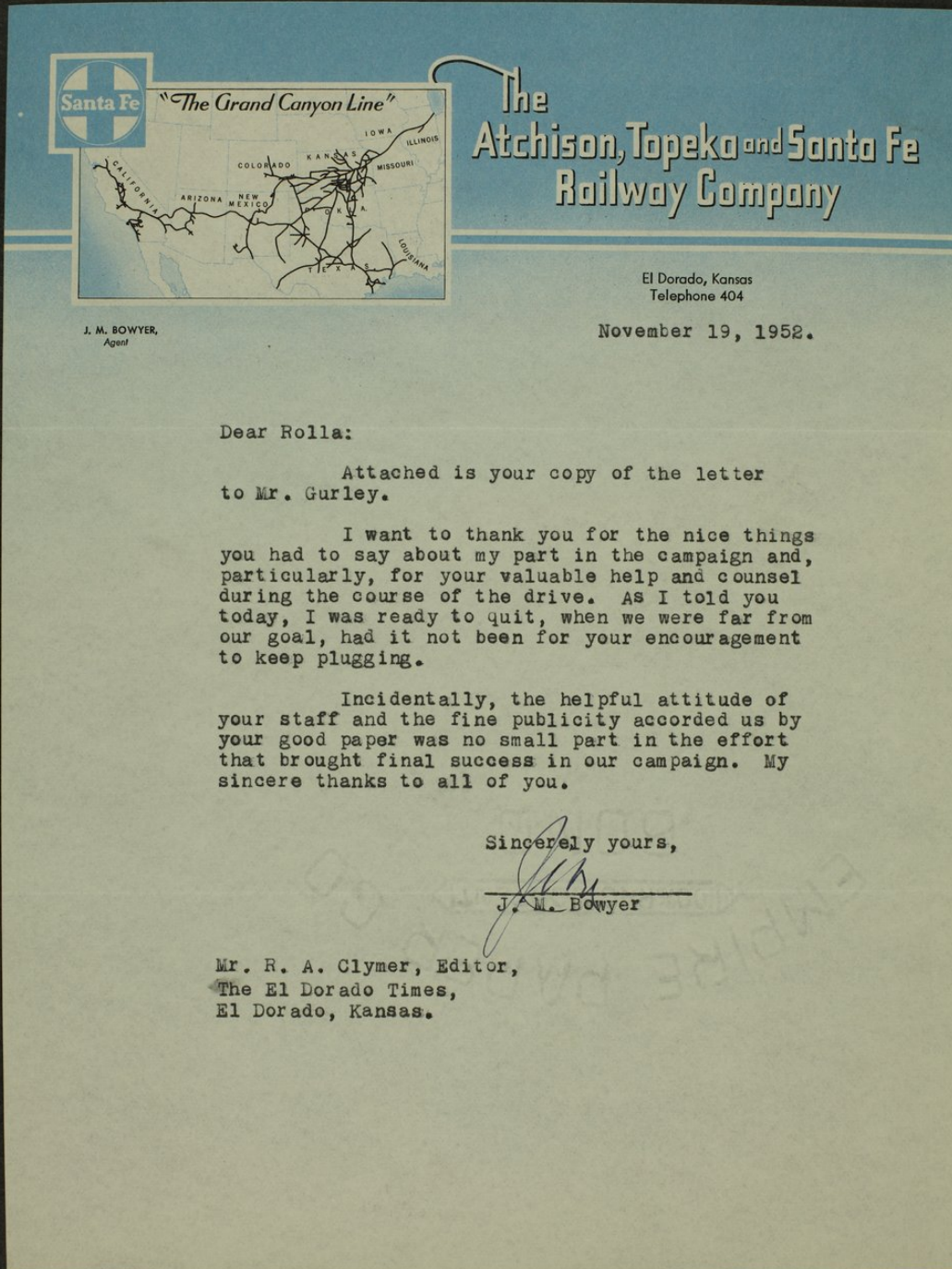


