

#### **Rolla Clymer correspondence**

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.



To the Editor:

This is an inquiry regarding your paper's policy of reporting local political events with a bias view.

I have resided in Butler County for twenty-six years. My family have always subscribed to your paper. Although, they do not agree in many instances with your manner of reporting local political issues. Your paper continually stresses and builds confidence for one party while almost completely ignoring the opposition party.

I have been taught in the public schools of this County that fair play is the greatest thing in the American way of life. I have also listened to several of your talks to the student body in the local schools where you stressed the importance of the press in local affairs.

When I read each issue of your paper, I sometimes wonder if what I was taught in school or led to believe by reputable persons was just a lot of hooey. I have the feeling after reading your paper that you neither care nor give a second thought to the fact that such reporting of the local news could in time result in a warped public mind.

If what I was taught was right, this warping of the public mind has dire consequences. It would appear to this inexperienced person that the local government would function far more efficiently if we had a two party system.

I firmly believe in good government for the people irrespective of which party is in power. Further, I agree that the local newspaper plays an important part in having good government. Therefore, how can a local newspaper such as yours contribute anything in the way of good government by biased reporting?



Dear Rolla:

It is perfectly satisfactory to me to wait until after the election to have our meeting.

I have just gotten back from New York. My feeling, generally, is that the independent vote of the country is going to swing to Ike in a big way. I rather look for the vote to equal, if not exceed, his 1952 vote. Even a taxicab driver in New York thought he would carry New York City, and my sister Doris was of the opinion that the Republicans would carry New York in the election of a United States Senator -- that is, that Javits would beat Wagner. When I reach home, I find that our Kansas situation is not so good. From all I hear, Shaw may make it on Ike's coat tails. Those in the Republican party who were successful in their efforts to push through the legislature a Right-to-Work Bill may eventually cost the Republican party its usual and customary majority. I understand that the same thing happened in the state of Washington. While Langlie has said he is opposed to the bill, it has brought out such a horde of Democratic voters that they regard his chances of election as inferior to Magnuson.





Meanwhile anything you think of that should be done please don't hesitate to let us know.




I am anxious to have a reply as soon as possible, so that I may inform my office as to how this happened, and would appreciate your prompt attention.

It is a matter of real regret that I'm not going to be here when you come to town. Of all times for me to be gone, this is it. I hope you will understand that plans for the California trip (K. I was not surprised by Docking's victory, and I know you were'n either. But the size of his plurality did prove to be a mild surprise and all the bigger rebuke to the Republican Party.
