

#### **Rolla Clymer correspondence**

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

detail.



I also want to thank you for the kind words you said about us in your editorial columns. I know we'll all do our best to merit your praise now, and in the years to come.



I received your letter of March 27, written at Vleveland. I note that you intend to be back in Topeka by April 10, and that your only definite date is for the meeting of your board on April 16.

This schedule will fit into our plans, as we will hold our regular monthly board meeting on Tuesday, April 15, at 4 p. m. Mr. Caton will be here with his plans finished as nearly as possible at that time, and we would certainly like to have you also present. We may hold the meeting at city hall, as we did once before, but you can ascertain that fact from me after you reach El Dorado.


To bring you up to date--the contract for rezing the old Washington school building, which will be removed to make way for our new library, has been awarded by the city commission to Kansas Asphalt company, a local construction firm. This firm's bid was low at \$1,745. We had also asked for bids to purchase a small frame structure standing on the old school property. None was received. George M. Myers, the Kansas Asphalt president, made us a verbal offer of \$500 for the building and will remove it at his own expense. His offer was accepted. This will cut down our net cost of razing the old building to \$1,245--which we consider somewhat of a bargain.

If possible, I would like to have the plans approved, bids received and the contract for the new building let as early as possible in June, so that we may get an early start on construction during summer working weather.


I shall be pleased to have your assurances that you can attend our meeting Spril 15.

Dear Rolla:

I have not found a single person here who is for Hall. None of the fellows that took an active part in the previous campaigns will touch him. I cannot believe that he can do anything except talk and shout and he will not be able to do that if the newspapers will give him the proper kind of treatment. I sent you the tearout to call your attention to the way The Headlight dealt with his original announcement. My notion was that Reed is the leading candidate, far out in front, and that anybody else getting in is running against Reed. I think that is good psychology as well as the truth.

The boy has been criticized for not getting vocal on issues. In my judgment he has laid the ground work for specific stuff. Certainly his speech at Sedan Saturday night was a constructive one which dealt straight out with one Docking administration weakness.

I notice that the newspaper fellows out in the Fourth and Sixth are to have a meeting at Salina and that Hall and Reed are both on the program. I notice further that Milo Sutton, candidate for the Democrat nomination for Congress, is president of the Sixth District organization. That accounts for the Hall invitation. The Democrats are strong for Hall--for the nomination.

If you want to know my idea, it is this: The fellow is out for money. Campaign money is just as good as any. He needs it badly. If the boys of various types put in the dough, you know where it will go.

I am leaving late today for Washington and New York. Next Monday noon the annual luncheon of the AP will be held. The luncheon will be devoted to Robert McLean-to honor him. They asked me to make the presentation of a resolution which the membership will adopt. And that I am going to do. Somebody said the luncheon will be broadcast, I do not know. At any rate it is a nice little honor that was given to me and I appreciate it.

I will be in Washington until next Sunday and then on to New York Sunday afternoon. If you feel like advising me on any developments, you might to do--the Statler in Washington and Waldorf in New York.
