This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

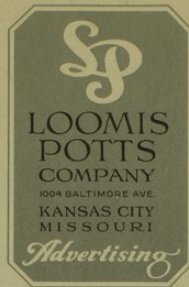

Dear Rolla:

Received the photo back all right which I appreciate. I have learned the tactics the Duplex people are using now about that press ~~xxxx~~ or any others not in their possession. I have the original letter they have written a party about my press stating that it laid in an alley for some time, that ~~xxx~~ it has seen no "bed of roses" and ~~anything~~ everything they can say that will infer that the press is no good. Then they wind up by saying that they have presses to offer that are second hand. This press they state was sold in 1917 to the Detroit Times and taken over by Hearts in 1922. You will find also that it has had less than 7 years active service all told. They also state in their letters that this press could not be properly re conditioned until it has gone through their shop, which is a graft pure and simple. They also state that this press of mine had ~~xxxx~~ around \$2000 worth of parts ordered but were not shipped.

In other words they knock the press all they can and here are the facts: I have other letters where they boost it at home in my file. They shipped less than \$900 worth of parts to me at Lakeland which was for everything. I saw the way things were going and let them go back. I also have the original invoices to prove this and I also had the erector order everything that was possibly needed at all. He is an old Duplex man. I have offered to put on all parts necessary if you deal any way. The press was not damaged by any salt air as we have none in Lakeland and I had it covered with a special anti rust preparation, then a coat of crude oil for fear it might get damaged while waiting outside to be erected and it is not pitted at all.

You can get this whole business erected and new parts put in as I told you and if you don't want the electrical equipment or the stereotype equipment, you can have it for \$5000 or \$6000, you to pay for erecting and I pay for the parts.

I am going to make the Duplex eat what they are writing or they are going to get a nice suit on their hands. You will miss the best proposition you have ever had along this line and save yourself several thousand dollars and get just as long service, if you buy it.

Dear Mr. Clymers:

Your letter of the second addressed to Kansas City, Kansas, just at hand and contents noted. We have no branch office in Kansas City, Kansas, as we closed it two years ago consequently the delay in reaching this office. I am sorry indeed to learn that you have had trouble with the water seeping in the building. You have a guarantee on the roofing for ten years, and were not required to put on a new roof. What about the general contractors? Isn't Mr. Sanford still there and responsible. I understood Austin had left. Mr. Sanford should be responsible for any trouble there. If you had several inches of water on the floor as you state then there must be some stoppage in the floor drain lines, which a plumber could correct very easily.

Perhaps something from the toilet rooms likely is lodged in the sewer lines, causing this stoppage, no matter how fast it comes into the basement. However that does not mean that water should come into the basement. I just looked through the correspondence for this work and I find that the Church paid for 350 feet of drain tile, which as I recall was laid around the outside of walls and should take care of the surface water from outside sources and also paid \$50.25 to add an integral waterproofing compound to the cement in the foundation and Mr. Jamison of your church was in charge of the work and it is presumed he saw to it that the work was properly done.

On the brick work of upper part relative to water coming through wall, part of this may be due to the fact that some of the mortar joints were not properly filled and I find that on December 27, 1924 I wrote to Sanford- Jameson and Ferry that the specifications in regard to the mortar joints were not properly complied with that there should be "Shove Joints" and my examination recalled that the mason was not doing this.

However: be that as it may, what you need now is a remedy. The Permanent Waterproofing

of this City have corrected successfully a number of walls that were not waterproof and I am going to ask them to stop off there some time when they are in the vicinity. However if they were to make a special trip there , they would likely make a small charge , plus their expense , naturally a special trip would give you the information you desire quicker, and may be the cheapest in the long run.

If you prefer that I come with Mr. Mann of the Permanent Waterproofing Company the charge would be \$25.00 plus expenses.

We want you to feel free to call on this office any time for advise. Had you done so before replacing the roof you might have saved that expense.

1. The records show that your current appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps will expire on March 31, 1929.
2. War Department regulations, now in force, require a written record of activity on the part of each Reserve Officer as a prerequisite for his reappointment in a status which will permit of his being assigned to a unit, promoted, and given active duty. Failing to achieve sufficient credit, a Reserve officer may, nevertheless, be reappointed but he will not, during that appointment period, be eligible for assignment, promotion, or active duty.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Active duty credits for promotion or reappointment may be earned only to the extent and in the manner set forth in letter from the War Department, dated January 16, 1928, AG OOS ORC (1-6-28) Res. A., supplemented by the 1st Indorsement thereon by this headquarters, dated February 3, 1928, promulgating same.
2. Credit may be given for work indicated in the letter from the War Department of January 16, 1928, referred to in Par. 1 above, which was done prior to January 1, 1927, when the full credit for reappointment prescribed in Par. 1 a (3) and 2 a (3), Sec. VI, of the revised policies of July 8, 1927, has been earned during current appointment. Where the credits are pro-rated under Par. 4, Sec. VI, of these policies only work done since January 1, 1927, will be considered.
3. When a candidate for reappointment has not earned the full 200 hours, as referred to in Par. 3 of the War Department letter of January 16, 1927, referred to in Par. 1 above, or otherwise qualified for reappointment, the pro rata credit for reappointment will be computed from January 1, 1927, up to and including the date upon which current appointment will expire.
4. Under the "201" file classification of this report name IN FULL, grade, section, and present permanent address of the officer reported upon will be stated.
5. Under either sub-paragraph (l) or (m), or in an added paragraph 3 to this report, a brief statement will be inserted setting forth whether or not the officer reported upon has obtained during his current appointment a certificate of capacity for his present grade or for promotion to the next higher grade.
6. In order for a reserve officer to obtain credit for any authorized activity in which he has participated, it will be necessary for him
 - (1) To secure from the appropriate authenticating officer the required certificate on the form prescribed for the purpose.
 - (2) To forward this certificate to the proper chief of staff or jurisdictional agency concerned for file with the reserve officers records.
7. This blank form will also be used for reporting credits in the cases of reserve officers transferred in grade from one section to another or to another Corps Area, the form to be modified accordingly. When thus used all individual credit certificates in the case of the officer concerned, in support of all entries on this report, will accompany same.

Dear Rolla:

Glad to have your letter and know that you are still interested. The people I foreclosed on are trying to compromise before final judgment is rendered and I am just giving them a little time to be fair. If they get it, that is pay me, then I will help you land a part of this press as I know it is a real bargain and with my price made you that will help pull them down.

This press was taken because it is the only kind that will print in multiples of two from 2 to 32, including the much desired 10 and ~~12x~~ 14 pages. The Goss won't do it. I got foaled on a 16 page Goss, the fellow I bought it from lying like a trooper saying it would print 10 and 14 pages. The Duplex is the only press within reasonable price that I know of that will print the two page units and you can make any unit a color section.

I have the original letters from Duplex at home and the order for the supplies and some good letters they wrote about the press when I talked to them about having them overhaul it, which don't look good compared with what they have written since. I had a printer friend of mine wrote them about the press from here and they made a fool of themselves in coming back. I am getting up some descriptive matter and these letters ~~xxx~~ showing them up, but will give them a chance to come back ~~xxxxxx~~ and square themselves first. I advertised the press in the Auxillary in a small way last week and you will be surprised at the replies I am getting. I am going to sell this press because I will make the price so low and by putting in parts needed, except the rollers of course, and setting it up, they can't find an equal anywhere. I want you to get it if you really need a press and my plan is to bring my man out and help erect it myself as I am going to get out of there as soon as I have a decent offer, my plans being to land back in Lakeland and use that other 16 page section.

Dear Mr. Clymer:

I am enclosing herewith copy pertaining to my candidacy for Justice of the Supreme Court, which I trust you can run, in whole or in part, in the issue of your paper this week, or in some issue before the primary. I regret that limitations on the amount that may be expended in expenses for an election, as also a limitation on my funds, make it impossible for me to compensate you for this.

The work of the members of the Supreme Court is necessarily done in their offices at the State Capitol. Their work does not bring them in actual contact with the general public. For this reason most of the voters know little about the individuals who compose the court and do not have an opportunity to form a judgment as to the relative merits of candidates for positions on the court. It is necessary, therefore, for us to rely on the agents of publicity throughout the state, which of course are largely the newspapers, to inform the voters who the candidates are and something of their qualifications. This is my reason for sending copy to you with request for its publication.

I trust you will find space for it, and I thank you in advance for whatever you may do in this connection.
