

## Rolla Clymer correspondence

### Section 222, Pages 6631 - 6660

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.


Dear Sirs:-

Dear Mr. Vandergraft:-

Since receiving your letter this morning, we have secured permission from Mr. Frank E. Lichlyter, county clerk, to print some special ballots for your school. We will run these on a different colored stock from the white of the regular ballots or the ~~xx~~ pink of the official sample ballots. We will also run a line across them in some way, as "Rose Hill Schools Ballot," in order to distinguish them clearly from the regular ballots. We have a request to print a set for the Augusta schools and, at Mr. Lichlyter's suggestion, are doing it in this fashion.

We are unable to tell you just when these ballots will be available. Inasmuch as they will carry the date of Tuesday, November 6, it is our suggestion that you use them on that date. This is what Augusta is going to do. While the copy has been furnished us for the constitutional amendment ballots, we have not yet received the certification from the secretary of state for the main ballots. You understand, you will be furnished two sets of ballots--one for the amendment and the other the regular ballot. It is impossible to quote cost but you may rest easy that it will be small. We shall be glad to take care of you and will print the school ballots

at the conclusion of our regular run for the county which,  
of course, must come first. You may expect them around the



In re: French vs Parrett.

I am in receipt of a copy of the Sheriff's sale notice and I note that you will publish it in the daily Times, October 11, 18, 25, November 1 and 8.

Permit me to call your attention to the fact that a notice of Sheriff's sale must be published in a weekly newspaper. So, kindly publish this in some weekly newspaper. Of course, it could be published in a daily paper but it must be published every day and the cost would probably be prohibitive.

The Supreme Court has not passed directly upon the question of whether or not a notice of Sheriff's sale can be published in a daily paper without publishing it each and every issue. But, in the case of Bank vs Kennedy, 98 Kan. 51, reaffirmed in 98 Kan. 477, the court says that the section which provides for a publication of legal notices in daily newspapers has no application to Sheriff's sales.

Therefore, kindly see that a new publication is run in a weekly newspaper, unless, of course, that the daily paper wishes to make the same rate for the publication in every issue as would be made in a weekly paper. I presume that, of course, this will change the day of sale.
