

Rolla Clymer correspondence

Section 225, Pages 6721 - 6750

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.






My dear Ham:

Dear friend Clymer:


I quite clearly recall the conversation we had not long ago when I stopped at Eldorado on the way to Wichita and at which time you gave me something of an idea of your space problem. If I remember right, you were not able to reach out for more room in any direction except possibly the building of another story. At the time, I suggested the advisability of completely segregating the job office, both composing room and press room, from the newspaper plant, possibly putting this on the second floor which might give you enough room on the first floor for your complete newspaper plant including the new Duplex Press you expect to install. At the time, it was suggested that this Duplex Press could be best located in the basement, and I believe you said that your basement was not high enough from floor to ceiling to allow this. Of course that would be the best place for your newspaper press even if you had to provide chutes or other quick means of getting your forms down to the press room, and perhaps after all, this will be the best solution of your problem, even if that basement might have to undergo some work to make it suitable.

It would not be a very expensive matter to provide a suitable pit for the press which would give you more head room. Of course all of these suggestions and no doubt others have already occurred to you. We will be very glad to send a man out there who has had some experience in placing printing office equipment, and for which there would be no charge to you--simply an act of courtesy to one of our good friends and patrons, and if you will suggest a time most suitable for doing this, we will see if we can't arrange your time and ours to the best advantage. We have very often made up plans for the most efficient placing of equipment in a printing plant, placed for the greatest convenience to the workman in the plant and with the idea of making the most direct and shortest cut for the work which passes through from the office.





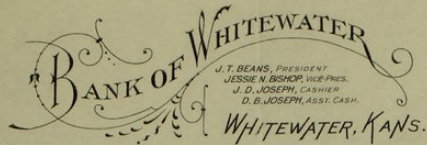

Gentlemen:

We wish to acknowledge your recent shipment of cores to our mills, which shipment consisted of 31-70", 11-35" and 11-52 $\frac{3}{4}$ " paper cores, 16-52 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 1-35" and 1-17 $\frac{1}{2}$ " iron cores.

We wish to state that on the paper cores we find that 29-70", 10-52 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and 3-35" were flat and damaged when received at our mills, and on previous investigation we have found that this damage is done at the time the newsprint is being removed from cars at destination.

We would be pleased to hear from you as to just what sort of padding is used to break the rolls over on to in the cars, and give us a general idea as to just how your newsprint is handled. We, in turn, will make suggestions if possible that we are sure will relieve the damage to the cores, as well as will assist in reducing trouble on your presses.

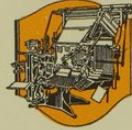

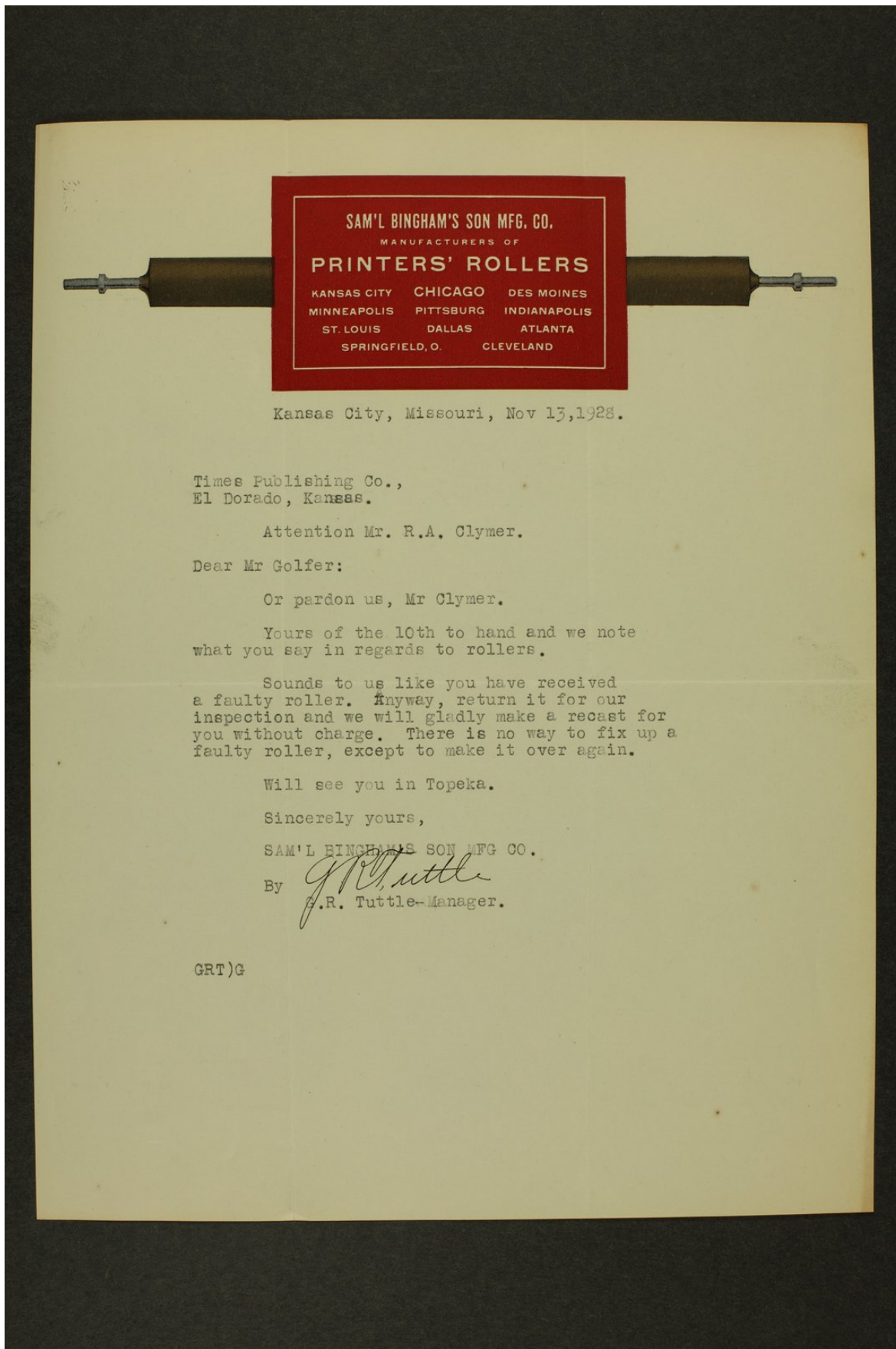

Dear Herb:-

We have figured your job, allowing deduction per page from the 6-point price for both eight point and display. This would make the page price in quantities of 1000 \$3.35, or \$107.20. The covers figure out, as near as I can judge the grade, at \$24.00, all four pages printed, ~~if~~ still using the 1000 quantity. This makes a total of \$131.20.

I think I should have charged the customer about \$135.00 for the job, believing that would cover it and make a fair profit. The sum of \$140 might be nearer in line. However, the job did not seem to be a hard one from the standpoint of composition and I should take into consideration condition of copy, time allowed and all circumstances. I hope this estimate squares with your own figures. Al Hudson got a higher figure, but I believe he is out of line.

Herewith I am returning your check. DON'T TRY TO PAY ME FOR A NEIGHBORLY FAVOR, YOUNG MAN. At any rate, your money is counterfeit in this country.
