This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

regarding my editorial of January 2. Believe me, it is always



My Dear Mr. Ewing:I want to thank you for your letter and
also for your efforts in behalf of the oil tariff. I feel
it is one of the most important subjects now before the state,
affecting the prosperity of every area.

You have asked me concerning Raymond Derr. He worked for us for a number of months, and is personally very likable and obliging. I believe he would fit well into your needs as a reporter of short, unheaded items. One of the chief fault we found with his work was that he found it difficult to write a story, especially the lead. We needed a general reporter who could go out, cover stories, write them up and turn them in ready for heading with little, or no, revision. All of Derr's longer stuff required considerable editing. We were paying him \$30 a week at the time, and felt that amount was too much considering this weakness in his ability. I hope you will consider this information confidential, as you suggested. I have a high regard for Raymond and would like to see him located where he could do his talents justice.


Following receipt of your letter today,


I hope I may be able to see you in Topeka on Kansas

Dear Sir:

I enclose herewith two copies of agreements for final settlement of your tax case for the calendar year 1929.

These agreements fix an additional assessment of \$55.70 for the year 1929, or approximately \$80.00 less than that originally assessed by the Examining Agent. While the settlement agreed to is not as good as claimed in our protest, it is possible that this is the best settlement that could be obtained without a lengthy and expensive controversy through the channels of the Board of Tax Appeals.




We get the pony a.PP. report in three

on any particular story. We are out nothing save the tobls.
The A. P. is even now sending us some market stuff overhead, taking it off the printer. While the pony is hardly
enough for a paper like ours, still the leased wire is too
much-and with no middle ground service available (except
a proposed telephone take which would be a nutsance,) we have
felt satisfied to stay with the pony. I have no intention
of changing the service, either.

Hope this is what you want. The service costs about \$20.00 a week.
