

## Rolla Clymer correspondence

### Section 452, Pages 13531 - 13560

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

Dear Madam:

Your letter of December 26, addressed to The El Dorado Times regarding the David R. Saunders family, has been referred to us for reply.

Investigation has disclosed that the Saunders family is receiving a generous amount of aid from the various agencies, which is shown in the attached report.

By checking with each other at regular intervals the lists of families receiving assistance, the agencies coordinate their work and avoid duplication of relief. Families wholly dependent upon the public bounty are given aid by the State and County, while marginal cases receive assistance from the Red Cross and the Salvation Army, thus assuring relief for all in need. More than \$20,000 was expended by the State and County during the month of November, in the form of work relief, direct relief, and commodities. Our Community Chest will spend approximately \$10,000 during the coming year to supplement the work of the government agencies.

One hundred twenty-five baskets of food were distributed here this week. These were furnished by the charitable agencies, organizations and individuals. The Saunders family received one of these, as the report will show.

We wish to thank you for your inquiry, and trust that the information given will answer your questions.

- REPORT -

### David R. Saunders Family

The David R. Saunders family resides at 911 North Washington Street. Mr. Saunders is a junk dealer. There are six dependent children in the family.

It is reported that Mr. and Mrs. Saunders send their children out to beg, by offering for sale turnips, onions, needles and other articles, which they ask persons to buy so they can purchase food, clothing and other necessities. According to information given the County Case Supervisor, the father, on one occasion, stood in an alley and sent his boy out on the street to sell some articles. When sold, the father called the boy and took the money from him. It is reported, also, that Saunders takes his children to nearby towns to beg and sell needles. A Towanda woman who was asked by one of the girls to buy needles, reported that the girl stated she was selling needles to buy clothing. Clothing for all the children has been furnished by the Red Cross.

Saunders is reported to have been arrested on several occasions for drunkenness. We have in file a newspaper clipping, taken from the December 10 issue of the El Dorado Times, as follows:

"D. R. Saunders, who has been arrested in the past by the police, also was being held at the city jail this morning. He is charged with being drunk and having liquor in his possession. About a pint of whiskey is said to have been found on him."

Saunders is reported to have been fined \$125.00 and sentenced to serve 6 months in jail.

It is stated that one of the Saunders girls stole some clothing from an El Dorado home, which offense was reported to the Probate Judge.

Saunders has been notified that he must not let his children beg in El Dorado.


Dear Rolla:

1. To obtain an individual Blue Eagle for your particular trade or industry, all you have to do is fill out the enclosed card in ink and drop it in a mail box. **Please mail promptly.** The card is already addressed and requires no postage. Your Blue Eagle will be mailed direct to you.

2. You must clearly name the code for what you regard as your principal line of business, so that we may know what Blue Eagle to mail. Apply for the Blue Eagle for only one business.

3. If no code has been approved for your principal line of business fill in and mail the card. Your Blue Eagle will be mailed you when your code is approved.

4. Branch managers should apply for a Blue Eagle for the branch store or plant.

5. You incur no obligations by applying for this Blue Eagle. However, the Blue Eagle is the property of the United States. It will not be issued to anyone who is violating a code or agreement. The right to continue to display it depends on continued compliance.

6. Code Blue Eagle reproduction instructions for display purposes upon your equipment, communications, premises, and goods have been furnished printers and others already authorized by NRA to reproduce the insignia.

7. If you are in doubt as to any point, get information from the following sources:

1. Your local Code Authority (if there is one).
2. Your local NRA Committee or Compliance Board.
3. Your local Information Office of the National Emergency Council.
4. Your State NRA Compliance Director.
5. NRA in Washington, D.C.
