This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.



Dear Mr. Clymer:



The advertising department said it would appear for fifteen issues for the \$25 at our national rate which is fifty-six cents per inch. Checking copies will be sent to the hotel management. 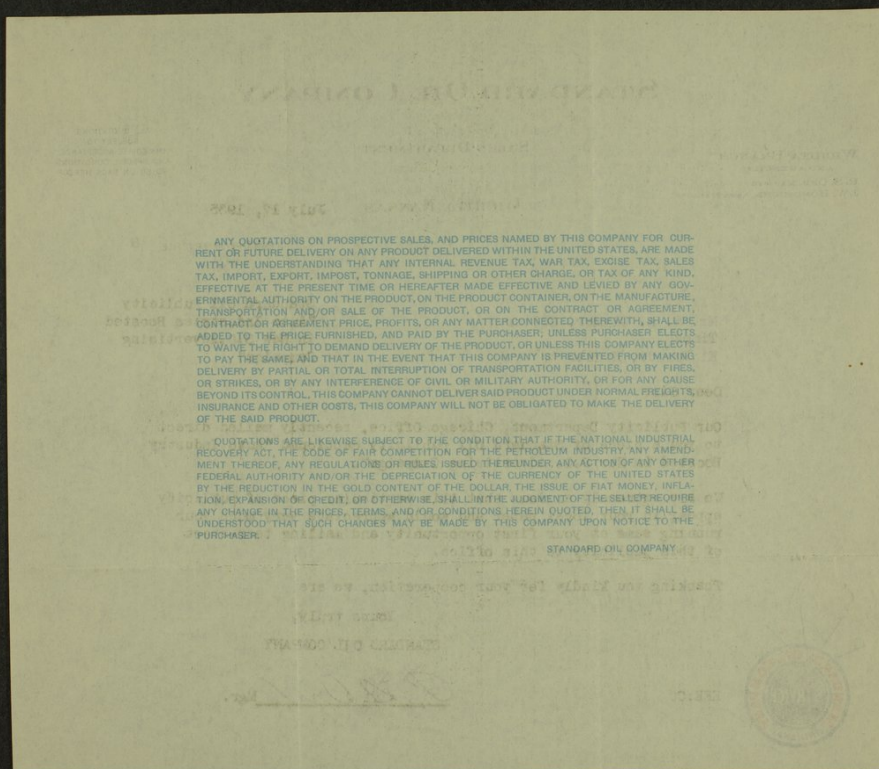




Dear Mr. Clymer:

My Dear Angelo:-

I am writing to you about a situation which disturbs us here in El Dorado and which is also very much to Iola's interest. I am going to ask you to put us in contact with the proper persons in Iola who can help to get some action.

The matter affects the present and future fate of Highway No. 54. As you probably know, the state of affairs in Woodson County has affected the improvement of this entire stretch of federal highway from Fort Scott to El Dorado. Toronto is four miles south of the natural line of the highway but demands that the highway come down through that town. This has made an awkward kink in the road. I am now informed that certain persons at Toronto are trying to route the highway past Fegan's Lake, which would make a southward diversion from Yates Center and would lengthen the mileage. While the highway department frowns on this sort of thing, it has been persuaded in some way from completing a survey of a short cut east of Toronto and between Yates Center. Thus, we have the situation of a small town like Toronto acting the dog in the manger, keeping the whole highway from being improved in Woodson County and diverting highway funds to other roads

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in the state. You, of course, are familiar with the practice of the highway department of desiring to work along the line of least resistance and to accomplish its work with the greatest amount of harmony.

Our fellows here believe there is great danger in the present situation. They feel that traffic will be largely diverted from Fort Scott through Chanute over Highway No. 96, leaving Highway No. 54 high and dry. That would be a tragedy to towns like Iola, Eureka and El Dorado. If the Woodson tangle can be unraveled we want to go ahead here and petition for slab surfacing for No. 54 from El Dorado east to the Greenwood line. The experience of the past few years has shown that blotter type surfacing will not stand up under such heavy traffic as this road is forced to bear.

What we want to do is to get a small active working organization principally in the towns of El Dorado, Eureka and Iola. We don't want any publicity--yet. I am appealing to you to take the lead in your town, or to place this letter in the hands of someone who will. A small group of six or eight fellows can get the job done. If you Iola people will organize, we will send a delegation to confer with you within a short time, or we might meet at some central point. At any rate, we want to get something started. The way matters are now going, we are sitting quietly and letting our most important highway get away

from us. It is something that concerns our respective community welfares most deeply.

I am appealing to you to help get the ball to rolling in Iola--and our fellows here in El Dorado will greatly appreciate your prompt services. We think we can line up Eureka without a great deal of trouble. The subject will have to be taken up largely through Earl Todd, of Independence, whom, I presume, is your highway commissioner. Iola and El Dorado working together ought to make a team that can move the load.

I shall personally appreciate anything you can do in this instance, and also your views and suggestions as to the proper method of procedure.


I am happy to learn from your letter of July 16th that you expect to visit this part of the country some time shortly after the 10th of August.
