This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.







Have you ever heard of a likely spot where a newspaper may be bought? I am still on the lookout and hope you will not forget to let me know if you hear of anything.

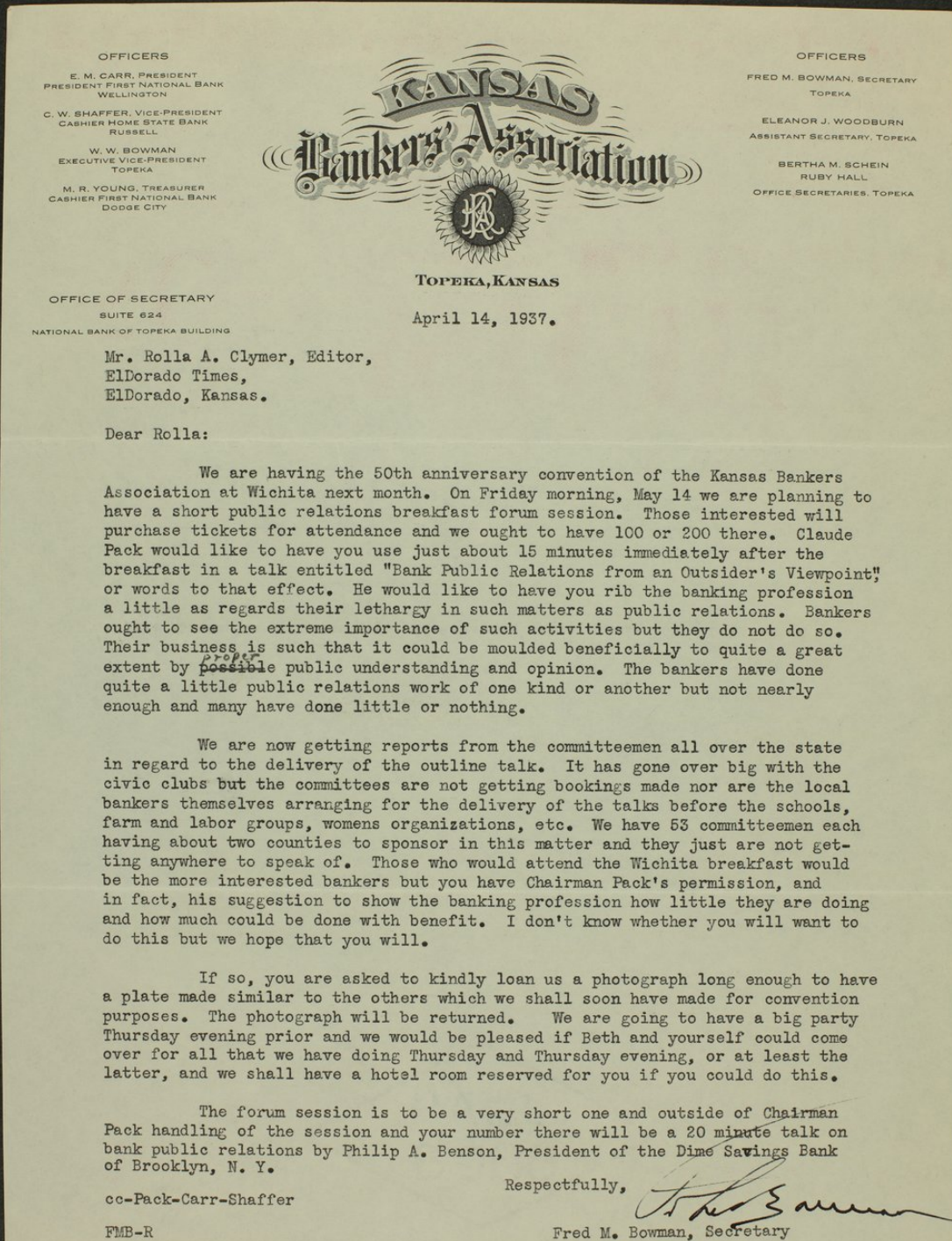


I am strongly of the opinion that the bankers of Kansas, who are not already acquainted with you, would like to see you and hear you because of the prominent part which you played in producing our vocational talk on Banking. More important, however, is the need to have someone outside of banking talk straight from the shoulder to these Kansas bankers about what the public is thinking about banks and bankers. I know of no one better able to do that than a competent newspaper man.

Unfortunately, the majority of country bankers in Kansas today do not realize the value and significance of an aggressive program of public education. You have supplied them with an excellent treatise on the subject of Banking and yet it is with the greatest of difficulty that we are able to enlist the cooperation of any considerable number of bankers in presenting this talk before public groups. The talk is being presented before service groups throughout the state, but we find one or possibly two bankers in a county called upon to do all of the work along that line, instead of a more cooperative response when an invitation is extended a country banker by some local group to make a talk on Banking.

I am sure that such a message from outside our banking circle would be most timely. Naturally it has to be done with tact and diplomacy or it would not accomplish the result we seek to accomplish.

We are all hoping that you will accept our invitation and be with us on this occasion.

During this time I have handled the legal matters connected with oil and gas proration exclusively, and have given the subject considerable thought and have studied the problems involved in the producing industry from every conceivable legal angle.


I have prepared a statement, attached hereto, which sets forth my view based upon that experience, which I believe, if adopted, will result in the betterment of the oil industry.

We have learned much during the past ten years about conservation of our natural resources in the truest sense, and there is much yet to be accomplished.

If you have any suggestions or questions about the matters contained herein, I would be only too glad to answer the same if I am able to do so.

In leaving the Commission I am of the definite opinion that there are several important problems pertaining to oil and gas to be solved by those interested to perfect as rapidly as possible:

1. Protection of the reservoir energy and the application of sensible means in the recovery of oil. This can be determined by the exercise of legislative enactment or by agreement.
2. Maintenance of the natural reservoir pressure and the apportionment of the energy among land proprietors. This can be accomplished by legislative enactment or by agreement.
3. The law of capture should be modified as to permit and whenever possible to compel the drilling and producing practices which are deemed advisable. In my opinion the modification or repeal of the law of capture must come by legislative enactment.
4. Universal adoption of wider spacing. This should come by agreement, but if no agreement is possible, then by legislative enactment with authority for the Commission to base the spacing upon the peculiarities of each pool.
5. Basing potentials on a more scientific basis. Basing allowables on well potentials or flat rates per well are unsound.
6. The rate of withdrawal should be permitted by the utilization of the reservoir energy. This possibly will have to be obtained by legislative enactment, or by agreement if possible.
7. Legislative enactment requiring the issuance of a permit to drill a well for oil and gas purposes and requiring a bond to be given by the operator, conditioned upon that he will drill the well in a scientific manner, properly case the same, and in the event of abandonment plug the same under the rules and directions of the Commission. The requirement of a bond can be made optional at the pleasure of the Commission.
8. The establishment of a department of natural resources to have jurisdiction over all of the natural resources of the state of Kansas, to be maintained upon a fee basis chargeable against the producers thereof operating in our state.

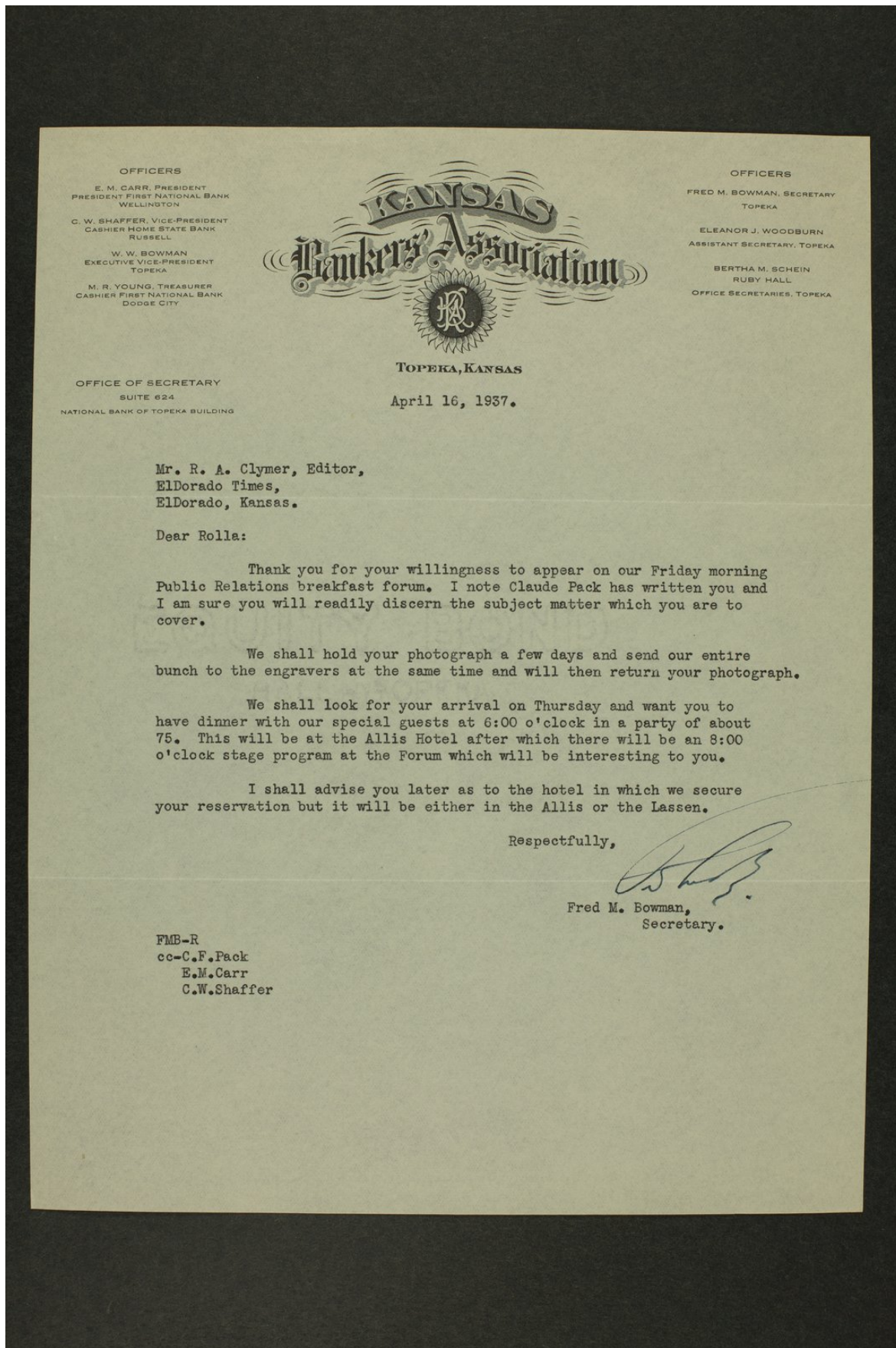



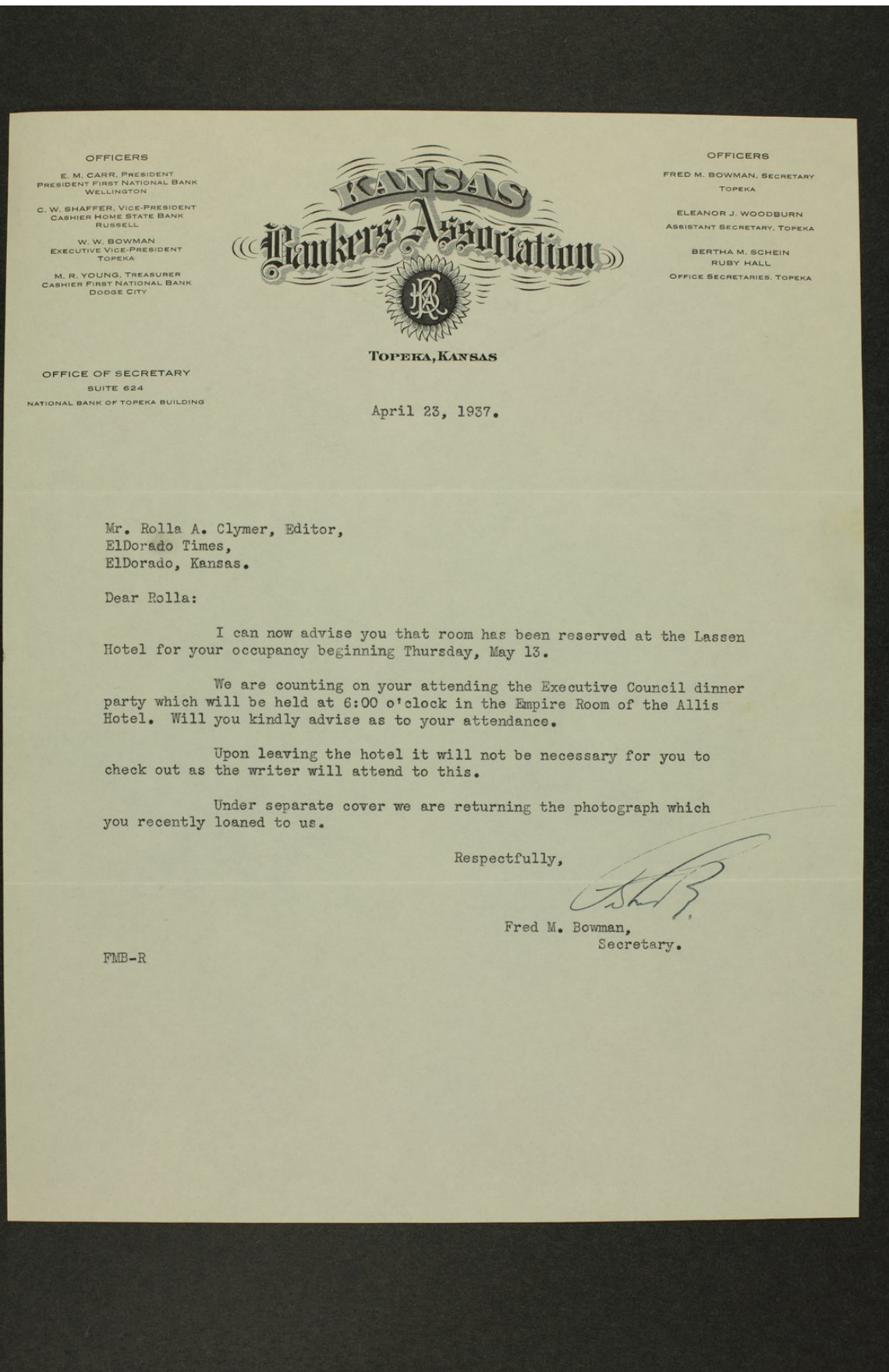
