

#### Rolla Clymer correspondence

Section 65, Pages 1921 - 1950

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.





My Dear Walt:- When I wrote you about talking on the subject of leased wires at the editorial convention, I had Cal in mind. But I thought you would best be able to develop the subject from the standpoint of circulation advantage. I consider the Casette unusually well situated for the leased wire as an adjunct to getting new subscribers, for you can certainly beat the Topaka, Kansas City and Wichita novepapers into your territory by a wide margain. It is all right to have Cal pinch hit for you at Wichita, if that is the way you profer it, and I shall place Cal's name on the program. But please have him develop the circulation benefits. Some of the papers that are taking the leased wire service are not gaining a lick, in my opinion, in the circulation department. I am against the leased wire for our own paper; don't think it would do us any good. But I want the subject discussed at the convention, and will place it on the daily round table. You are right -- that is where it belongs.

Please show this letter to Cal. I am obliged for your prompt reply and this acceptance, even by proxy. I sure want The Gazette on the program.

Then may I expect the 8-page rolls to be returned?

family.




Use your own judgement. I'd rather not talk but I won't lay down on you.

I hope you have a good Christmas and a successful New Year.



Now always make troubles seem trifles and life generally easier with your suggestions. I think your most recent one regarding advertising the Sichita meeting through the January Jeyhawker a good one, but I must insist that this issue be out in good time. It should be in the mails not later than the tenth of January. That leaves only minerater eight days to let the boys get ready for the big junket, and that is not too much. If we can surely get it our by the tenth, or earlier, all right. The saving in labor, postage, etc., is considerable and, of course, should be thought of.

I am getting a good many turn-downs on the program, and really I think my line-up is a bit slim. I don't want to have it top-heavy, but at the same time I do desire to have something doing every minute of the time. I still have three or four to hear from this week, and are awaiting their replies before wading into the final details of the affair. I am obliged to you for your suggestions as to the leader of the weekly round table, and have picked out Briles, of Stafford, and will write him today. Bailey is going to have charge of the daily round table, has accepted, and will enter into it with his usual enthusiasm.

I am herewith enclosing the letter I received yesterday from O'Shaughnessy for your information, and will ask you to return it for my files. I think he is showing a fine spirit and believe he will make us a good number. I have you to thank

regard--as well as many things.

I shall take care of the programs and have them printed in our office. I will not make them elaborate, though I may make a little 4-pager out of it. Do you have any designs that would be good for the first page, and do you have any suggestions of any information that should be printed somewhere in the line-up of events program exclusive of the mere informations, the several sessions?

I think Made's suggestion that we print a draft of the new by-laws a good one, and wish you would have this done. We ought to get as much "dope" as possible to the fellows ahead of time.

Pinkerton also wrote me concerning the balance in the Field Secretary fund, and I am relieved that we have that much. The general fund of the Association is still untounhed, and we shall be able to pay all our bills up fire to the time of the Wichita meeting, which is the main thing. I, too, am surprised that some of the presence pledgers are not paying up promptly; possibly they are hit on fuel bills, taxes and Christmas outlays like the rest of us. I don't know what to do about it, except possibly for you to send them a polite dun asking that all pledges be paid before January 1.

This is about all I think of just now, but I will write you as other matters come up. Please be sure to return the O'Shaughnessy letter to me.
