

Rolla Clymer correspondence

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

Dear Ham:

My gosh, it has been more than six weeks since your good letter arrived and it hasn't been answered yet. You were dead right in saying that we are probably the world's worst correspondents.

It has been a hot summer for me in more ways than one. Many of the rains that visited Butler County passed us up. Time after time storm clouds would roll up to where we could hear the thunder and then roll away again without giving us any moisture except an excess of humidity.

While I have not had an serious personnel problems that many of my friends have had, I did have the unpleasant experience of seeing my Chief Clerk walk out on me with little or no notice the middle of July. Fortunately I had a man that I could move up to his place but that resulted in considerable shifting of duties throughout the office and you know what that does to morale. However, it is working out very happily now and it did give me a chance to reward some deserving boys and gals in my little gang. Just the same, I have had to keep the old beezer on the w.k. rotating ab asive and thoughts of vacation have gone glimmering.

Just to make life a little more interesting, the house I live in is up for sale and we have spent many frantic evenings looking for a place to light. I am just about to close a deal for Lourchase of a home. It is one of Independence's good old-timers, not at all the type of house that I would build but we think it will be homey and livable and lend itself to modernization later on when the shooting is over.

Young Joe is leading a rugged live up at Lawrence but both he and his family think he is pretty lucky to have that chance. He has pledged Phi Gam and I think that he was influenced in his choice by the fact that Dave and other ElDorado kids belong to that lodge. Of course, he is not leading anything like a normal college life since the Navy has first call on his activities practically all the time. He has been home for a few hours once since he enrolled and we hope to see him again in a couple of weeks. He is disturbed over rumors that the whole program is to be eliminated with the end of the semester, Novmber 1st, but that may be pure souttlebutt.
