

## Rolla Clymer correspondence

This series of the Rolla Clymer collection includes sent and received correspondence arranged chronologically beginning in 1909. With few exceptions, the correspondence provides a continuous and very complete view of his activities. Much of the earliest correspondence in the Clymer collection pertains to information about the College of Emporia for the period Clymer was a student there. Scattered throughout the remainder of the correspondence is information about Emporia athletics and alumni activities and letters with former classmates. From 1914 to 1918, Clymer was editor and manager of the Olathe, Kansas, Register. In 1918, Rolla Clymer moved his young family to El Dorado, Kansas, where he became editor and manager of the El Dorado Republican. Except for a six month hiatus in 1937 as editor and manager of the Santa Fe New Mexican in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Clymer served the remainder of his professional career in El Dorado.

In his later years, Clymer devoted much of his time to efforts to preserve the Kansas Flint Hills region which he dearly loved. In addition to newspaper editorials, he wrote and published numerous widely circulated articles and poems about the Flint Hills. Perhaps his best known tribute was his poem "Majesty of the Hills," which helped earn him the designation as Poet Laureate of the Flint Hills. Rolla Clymer died on June 4, 1977, having been the editor of the El Dorado Times for fifty-nine years. For a complete contents list of the Rolla Clymer collection, see the External Links below.

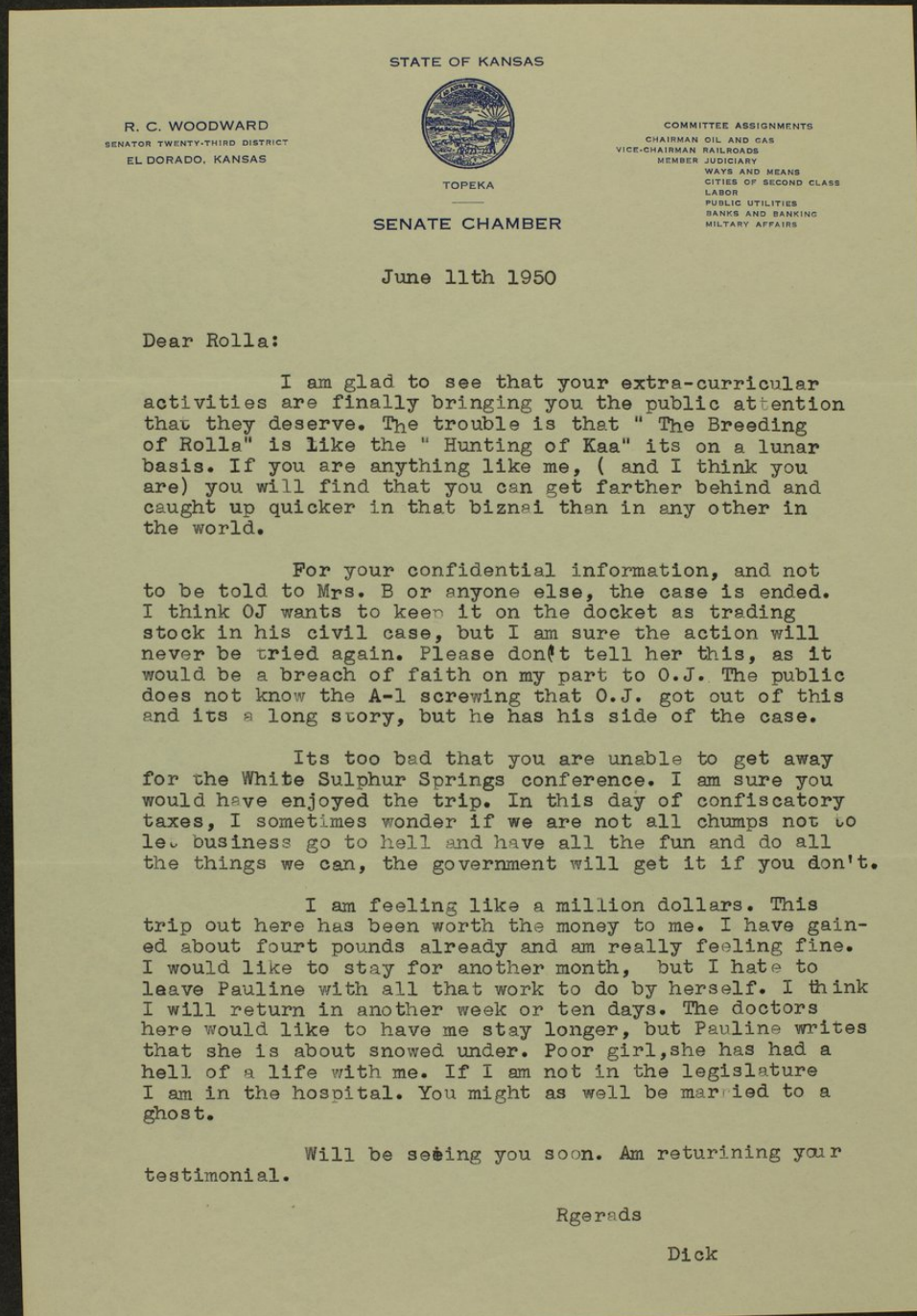

Dear Rolla:

Under separate mail I am sending copies of S. 1971. This bill was introduced on May 31, 1949 by Mr. Thomas of Oklahoma. It was introduced at the request of the Secretary and is known in the House and Senate as the Brannan Plan. No hearings have been held on the bill. Mr. Brannan, however, appeared before a joint committee composed of Members of the Senate and House Committees on Agriculture. They met in joint session to secure the views of Mr. Brannan on his plans to deal with the general subject of the farm support program. A copy of Mr. Brannan's testimony is also being sent under separate mail.


I am also sending copies of a statement made by Cliff Hope, being what he believes to be an analysis of the Brannan Plan, also a Congressional Record under date of May 12, containing a statement by Senator Thye on this subject matter. I realize both of the last named statements do not support the plan. As a matter of fact, I have had difficulty in securing a statement from a Member of Congress that is wholly in support of this proposed legislation. If I am able to secure such statement, I will send it to you.

It is possible that I shall make a statement on this subject matter a little later on.

I would like to get out to Kansas for the big fourth district meeting on June 28. Whether I shall go or not, though, depends largely on the program. The program in the House at the present time is pretty much bogged down. The leadership does not seem to want to submit any further legislation until the Senate has taken action on some of the bills that have been passed by the House. Furthermore, there is considerable doubt in the minds of House Administration leaders whether some of the proposed legislation would be approved if submitted. In other words, the leadership does not want to be defeated in the House, so is inclined to hold back quite a number of Presidential proposals.

When I may be of service, be sure to let me know.





Company and organization donations are currently ranging from twenty dollars to five hundred dollars. Any donation you can make to this fund will be greatly appreciated.

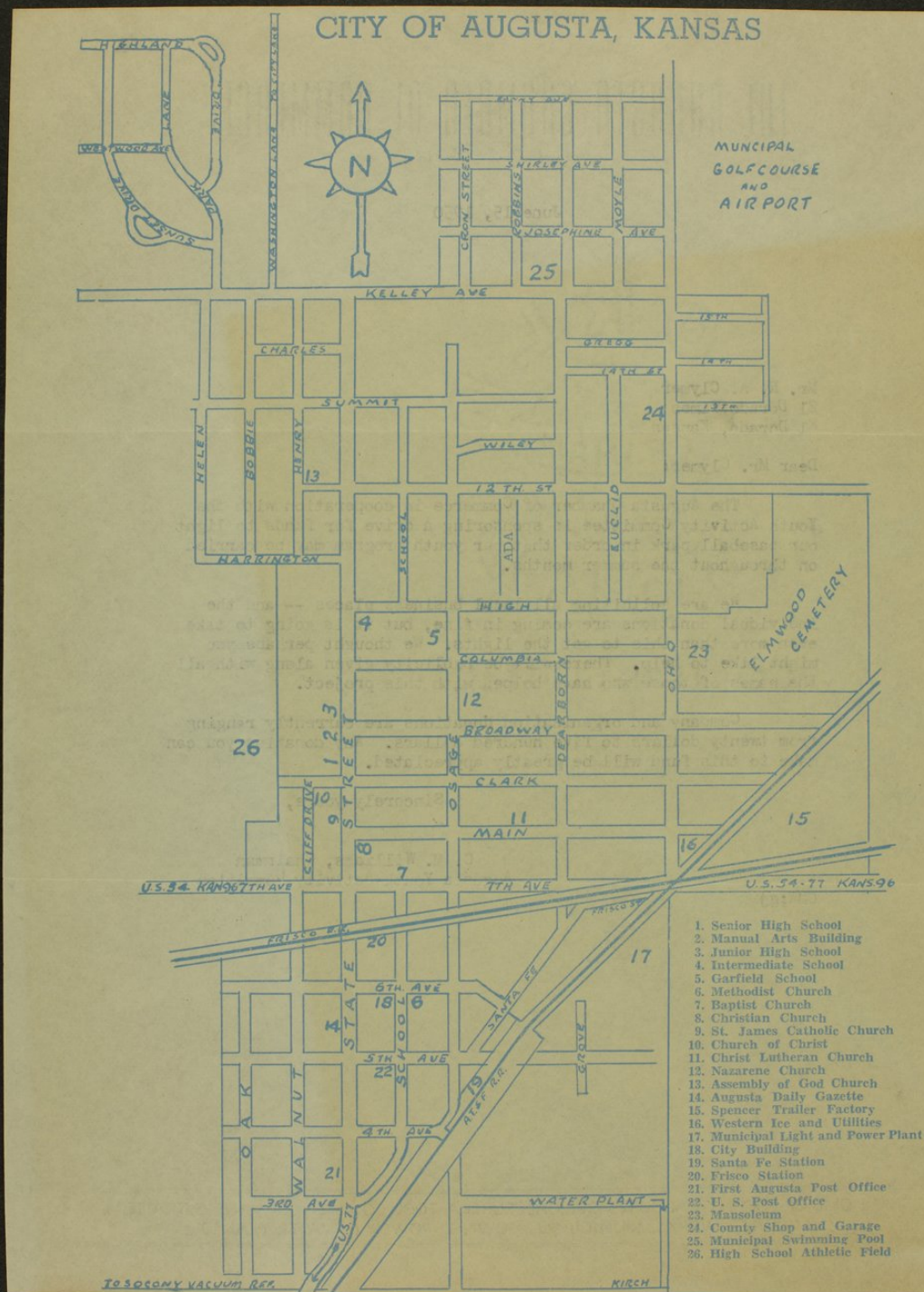




Dear Rolla:




Dear Mr. Clymer:


