

Albert D. Searl to Thaddeus Hyatt

The author wrote from Tabor, Iowa to Thaddeus Hyatt, president of the National Kansas Committee. He began the letter by mentioning a skirmish between pro-slavery and free state forces somewhere between Lawrence and Topeka. This correspondence also deals with emigrant settlements within the territory, the shipment of weapons and provisions, and the morale among the emigrants as they struggled to make ends meet. Furthermore, Searl mentioned a great deal about James Lane and his activities within Kansas Territory.

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Kansus line, which is some 10 miles in the Terretory; The Emigrants made another settlement between the first & Topeka; I could not get the purticulars of the buttle from the messenger, he did not see Lane more than half an hour before he started; Lane was To wait at his house till he returned and then he was going buck to the Kansus Malley + I saised Jeams to take on what stuff there was here, which consisted of 100 guns one Bbl, powder & 100 Knives; I went with them to Mebraska City and there got other learns to take them on and a safe number of men to accompany them; I put them in charge of Mr. Noore and be will see them through; I returned to this place This morning The Camp below hebruska litz did not break up untit

I tried to get a copy of Smiths refly, but could not, Blanchard Sages it was a cold and insulting letter Buchanan sayes the Engrants are well and in good spirits, but they are out of money and nearly out of provision; It seems to me theut something must be done and that to soon, to secure provision for them for the winter, if we intend to have them remain there; large quantities can now be bought up here cheap, Our Emigrants well suffer unless something of this kind is done, you are aware of the state of our bunds here and at thicago. After you left me at Chicago I froceeded to look up the knives and had engaged about 100 when I went to the Cons. Rooms to get my money, there they informed me



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they had held a meeting that morning and decided not to purchast any linis but if I had engaged any they would pay for them; the reason they gave for changing their decision was that they had seen in the morning puper a statement that our men had asrived sufely in Hansus and they thought there was no need of buying them knives, so instead of getting 184 knives I had to come off with about 100 - They gave me \$75. for expenses which I have used up besides nearly all my own funds in expenses and sending forward the stuff that was here, Me Jones advanced \$58,25 for the man who brought those guns from Join City: I have a letter authorging Eldridge to draw for \$ 1000. which is the extent of our funds here, and no more at Chicago



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I learn from various reliable sources that large quantities of provision are being bought up along the Missouri line and that a large number of vaggons with tents and campling fixtures are being fisted out at Doniphun Atichan and other points along the Missouri; and that quite a force is collecting on the Big Blue, what the objects of these movements are I cunnot learer While I was gone to Chicago word came here that there was five surpierous boses at Bluttsmouth, left there by a mun who got frightened and was afraid to lake them further; The Law & Order men had threatened to open them; Mr Jones thinking they might be guns sent a man to look after them and gave him an order to get them if they proved to be what they were reported



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The man returned the day I arrived here and reported, that he found the boxes but that one day a short time since when the man in whose cure they were left was gove, a party of Law & Order men came and opened them and found they contained plas Chains and other property of an honest old buschelor who had started for Kansus to settle but got frightened and left his things with a free state man out that place, and is now at with over the rever vailing for matters to get quiet so he eun go into Kansus So you see the property of an honest emigrant going to Kurisus is not safe from the hunds of the Buffins even up as for as Plattmouth; and the Law and Order fearly are allowed to commit their depredations on kebrusha as well as in Kunsus; the resolutions of

(a report of which you will see in the AB Tribune or National Era, I think Plattsmouth is in lass to 3 to the contrary notorthstanding I am wasting anxiously Eldridges return he will probably he here in a few days, The company of Emysus we met at Love City will be along soon I would like to hear from you I feel amproves to lener what is going on at the East, and what the prospects of our cause are, it seems to me that unless funds are fortheoming to purchast provision and establishing a depot here there is no need of any one staying here for nothing can be done unless there is something to do with; Whatever I can do to be of any survice to the Com. either Sure, in the Territory or elsewhere I am at their survice Hoping to hear from gon som I semain Bour Truly Addited
