

EDNA MAY COLE.

Edna May daughter of Isaac H. and Clara Belle Cole was born on Sept. 5, 1887 near Argonia, Kansas. She departed this life April 10, 1948 after many weeks of severe suffering which she patiently bore.

At the age of 13 years she was converted and united with the Argonia Baptist church. She was a consistent and helpful member for 47 years. She taught a class in Sunday School for a period of 25 years without interruption and was the church clerk for 12 years.

Besides her church work, she was very active and sympathetic with the temperance cause. She was a true and faithful member of the W.C.T.U. for many years and served as the local president for 2 years, treasurer for a number of years, director of the children's temperance work, the L.T.L. for one year. She also held offices in the County W.C.T.U. for some time.

A serious automobile accident in October 1934 so severely injured her that she was not able to keep up her usual church and temperance work, but she found ways to do other tasks and duties and help the cause. After this accident in her inability to get out except on crutches the W.C.T.U. meetings were held in her home so she could be with the group to help them in their plans and projects.

Her greatest happiness was serving her Lord and helping those around her. At the death of her precious mother on July 27, 1945 she was so concerned on giving to her the honor due this Mother in Isreal that soon she and her father dedicated a page in the Book of Memory to the mother. Today the Argonia W.C.T.U. is honoring Edna with a page in that Book of Memory.



Mary Derrick Coleman

Mary Ovanda Derrick, eldest daughter of Richard E. and Ruth Elliott Derrick, was born November 20, 1857, near Rochester Ind. and died at the Nellie Lee Nursing home in Washington, Kansas, March 2, 1950, aged 92 years, 3 months, and 10 days, having been a resident of Washington County for 90 years.

In 1880 her family moved to Winona, Minn. where they lived for two years coming to Kansas in the spring of 1860, making the long trip by ox team. Settling in Washington County was still a free territory and in that spring of 1861 they selected a homestead four miles south of Hollenburg. Here Mary made her home until she was married, March 4, 1872 to her teacher, Asa E. Coleman, when she moved to a farm one mile east of her parents.

Mr. and Mrs. Coleman had no children but in 1893 when her sister Mrs. Jennie Morey passed away the Colemans' took the two small nephews and reared them until they had settled in their own homes. They moved to Manhattan, Kansas while rearing the boys that - they might have better educational privileges at Kansas State College. Moving later to Orange, California, Mr. Coleman died April 6, 1921.

Mrs. Coleman's greatest pleasure was in serving others whether in supplying material needs or bettering lives through the cause she loved so much - the Temperance cause.

Mrs. Coleman was an ardent believer in Prohibition and had been a member of the W.C.T.U. since 1883. In the passing of this beloved woman, the nation has lost one of its strongest defenders of the dry cause.

Mrs. Coleman spent much time and energy working for Womans suffrage, and was a member of the Kansas Historical Society. She was a devout christian and a good Bible student. She was lovingly called by many "Aunt Van."

She is survived by two nephews Claud Morey of Huntington Park, California; Carl Wilson of Washington, Kansas, two nieces, Mrs. Hazel Ostendorf and Mrs. Ben Evans both of Washington.

The funeral rites were held in the Methodist Church of Sunday, March 5 with the Reverend Leslie F. Toburen bringing the message of comfort. She was placed in the family burying ground at Hollenburg where rest many of her relations.

The following lines were didicated to Aunt Van's life -
My life has had its morning, its noon and now the day
Of toil and triumph, grief and joy
Will soon have passed away,
As softly sinks the setting sun,
So may I gently go;
And as the sunset gilds the sky,
Leave such an afterglow.

ALICE TROUSDALE COLLINGWOOD

Alice Caroline Trousdale was born October 1, 1859 near Harrisburg, Illinois and came with her parents Robert L. and Edy Trousdale in 1877 to northern Kingman, County.

In her youth she joined the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Illinois and in 1892 transferred her membership to Waterloo, to the Methodist Church in Pretty Praire, and then to College Hill Methodist Church in Wichita, Kansas.

Miss Trousdale was united in marriage to Thomas Collingwood October 6, 1878 and lived on the home place near Pretty Praire until they retired in 1915. They celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary in 1928, and since the death of her husband April 18, 1938 Mrs. Collingwood has made her home with her daughter Mrs. Jesse Graber in Wichita.

Mrs. Collingwood was a kind and loving wife and mother, one who lived her religion everyday in her home and community. She is believed to be a charter member in the Kate Collingwood Woman's Christian Temperance Union and then transferred her membership and activities to the College Hill Union in Wichita in 1935. She was vice-president of the Wichita National Grandmothers Club. The Eagle placed her picture in their paper July 12, 1940 under the Caption "One of the Oldest Volunteer Knitters" which was quite an honor well deserved.

Surviving are four daughters: Mrs. Maud Seyb of Harper, Mrs. Myrtle Young and Mrs. Mollie Seyb of Pretty Praire, and Mrs. Jessie Graber of Wichita. She was preceded in death by one daughter Minnie Bell who died in 1882 at the age of three years. These and a host of friends mourn the passing of a beloved mother, friend and coworker, one who was devoted unwaveringly to her church and its Christian graces.



Mary Elizabeth Miller, daughter of Henry and Alice Miller, was born December 7, 1882, at Hutchinson, Reno County, Kansas, where she lived most of her life. She had three brothers and a sister.

She was married to Cecil E. Collins on December 30, 1908, and to this union was born one daughter, Alice, now Mrs. Earl Perry, of Hutchinson, Kansas.

She became a member of Hadley Methodist Church where she held many important and responsible positions, serving as Superintendent of the Beginner's Department many years, as Adult Superintendent, as Treasurer of the Woman's Society for over 20 years.

She was a member of the PTA, worked with Associated Charities, with rationing boards, and the Hutchinson Woman's Christian Temperance Union, always giving of her time willingly and cheerfully. She was always interested in the welfare of others and found many ways in which to express that interest, from the greatest of them unto the least of them.

It was in the year 1921 when she first seemed to become interested in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and in 1922 became a member. She was active in many of its departments, serving as Director of Union Signal and Young Crusader and as local and County Director of Temperance and Missions for many years. She was vice president for her church, at that time when vice presidents were appointed for each church; she also served her Union as Treasurer. She was clever at presenting playlets and skits for her Department and served on the social committee many times.





WILLIAM H. CONRY

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union lost a loyal honorary member in the death of William H. Conry of Topeka, who passed to the well earned reward on February 9, 1948.

Mr. Conry was born April 10, 1865 at Buffalo, N. Y. In his early manhood he came to Topeka, Kansas. He was vitally interested in boys, especially boys engaged in selling newspapers, or those in the boot black trade. He often invited these youngsters to his room where he gave them Bible instruction and Christian training. He was engaged in boys' work at the Y.M.C.A. and was a delegate to the International Convention of Y.M.C.A. in Paris in 1904.

He organized the Jefferson Street Mission on Quincey which was continued for many years. A member of the First M. E. church of Topeka and taught a Sunday School class there.

For three years he travelled extensively thru the Holy Land and Europe, where he also studied mechanical engineering. He later became associated with the Board of Education in Topeka and served as engineer in charge of buildings. For about twenty years he had been associated with the Santa Fe shops, accepting a position at Purdue University in Lafayette, Ind. For six years in later life he served as watchman at the State House in Topeka and during that time had become familiar to many visitors. He retired three years before his death.

He became recently a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church and was also a member of Orient Lodge 51, AF & AM of Topeka; also Scottish and York Rite bodies of Indianapolis, Ind.

His last service was conducted at Topeka Funeral Home and burial was at Florence, Kansas. He leaves to mourn his esteemed wife who honors him on his birthday in this the Book of Memory; also two sisters Mrs. T. T. Cramer and Mrs. J. M. Bell of Point Richmond, California.



Mrs. Russell Marley of Larned is her only living child and this memorial is given by her to honor her mother.



Beyond His love and care





Elizabeth Hay was born June 9, 1850 in Holmes County, Ohio, the daughter of Benjamin Harrison Hay and Isabel Dunmire Hay. The family moved from Ohio to Illinois in a covered wagon. Here Elizabeth received her education. At the age of fourteen years she became interested in the Temperance cause and her entire life time was a faithful member of the W.C.T.U. She enjoyed the work in the Salvation Army and in the cause of missions--doing much in this cause and for charity.

She became a member of the Christian Church at seventeen and held her memberships in the W.C.T.U. at Illiopolis, Illinois, Nortonville, Kansas, and was a charter and life member in the Lottie A. Case Union of Topeka having transferred her membership there from the Topeka Central Union. She also belonged to the Sunshine Club and the Court of Honor Lodge.

She was married to John M. Council, September 21, 1871, who preceded her in death. Her children, Robert Arthur Council and George Walter Council preceded her in death. The surviving children are Mrs. Flora Beile Kinahan, Mrs. Louella Jane McFadden, Mr. Jesse Elmer Council, Lena Viola Council, Irene Frances Council, Cora Olive Council, Benjamin H. Council and Percy Hey Council.

This good mother passed away August 3, 1931 at Topeka, Kansas and her last service was conducted August 5, 1931--a W.C.T.U. Service.

The hymns for the last rites were chosen by Mrs. Council as well as the Scripture verses: Thess. 4: 13-18; Rev. 21:1-6; Rev. 22:1-6. In the Garden, The Old Rugged Cross, Safe in the Arms of Jesus.

The burial was at Mechanicisburg Cemetery, Illinois.

A consecrated, unselfish mother always thinking of others has gone home to live among "God's Immortals."


Mrs. Jennie Crabill former member of the Irene W. C. T. U. Hamilton County, passed away at her home in Lamar, Colo. on Feb. 7, 1949 at the age of 76 years.

Mrs. Crabill was born in Copenhagen, Denmark January 5, 1873. She was the only child of Jens and Nickolina Clausen. When she was 10 years of age the family immigrated to America. After living a short period in Canada and at Council Bluffs, Iowa they moved to Grey County, Kansas where they homesteaded. It was here that Jennie Clausen met and married Henry W. Crabill who preceded her in death in 1925. In 1902 the Crabills moved to Prowers County, Colorado and in 1907 homesteaded on land 17 miles south of Holly, Colorado. Being near the Kansas line the family participated in the social activities of the nearby Kansas communities.

Mrs. Crabill was the mother of ten children of whom four sons and two daughters survive. As a pioneer mother she led a busy and self sacrificing life.

During her childhood Mrs. Crabill belonged to the Lutheran Church. When she came to America she joined the Methodist Church. She was a fervent believer in prohibition as evidenced by her entire life. Her family left Denmark hoping to find prohibitions in America. She cast her vote, raised her children and influenced her community according to this ideal.

Mrs. Crabill's death marks the passing of one of the last pioneer members of the Irene W. C. T. U. Younger women must now "carry on the torch" which was carried so loyally and conscientiously by the original members.

Cornelia Almira Masters was born Sept. 2, 1862 in Stilesville, Indiana, the daughter of Alexander Long and Rowena Almira Masters, and died at the age of 84 years after an illness of four months in Wichita, Kansas.

The family moved from Indiana to Garden Plain, Kansas in April 1885 and were among the pioneers of that community, engaging in the business of stock raising buying and shipping.

Miss Masters was educated in the public schools of Stilesville and was a student in music. After moving to Garden Plain she was the organist in the Methodist church and worked with the young people and children. For more than 25 years she was pianist for the organization-Women's Relief Corps. She was interested in painting as an avocation but her primary interests were her home and lending a helping hand to those who were ill and in trouble.

Mr. and Mrs. Crawford were married in Stilesville, Indiana on July 7, 1882, and were the parents of Hollie M (Mrs. Henry Lampl) and James Schuyler Crawford, both of Wichita, also Hubert who preceeded his mother in death.

While Mrs. Crawford was not a member of the W.C.T.U. she discouraged the use of liquor at all times. She belonged to the M. E. Church, (Garden Plain) the Ivy Leaf Chapter of Eastern Star, the Women's Relief Corps and the Women's Republican Club.





On Dec. 23, 1888 she was married to Albert B. Crider. To this union five children were born Mary Wigginton of Concordia, Edith Hunt of Phillipsburg, Cecil of Hershey, Nebr., Elsie Pugh of Salina and Aciel of Smith Center.

Her husband passed away Sept. 2, 1897.

With her family of children she came to Phillips county, Kansas in 1903. She resided on a farm until 1913 when she moved to Phillipsburg. She has resided in Denver, Colo. for the last 12 years.

She joined the church and was baptized in a river near Piney Fork church in Kentucky. She has practiced her religion in her daily living. Daily Bible reading and devotions were her family custom.

She was an active member of the W. C. T. U. for almost forty years. Her heart was definitely in the work.

MRS. GRACE LENORA CUMMINGS.

In memory of Mrs. Grace Lenora Cummings of Topeka Central Union, who was born near Havensville, Kansas, Pottawatomie County on March 20th, 1876 of parents Henry and Francina Smith who came here from Ohio in 1871, was one of the first families to settle in Havensville. She attended the grade and High schools in Onaga, Kansas from which she graduated. She also graduated from Campbell College at Holton, Kansas after which she taught several terms in the Rural schools then in the Onaga High School, often teaching thru vacations.

She was a member of the First Church of Christ Scientist of Topeka where she taught in the Sunday school, worked on many committees and was a Practitioner in the service of Christian Science. She was First Reader in the Christian Science Church of Lawrence, Kansas for four years while her daughter attended the University & was a very active member of the W.C.T.U. She acted as House Mother for a Sorority house while living in Lawrence.

While living at Frankfort, Kansas she was a member of the W.C.T.U. the Mothers club, Relief Corp, Coterie club and sang in the Methodist choir. In Topeka she held, offices of President, of Topeka Central Union, Recording Secretary and Scientific Temperance Director, also as County Recording Secretary and Scientific Temperance Director. She was married to Ray Cummings, June 1, 1898 at Havensville, To union four children were born, Lenora Cummings (deceased) Mrs. Roberta Schlichter, 542 Sumner, Topeka; Ralph L. Frankfort and Rexford who passed on in infancy.

Mrs. Cummings possessed all of the fine qualities of Motherhood not alone for her own family but for all with whom she was associated. I have known her to go many places as Practitioner, Nurse or Friend to those suffering or in great need without a cent of charges, truly living her Idealisms of Christ's teaching "To bear one another's burdens and so fulfil the Law." Next to her church work the work of the W.C.T.U. was very dear to her heart, always busy with it, seldom missing a meeting and always a Peace maker in smoothing out difficulties.

A VERY WONDERFUL MOTHER. She passed away on September 24th, 1946 and was laid to rest September 26th. The funeral services were read with References from the Bible and Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures by Mary Baker Eddy, according to the church services. Hymns were "From Sense to Soul, My pathway lies before me, and Shepherd show me how to go."

I love to be.





Margaret Eleanor Cuthbertson

Margaret Eleanor Cuthbertson, eldest child of William H. and Mary Dunlap, was born near Frazeysburg, Ohio, December 11, 1861.

At the age of five she moved with her parents to a farm near Warrensburg, Mo. where she later attended the State Normal School.

Moving on Westward, the family settled on a farm five miles west of Pittsburg, Kansas, and joined the United Presbyterian Church in the small town of Beulah. It was here that she met her life-partner, Matthew Cuthbertson. They were married February 28, 1883, established a home and lived on the same farm almost twenty-five years, when they brought their family to Sterling, Kansas in 1907.

To this union were born three children, William Alexander, Nina Marie, and Anna ^{Lorene} Leverne. She and her husband lived together for sixty-four years.

Mrs. Cuthbertson was a devoted wife and mother. Her life was filled with the highest Christian ideals, which she tried both by precept and practice to instill into the hearts of her own family, and all those with whom she came into contact.

As long as she was physically able she was active in the service of her Master, both in the Church of her choice and in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

Mrs. Cuthbertson died at 11:30 P.M. on April 26, 1950 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. E. Wyatt, at the age of eighty-eight years four months and fifteen days.

She is survived by her three children, nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.
