This collection consists of correspondence between individuals and committee members to the state chair of the Woman's Committee of the Kansas Council of National Defense. The Council of National Defense was established at the federal level in 1916 as an emergency agency under the Army Appropriation Act and abolished in 1921. It was created in reaction to World War I to coordinate resources and industries for national defense and improve civilian morale. The Woman's Committee of the Kansas Council of National Defense performed the same functions at the state and local levels, coordinating women's activities for national defense. The materials are organized alphabetically by county. The digitization of this collection was paid for through the Margot R. Swovelan Endowment Fund.

I am sure that you will do all in your power to further the government's war program in your county.


For the first time I am now able to send county chairmen some stationery and a limited amount of postage. I will send you a list of the training schools in Kanses in a day or two and later after this campaign is over will explain to you fully the work of the Moman's Committee, National Council of Defense. You will not need that for this campaign. Remember to send all application blanks when filled by candidates to me. If you can enroll six student nurses in your county you will have reached your quota in this campaign but if it goes beyond that we will be glad to have them. Your county will not be expected to do as much as some of the larger ones but we do want if possible to have you reach your quota. I will be glad to answer any questions you care to ask.





Dear Mrs. Ellermeyer: -

Your letter enclosing card of Niss Mabel Burns of Collyer is received and I am writing to her by this mail and sending her the proper application blanks to fill out and return to me here.

I note you have no civilian blanks and am enclosing you a few for future use. We have just received word from Washington that the applications received so far have not been sufficient to fill the fall classes and that only one state in the union has filled its quota so far. We are asked to continue the recruiting of nurses here and while I do not think it advisable to have recruiting offices kept open all the time, I hope the county chairmen will continue in a quiet way to interest the young women and to let them understand that their applications will be very welcome at any time.



In my mail this morning I have a letter


from Edna M. Hiskey of Onaga, Kansas, in which she says:

"Since sending in my first application papers I have learned there is no army training school at Denver, Colorado. I stated I preferred being sent there. What should I do about it? Camp Dodge in Iowa is my preference since learning there is none in Codorado."

Miss Hiskey seems an enthusiastic and desirable applicant and if this information is not too late. I hope you can oblige her in this preference as to location. She is very much in earnest about the work and having gotten the impression, incorrectly, that her first set of papers had been missent, she prepared and sent an entire duplicate set to make assurance doubly sure that she had not been omitted from consideration.

Your circular letter concerning the continuation of the nurses' campaign is received, also additional application blanks. If the arrangement suggested in the letter concerning the affiliation of army and civilian training and the possibility of a transfer of senior students to the army school work either here or in France is perfected, we will be very glad to be advised at

Dear Miss Patterson:-

I enclose herewith the application blanks of Miss Marguerite Thrapp, who is a high school graduate and has had three years of college work but is willing to give up her fourth year in order to respond to this patriotic call for nurses and because she conestly believes she is fitted for the work and knows that the army school requirements shut out a number of applicants who are willing to take the training. I consider her one of the very finest candidates we have had and sincerely hope she may be offered an early assignment. She has not indicated her preference as to location but she desires to be sent somewhere outside the state of Kansas.

I have received the additional supply of blanks which was delayed in delivery here. Thank you. We have pending now applications in all parts of the state and I hope soon to send the completed blanks but a good many things happen along the way--doctors refuse to give certificate, or something of the sort which prevents the blanks being returned to us. However, we still expect to have a large number of applications to send to you from time to time.
