Beatrice, Neb. Sept 20, 1880.

Honoured Sir, -

There is to be a grand temperance camp meeting at this place on the 28th and 29th of Sept., 1880. No pains will be spared to make this the biggest temperance boom that ever struck southern Nebraska. The great leaders of the work in Nebraska and Kansas have been asked to attend and assist in the exercises many of whom have accepted the invitation.

You, of all others, are earnestly solicited to meet with us, and aid us by your presence and influence. If it were known that the great "Temperance Governor" of Kansas were to be present, the people of this section would turn out almost en masse. You have no idea of the enthusiasm of our people on hearing the news, as it sped over the wires of your re-nomination.

Please let me hear from you at your earliest convenience. Remember that an address from Gov. St. John will create a boom of itself in state.
