

XIII.

That it is vital that the Dust Bowl program embraces a policy of Federal financing of the erosion laws of the several states. Under the present set-up, the Counties of the several states do not have the money to finance these laws, and such laws as they now stand are unworkable. We believe the Federal Government should advance the money to finance the listing of eroding lands where the owner refuses to do so; that the state levy taxes against the land to cover cost of such operation, and the taxes when paid shall be turned over to the Federal Government as reimbursement for money expended in such enforcement program.

XIV.

That any program should fully protect the right of the tenent farmer. There has been some expression among landlords of a desire to see a pro ram put into effect that will cause most of the government benefit payments to accrue to the landlord instead of the tennant farmer. We believe it is necessary to keep all of the present farm population here to did in getting this erosion condition under control. It is unwise to lose any more man power from this area.

XV.

Where cooperators have received emergency payments for cover crop and have cut the heads off of said cover crop, they should be prohibited from he drilling said ground to wheat in the fall of 1937 unless the County Committee inspects the land and passes upon it as having sufficient moisture to make the planting of wheat a reasonable safe practice, otherwise many farmers will go in on these stubble fields and drill the ground to wheat in a dry condition, destroying a great deal of the protection of the stubble and putting the ground in a condition to blow.

XVI.

Where land has been summer fallowed with a lister, that the cooperator be prohibited from levelling off the lister ridges, preparatoru to planting wheat, while the ridges are in a dry condition. That this be enforced even though it prohibits the planting of wheat on the ground. Listed ground that is levelled off in a dry condition is badly subject to wind erosion.


XVII.

In consideration of the present favorable moisture conditions, it is vital we get extensive and immediate act on erosion control activities.


