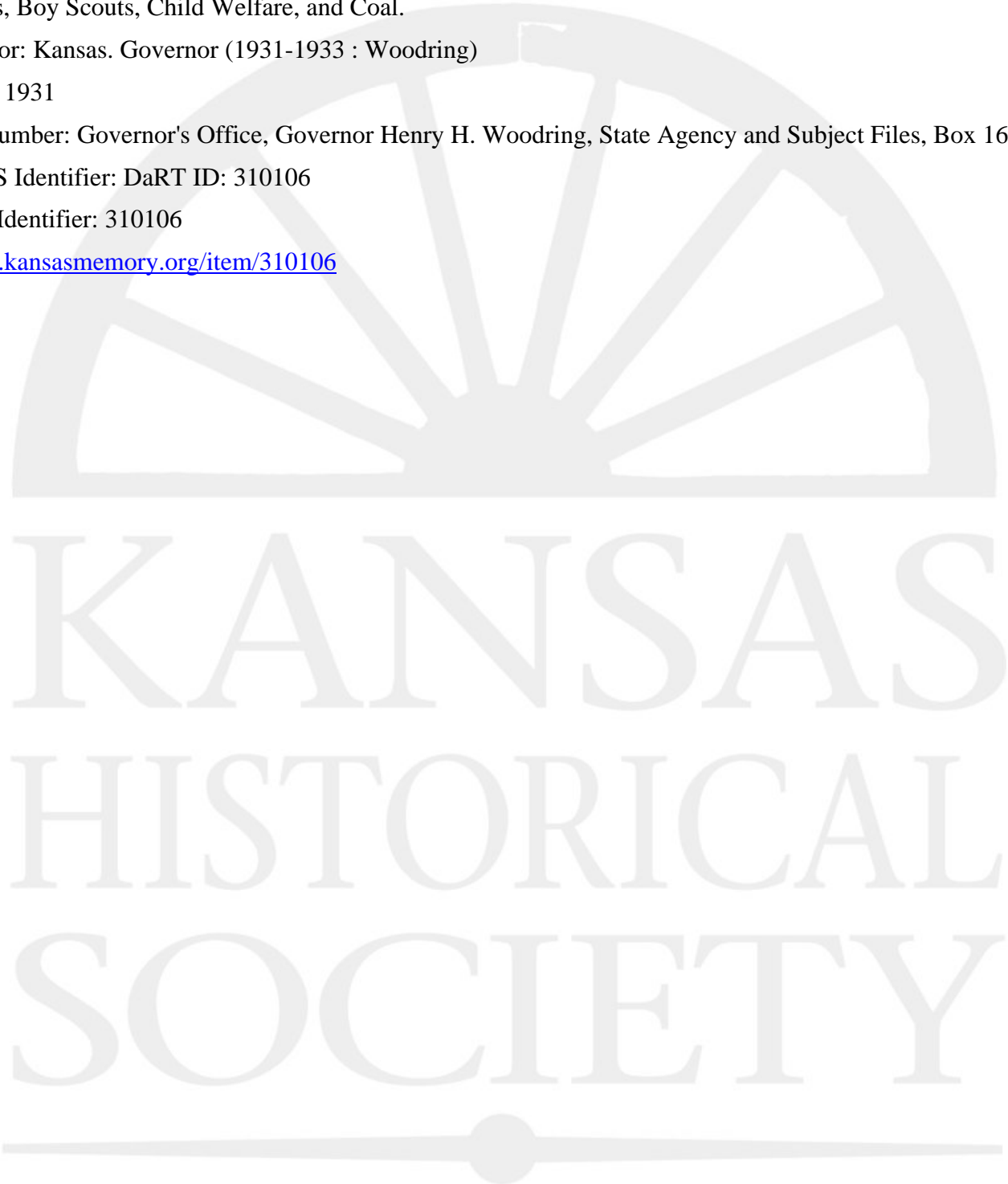

Mr. Cline, the county treasurer, wrote me sometime near the first of November in regard to these forms and I informed him in a letter dated November 4th that it would be necessary for him to use the forms which we would furnish him, or if he desired to use others, they must conform to our standard, so all of the counties in the state would be uniform. We feel that this is only a fair demand upon Mr. Cline, personally, as the county does not have anything to do with furnishing of Vehicle Registration supplies.

I appreciate the fact, Governor, that you are not in favor of me making any rules or regulations that would tend to increase the expenditures, and I have not, and do not intend to make any such rules, but feel that this form will materially decrease the cost of checking applications that has been necessary in using the old form, and will give us a much more efficient system of records. Evidently Mr. Cline is being misinformed when he stated that the State Printer had printed the forms for the two years previous, and that if I went ahead it would mean a waste of time and material on the state's part, as we have only ordered sufficient new forms to fill our needs for the year 1932. The stock of old forms in this office being a negligible amount.

Dear Mr. Willis:

I have your letter of November 24 relative to a ruling by Victor King, State Vehicle Commissioner, not of the Public Service Commission as you state. I heretofore have expressed myself as opposed to such a ruling at this time and I am informed that Mr. King has modified his demands somewhat.

However, I am informed by the Attorney General that there is a law requiring owners of automobiles to preserve their registration cards and to obtain duplicates immediately in case they are lost. The law was passed in 1929 for the protection of motor car owners. My contention is that it should have been enforced at that time or that notice should have been given motor car owners when they obtained their tags last year that they would be required to present their registration cards this year. It was for the purpose of keeping the records straight that the law was passed.

I have given this matter considerable attention in the past two weeks and I am inclined to think that Mr. King will make a more satisfactory ruling for this year if he has not already done so.

IN THE EYES OF THE PEOPLE

The order of Victor L. King, state vehicle commissioner, requiring applicants for motor licenses either to produce receipts for last year's tags or pay 50 cents each for duplicates, is another form of bureaucratic irritation from Topeka that the people will bitterly resent. It is an imposition on the motoring public, an insult to the honesty and intelligence of motorists, it adds an additional burden of expense to drivers of automobiles, already taxed to the limit by the state.

Should the order accomplish the purpose for which it is designed it will take \$150,000 from the pockets of Kansas citizens in the form of another double dose of taxes.

The person who carries around a receipt written in carbon on a flimsy piece of paper for eleven months is a rarity. There is a record of every license sold at the offices of Mr. King at Topeka and also records of licenses in the offices of county treasurers. If there is anything questionable about anybody's automobile license it can be readily investigated by reference to the official files.

It is pretty late in the year to spring an ultimatum on the long-suffering public. Nearly eleven months of the year have passed. If it were desirable that motorists keep their tag receipts indefinitely they should have been warned to do so long before this.

Mr. King says the idea of the order is to prove ownership of cars. It would seem that is nothing for Mr. King

My dear Governor Woodring:

I have been requested by our Board of County Commissioners to write you protesting the recent ruling of Victor L. King, Vehicle Commissioner, in ordering the use of a new form of receipt blank in the registration of automobiles for 1932.

As you are no doubt aware, our 1929 Registration Act provides that the County Treasurer make out a receipt in triplicate on blanks furnished by the department. Such blank forms were furnished this county by the department and were used in 1930 and 1931 without change. In this county, and in many other counties where the registration is fairly high, we use what is known as the Unarco Register Machine, which makes a triplicate receipt and greatly expedites the work, thus enabling one man to handle the large amount of applications. The form prescribed by the Vehicle Department is used in this machine, but of course we have to use special supplies which are paid for by the county. The Commissioners purchased our supplies for 1932, and about three days after they were delivered to us we were notified by the Vehicle Commissioner that he had decided to change the form to be used in 1932.

Of course we all realize that Mr. King undoubtedly has the legal right to prescribe these forms and to change them as often as he sees fit, but under the circumstances we certainly object to his having "seen fit" to change these forms at such a late date, as this will necessitate our county ordering more supplies, and result in the absolute waste of about \$80.00 already spent for supplies that would thus be useless. We are reliably informed that there are over twenty counties in the state in like circumstances.

We realize that so far as public expenditures in general are concerned, \$80.00 is not very much money, but with times as they are, expenses as high as they are, and taxes as high as they are, we feel that every-



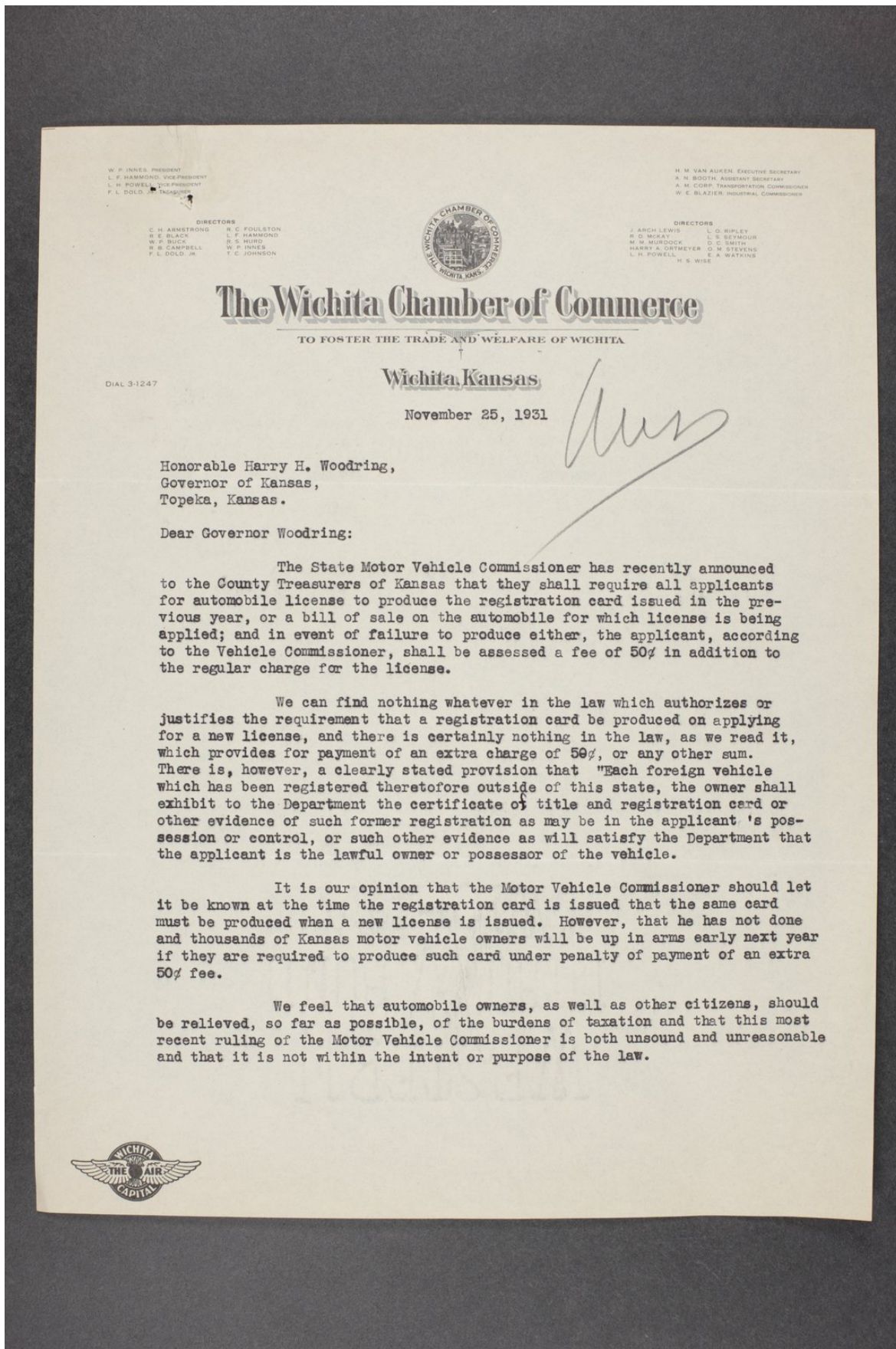

Dear Governor:

Just received a copy of a circular headed, "Protect Motorists" signed by Victor L. King, Motor Vehicle Commissioner. I am very sorry that it becomes necessary to complain and that your time is taken up with straightening out many things which could be avoided by sober thought before it is given publicity.

Rule No. 4 which Mr. King attempts to put in force in this circular is going to cause a lot of unrest and protest and will reflect upon the state administration. The general run of people are restless and radical and unless county treasurers are diplomatic we predict trouble in undertaking to enforce an affidavit vouching for the license applicant. It may result in thousands of car owners continuing the use of their 1931 tags because they have been made so mad by the enforcement of a rule which seems to have no warrant by statute.

Section 17, chapter 81, undoubtedly refers to a lost number plate.

Section 7, chapter 81, provides what the applicant must do in order to secure his license.

I predict that if an affidavit is enforced or an attempt is made to require the payment of a fifty cent fee in order to obtain a duplicate registration certificate, there is going to be plenty of trouble.

Instead of questioning the honesty of every applicant for license would it not be better to continue to wage an active campaign against the already known law-breakers who are cluttering up Kansas with license tags purchased from other states at a low price. This and the bootlegging of tax exemption gas is a well known and growing evil.

I regret very much that this situation has arisen and I am giving you our ideas in the matter that they may be of help to you in your administration of your very exacting position of Governor of this State.

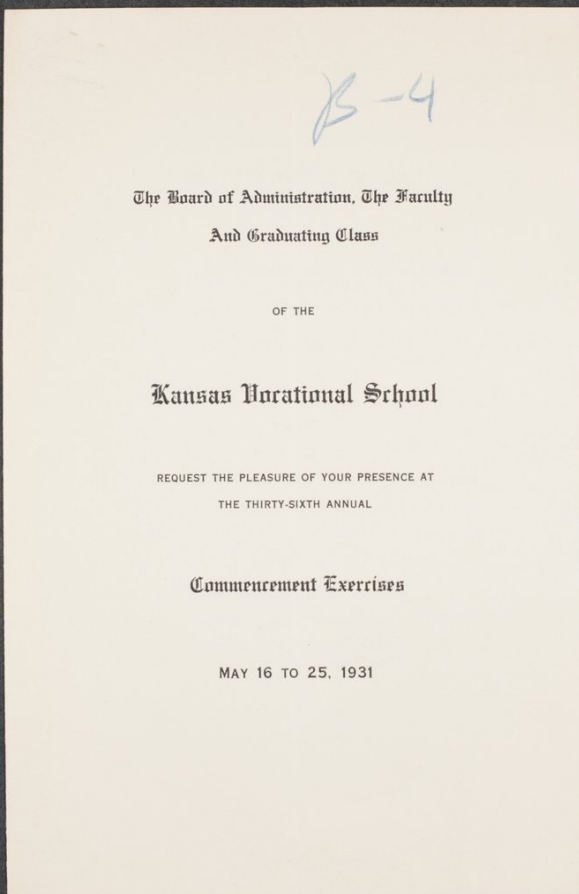
