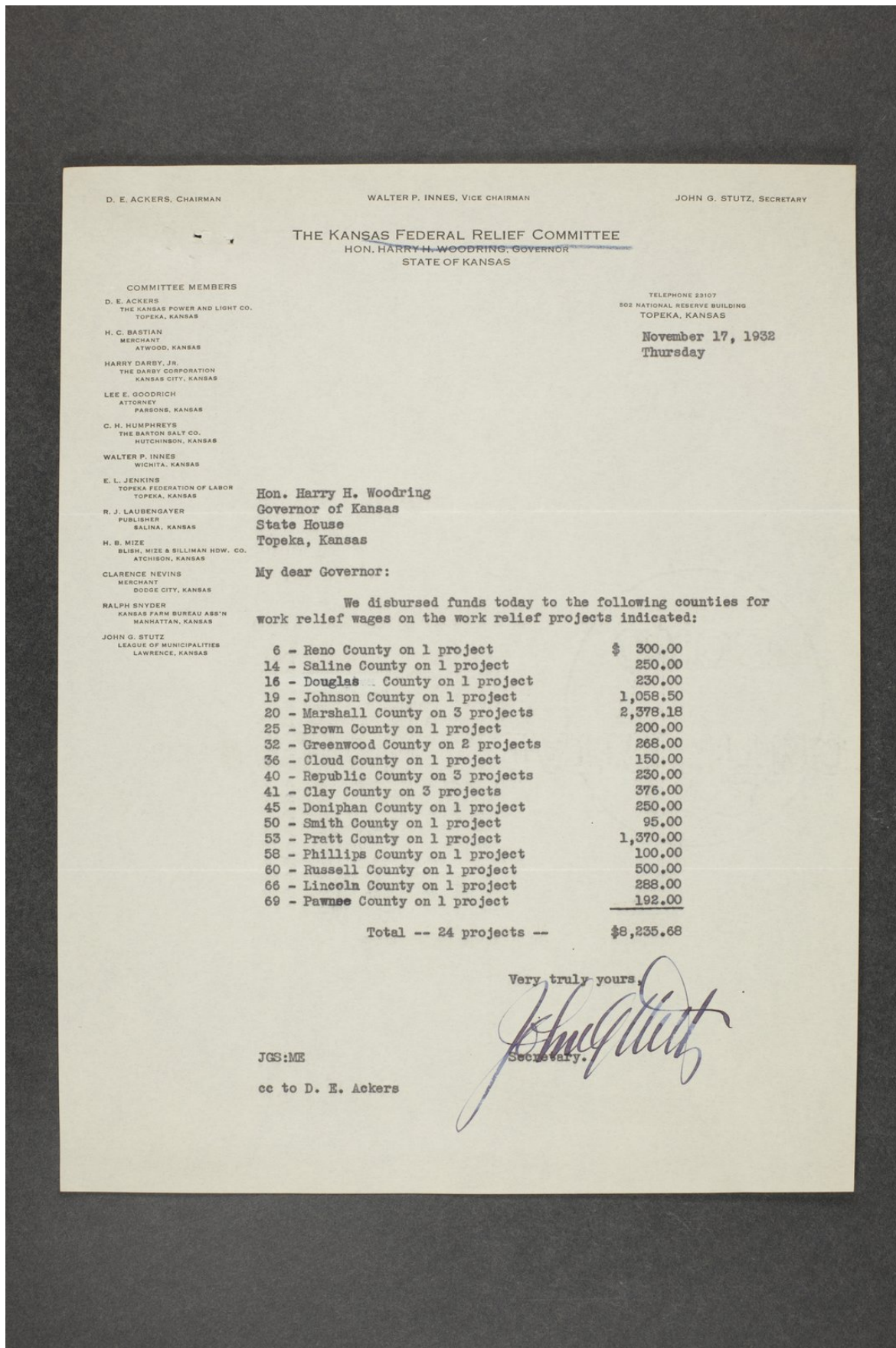

Dear Mr. Thompson:

I have read your letter of November 17 with a great deal of interest. The money which has been allocated to Kansas for unemployment relief is distributed through local county committees. The State Committee approves such projects as will employ a maximum amount of hand labor, and then sends the money necessary to the local committees for distribution. They are instructed, and I have insisted, that preference shall be given to ex-service men, particularly those with dependents. If your committee has not done this, it has not complied with instructions nor with the law and you have a right to demand employment on that basis.

The reason I expressed the hope that Kansas unemployed would not join the march to Washington was that I felt such a demonstration not only would be futile but would bring upon those who made the trip unnecessary hardships. It is absolutely true that we in Kansas are better off and better able to take care of our unemployed, with the help of relief funds that have been obtained, than are the industrial states with their congested centers and thousands of unemployed where we have hundreds. I don't think there is a public official who is not doing everything in his power to relieve the situation, and I am fearful that a march on Washington might hinder rather than help the situation.

I appreciate very much the support you gave me in the campaign and you are positively correct in your statement that I have the interest of the ex-service

men at heart. I also know that those who are unemployed want an opportunity to earn, and are not favorable to a dole. They are to be commended highly for the patience they have shown. My hope is that they will not give way to their feelings at this time but will give the new administration an opportunity to bring about such further relief as may be possible.

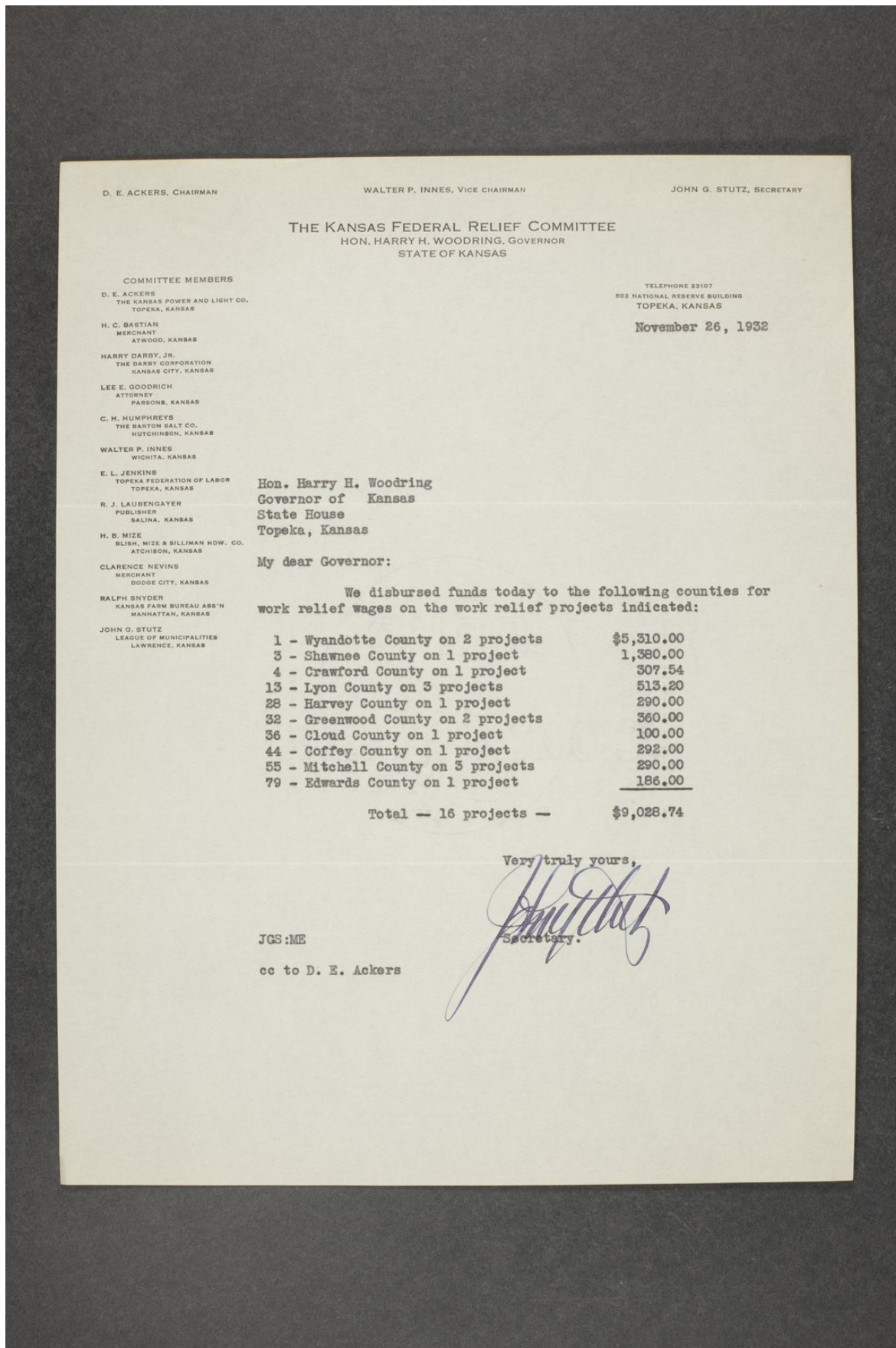

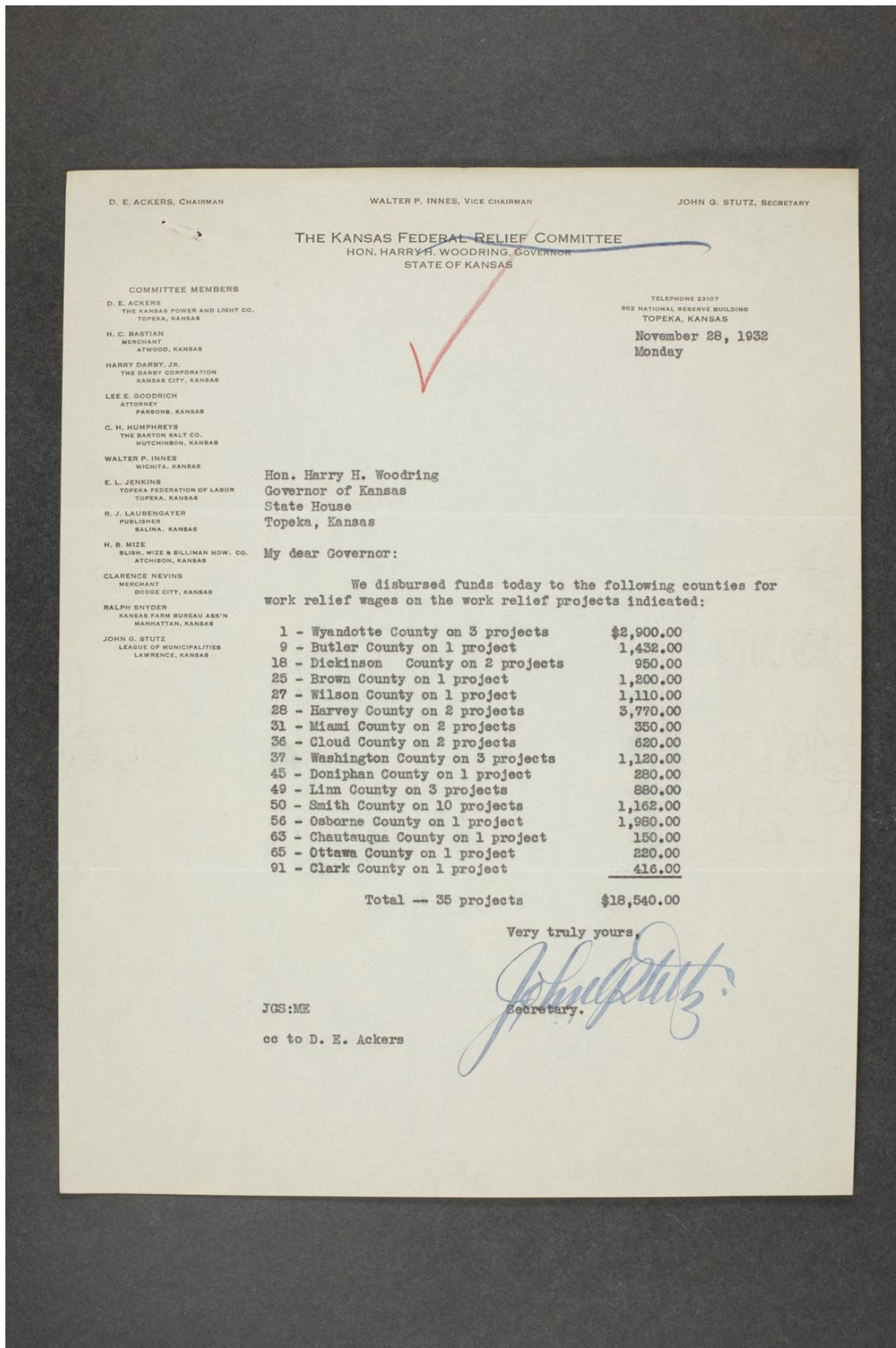

Dear Mr. Moegling:

I have your letter of recent date relative to the situation now confronting the taxpayers and citizens of Kansas.

I am in hearty accord with all that you say and do not believe for a minute there should be any discrimination in favor of foreigners to the disadvantage of our own citizens and taxpayers. During the twenty-two months and more that I have been Governor I have done everything within my power to relieve our own taxpayers as much as possible, though there did not seem to be enough of them who favored my efforts in their behalf to return me to office.

The Federal Relief funds are distributed through the local county committee and under the law, as it was passed by the Congress, preference is supposed to be given to local citizens and ex-service men with dependents.
