Dear Mr. Mercer:-

I am indeed sorry I did not get to hear you speak here on Labor Day but I was unavoidably out of town at that time.

In regard to the car of hogs shipped for Mr. Frank Dungan from Wauneta on August 10: Will say there were 77 of these hogs and 8 of them were condemned on account of T.B. You will note by the enclosed A/S that the live weight was 1700# at \$10.80 cwt. would equal \$183.60, whereas they allowed \$63.63, leaving a balance in controversy of \$119.97.


As we have a contract with Keefe-Le Stourgeon Company on all of the hogs we buy on the Missouri Pacific Mr. Dungan, who is a very good friend of ours, asked us to handle this car of hogs for him, and while Mr. Dungan did have some TB on his place several years ago he cleaned his place up in good shape and we have had no complaint on any of his hogs we have bought from time to time for several years.

We did not ask him to guarantee them free of TB and when we phoned the number of hogs and car number to Keefe-LeStourgeon there was nothing said about TB hogs.


We are shipping hogs weekly to Keefe-LeStourgeon and expect to continue doing so and we prefer not to antagonize them any more than is necessary but if Mr. Dungan is entitled to this \$119.97 we will greatly appreciate your assistance in the matter.



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Referring to the James Arnold case - I do not want any concessions made to Mr. Arnold in any way. You of course know that it is our policy to be practical in all of our restrictions against the movement of live stock off the public yards or elsewhere. Our records will bear this out. However, when we find that anyone to whom consideration has been given purposely takes advantage of our leniency, then it will be necessary for such a one to adhere trictly to the cold technical provisions of the law, rules and regulations. This is the kind of service must be meted out to Mr. Arnold without any variations whatever.

With respect to Dr. Dixon's order disallowing any dairy or breeding cattle passing out of the 12th street gate on a Kansas permit, I am at a loss to understand why Dr. Dixon would issue an order of this kind. Dr. Dixon knows, or at least should know, that we would not issue a permit for the movement of live stock into Kansas unless we wished such movement to be made. And the fact that they would come into Kansas by going out some other gate other than the 12th street gate you refer to should make no difference to him. I would suggest that you take this matter up again with him and advise that we stand ready at all times to correct abused privileges such as arnolds but because of occasional happenings of this kind we would not wish to be penalized or have Kansas people penalized because of the action of an unscrupulous fellow like Arnold. If it is a handicap to our people to be deprived of the privilege of taking live stock through gate #12 that you refer to and imposes an unnecessary burden to divert such live stock to other sections of the yards and Dr. Dixon will not modify his order, I will ask redress through other sources, which I would dislike to do. Talk this over with him and then let me know what he has to say.

I do not know just when I will be in Kansas City but I might stop off for a little while Thursday but am not certain.

Dear Sir:

On October 5th, I issued a permit to James Arnold for 10 head of calves consigned to J. Phillips, Louisburg, Kansas, and it later developed according to the Government records that the calves did not go to Louisburg, Kansas, but were trucked to St. Joe, Mo. They were put in test there before allowed to move on to their destination at Nebraska.

The same James Arnold came in our office this morning and asked for a permit on three holsteins heifers calves about ten days old, and said that he was going to send these calves by express to J. T. Nester, Kincaid, Kansas. I got in touch with Mr. Nester by telephone and had him to verify the order and I also required Mr. Arnold to pay for telephone call before the permit was issued.

He thinks that we are bearing down hard on him and that we were discriminating against him because we did not require the same from other speculators that send cattle to Kansas. I told him my reason for doing this - was because you had instructed me to be very careful about issueing permits to any one that might change their plans after they had received a Kansas permit, and that if he wasn't satisfied, and had any further grievance that he had better take the matter up with you.

I wish to advise that since this Arnold case came up that
Dr. Dixon has issued an order not allowing any thing or Bruding cattle

works a hardship on our fellows living in Kansas because under
the new order cattle that are going to Kansas by truck have no
other way now passing out at a gate located on the Kansas side
