State of Kansas County of Wyandotte. S.S.

Marion Lewis upon being first duly sworn deposes and says under oath that on the 20th day of March 1928 I was given a commission as a special Constable in and for Quindaro Township Wyandotte County Kansas by Lee Nelson Justice of the Peace of said Township. That I proceeded to serve papers given to me by the said Lee Nelson almost all of which were garnishment papers. That on or about the month of Feb or Mar 1929 he gave me 10 garnishments to serve and I served the said papers as directed and my charges as agreed with Nelson were \$1.00 in each case or \$10.00 in all.

That afterward the money on said Garnishments was paid in to Nelson and M.F. Russell paid Nelson a check for about \$60. as Russell was agent for the claimants of the accounts. This \$60.00 was paid to Nelson by Russell as court ^{costs} and included my constables fees for serving the papers.

I saw Nelson about the matter and stoped him on the Street and he told me "no I wont pay you and if you were not an old man I would slap your face. (I am 79 years old)

When Nelson collected this money he told me and Wm Mc Hale that he was going to settele the matter with the defendants and that he would take care of my fees, but after he got the money and also Russells check he has failed and refused to pay me.

H.M.Perkins upon being first duly sworn under oath deposes and says that on or about the 7th he turned over to H.F.Gorsuch an attorney a claim against John Jurkovich and John Audley for brick and Bulilding material stolen by the said persons from the premises of Louis Krek at 3128 Waverly avenue K.C.K. That Mr Gorsuch proceeded to file the said claim against the said persons claiming damages for the wrongfull conversi^on of his property. That a few days later a Mr Woods who acts as clerk in the office of Lee Nelson notified H.F.Gorsuch that the said defendants had filed Affidavits deny in the jurisdiction of the Court fior the reason that the defendants lived inside the city and that therefore the case would be dismissed.

That I then filed the claim in the City Court and sued the said defendants for \$80.00 and costs. That on the next Saturday the said Lee Nelson took Audley out to his house in the Coun try where he tries some of his cases and there they made up a fake transcript showing that the case had been tried out there and judgment entered against Audley for Costs. ~~Of course Audley paid Nelson the costs.~~ The n on the 11th day of June the case came up in the City Court against Audley and Jurkovich and Audley came in with a lawyer and presents the faked and fraudulent tran script of the proceedings in said court and demanding that the case against Audley be dismissed, thus leaving us with nothing to do but to mandamus Nelson thus causeing some more costs and litigation for the man who has already lost his building material, *and judgment entered against Plaintiff for costs thus depriving* This affiant further states that Lee Nelson the said Justice of the Peace from Quindaro Township has no jurisdiction over case in Kansas City Kansas but that he has an office on Minnn Ave at No 640 upstairs and that a man named Woods stays in the office and receives the filing of suits and notifies people who are Garnisheed to call on LEE NELSON AT 640 MINNN AVE .

When they call the matter is usually settled up by having the victim sign a confession of judgment and so they get the money.

That this practice has been going on for a long period of time and many persons have been subjected to such treatment and made to believe that they were dealing with a straigh and legitamate court and that they have jurisdiction over them, and the right to mulch them for costs and collect bills.

Perkins, under date of June 4.

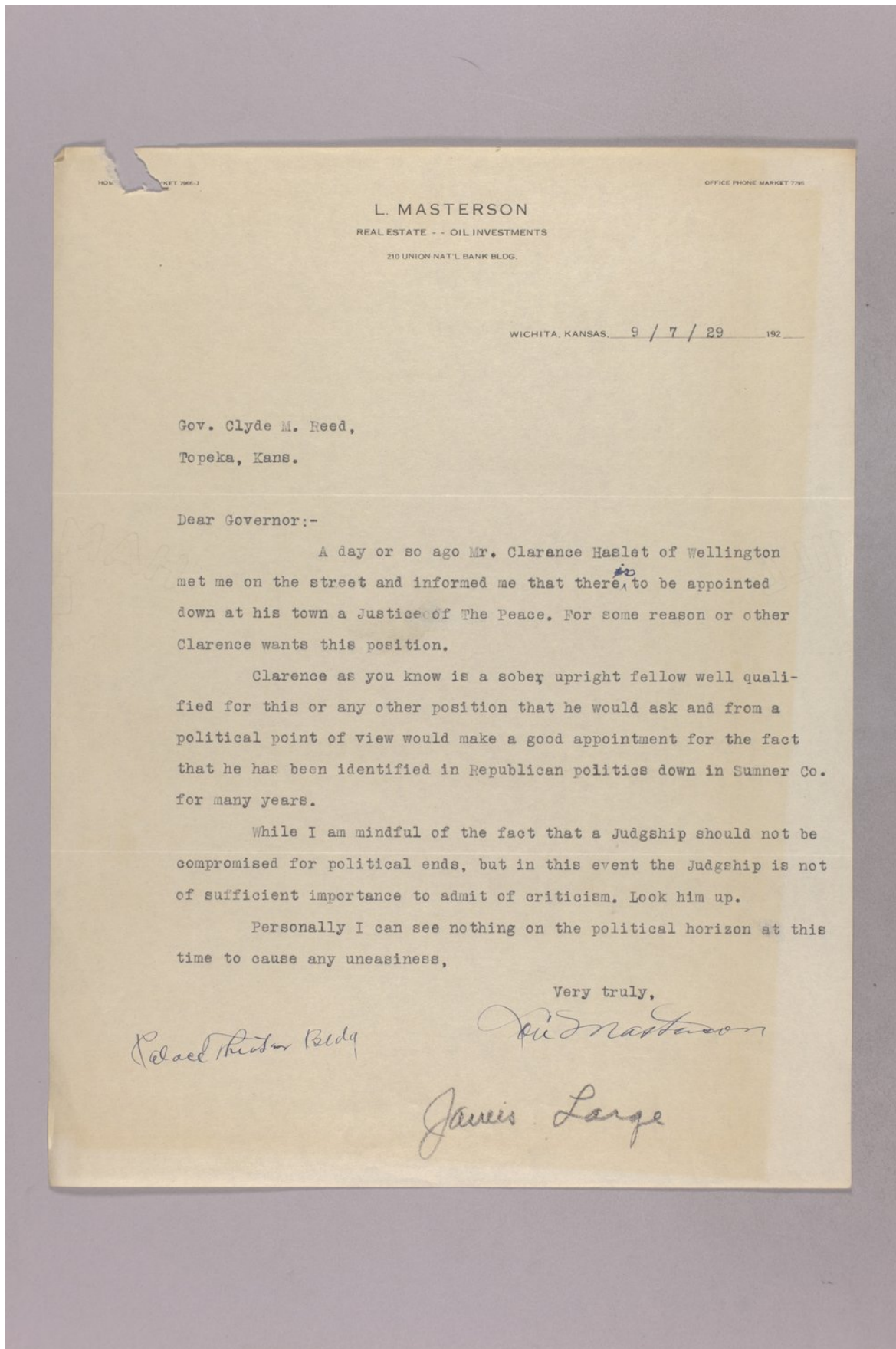

Dear Governor, I have to day, placed my resignation from the Office of Justice of the Peace of Oskaloosa Township, Jefferson County, Kansas, in the hands of Mr. A. C. Wilson of Oskaloosa, who will deliver the same to you at his earliest convenience. My reasons for resigning the Office are, briefly, these. I have established a collection agency here which, in a short time, has grown and prospered to considerable proportions. Many of the claims handled by me necessarily ripen into law suits which are, in the main, within the jurisdiction of the Justice Court. My activity in this field disqualifies me to act as a Court in many cases, and, being a conscientious in the matter, I am not disposed to sit as a Court in many others for fear of suspicion that I have used the the office as an influence to further my personal interests.

I have finally secured some information as to
Harry Teagarden.

I find that he has only been in this county
about one year, and came here from Chicago. He was
in my office this morning on request, and I had a
personal interview with him and am very favorably
impressed with him.

He is a man of apparent unusual training for
this position. He was captain of the State Police
of Cooke County, Illinois, and has had about sixteen
years experience on the police force in the larger
cities. He together with his wife, is now operating
a grocery store at 2901 Porter Ave., Wichita, Kans.

This is a new addition in the northwest part
of the town and is segregated by reason of the river
from the rest of the town, and by reason of this fact
the people in that community think it desirable to
have a Justice of the Peace and Constable by being
such a distance from town.

I find Mr. Teagarden is also connected with the
Wichita Retail Credit Association and bears a good
reputation for the short time here. There may not
be very much of a demand for this appointment outside
of the immediate neighborhood as represented by the
petitioners, but I rather think it would a good thing
to have this Justice of the Peace appointed, especially
when you can get a man of Teagarden's apparent ability.
And in addition to this Mr. Teagarden has had some
political experience. I made it clear to him that
Governor Reed would not care to appoint someone who
was going to be his political enemy, so taking every-
thing into consideration, I think it would be wise to
make this appointment.




