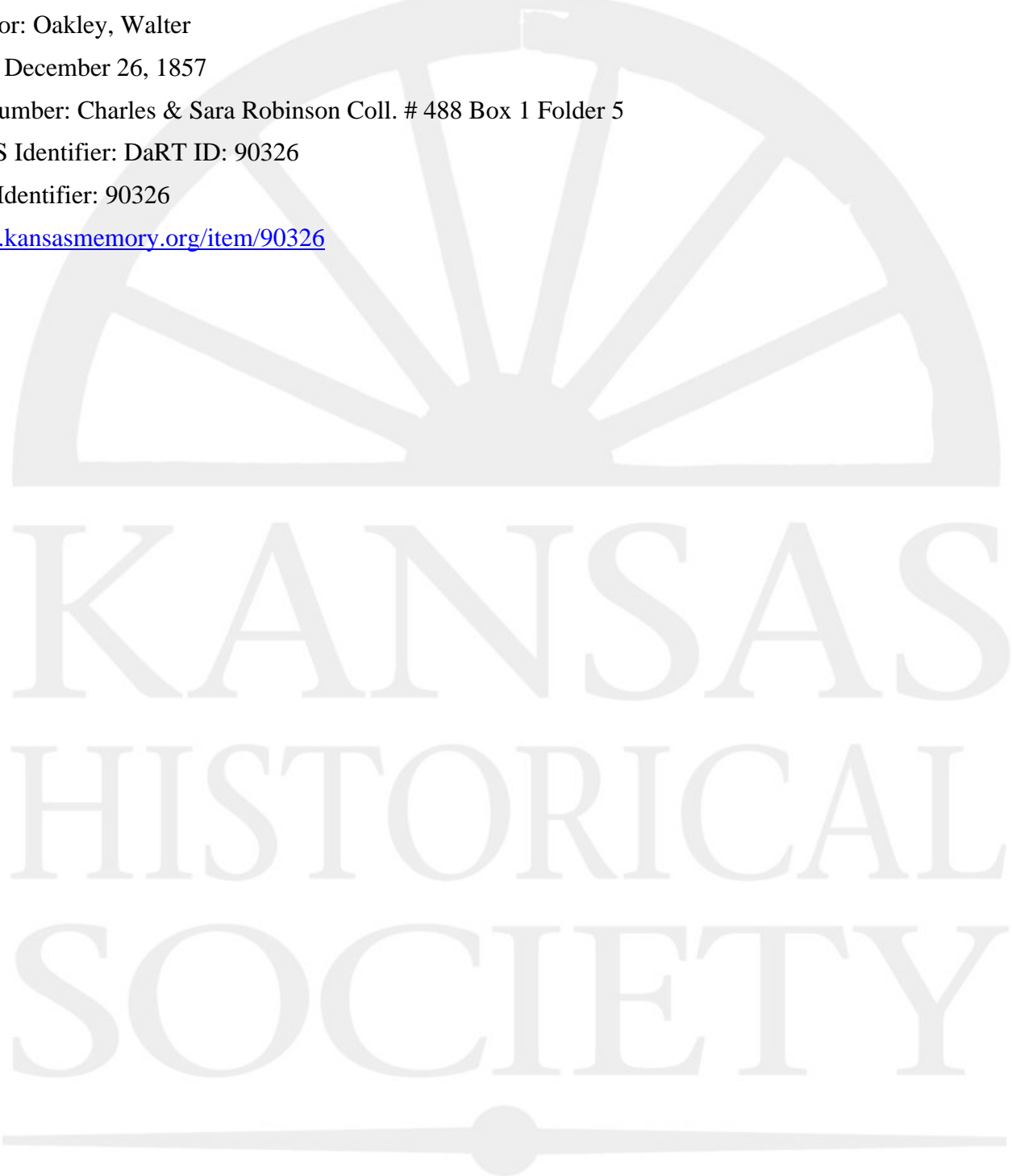

Hon. and Dear Sir.

The undersigned
your constituents and political friends,
rejoice that we are to have a Mass
Meeting, to endorse the action of the
Convention at Lawrence, on Monday
evening next at this place. It is
the expressed desire of our citizens
to have you with them and
address the meeting. You will
gratify the wishes of Topeka if you
can be with us. Allow us to add
that there is no community that holds
you in higher esteem than Topeka though
we are compelled to differ with you
upon the question of voting for state
officers under the Leavenworth Con-
stitution.

Hoping you will be with us
on Mon Evening next.
